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for nearly a decade teaching for diversity and social justice has been the definitive sourcebook of theoretical foundations and curricular frameworks for social justice teaching practice this thoroughly revised second edition continues to provide teachers and facilitators with an accessible pedagogical approach to issues of oppression in

classrooms building on the groundswell of interest in social justice education the second edition offers coverage of current issues and controversies while preserving the hands on format and inclusive content of the original teaching for diversity and social justice presents a well constructed foundation for engaging the complex and often daunting problems of discrimination and inequality in american society this book includes a cd rom with extensive appendices for participant handouts and facilitator preparation

winner of the 2016 nyasa book award presented by the new york african studies association when students are introduced to the study of diversity and social justice it is usually from sociological and psychological perspectives the scholars and activists featured in this anthology reject this approach as too limiting insisting that we adopt a view that is both transdisciplinary and multiperspectival their essays focus on the components of diversity social justice and inclusive excellence not just within the united states but in other parts of the world they examine diversity in the contexts of culture race class gender learned ability and dis ability religion sexual orientation and citizenship and explore how these concepts and identities interrelate the result is a book that will provide readers with a better theoretical understanding of diversity studies and will enable them to see and think critically about oppression and how systems of oppression may be challenged

how does the council of europe put into practice its commitment to the promotion of a culture of democracy through education over the past decade or so our societies have been facing increasing difficulties in reconciling acceptance of diversity and social inclusion with the need for community the search for simple solutions to complex problems the fact that fake news and alternative facts are no longer seen as nonsensical expressions our responses to migration and the refugee crisis and the growth of populism in many parts of europe present challenges to our societies and not least to education authors from europe north america and south africa outline how higher education could respond to these challenges the first section makes a strong case for the continuing importance of higher education and research to modern society the second focuses on higher education institutions and the need for inclusive and diverse campuses the third section considers opportunities to improve the inclusion of refugees and immigrants in higher education whereas the focus in europe is mostly on refugees in the united states it is largely on immigrants further accentuated by the debate on the dreamers

this book offers educational and psychological perspectives to inform practice and increase options in addressing conflict situations the first part of the book helps the educator understand the reasons for resistance and ways to prevent it the second part explains how educators motivate dominant groups to support social justice this book is an excellent resource for group facilitators counselors trainers in classrooms and workshops professors teachers higher education personnel community educators

and other professionals involved with educating others about diversity and equity

do people make friends with those who are culturally and socially different to themselves friendship and diversity explores the social relationships of adults and children living in highly diverse localities in london the authors examine how social class and ethnic difference affects the friendships of children in primary schools and their parents the book draws on original and in depth conversations 8 and 9 year olds about their classroom relationships with parents about their own and their children s friendships and with teachers about supporting children s friendships at school through detailed discussions of friendships everyday multicultural and attitudes towards shared social space cultural difference and social class the authors reveal what these friendships tell us about the nature and extent of social mixing and social divisions in cities with diverse populations friendship and diversity will be of interest to students and scholars across a range of disciplines including sociology geography and psychology as well as education practitioners

this is an accessible guide to diversity issues in health and social care it considers the concept of diversity and how people differ provides a model for understanding discrimination and discusses cross cultural communication including the impact and use of language practice vignettes and exercises for the reader are included throughout

this book explores how linguistic diversity mediates social justice in liberal democracies undergoing rapid change due to migration and globalization focusing on the linguistic dimensions of economic inequality cultural domination and imparity of participation linguistic diversity and social justice is a call to write language into the social justice agenda

how can groups effectively meet the needs of humans in areas as diverse as aid responsibility action healing learning and acceptance this edited volume aims to address these issues and provide ways to extend the current reach and quality of social work with groups based on a selection of papers from the 24th annual international symposium of the association for the advancement of social work with groups aaswg the chosen chapters embody the strength and diversity of the symposium encouraging and encourage readers to think group chapters address the future challenges faced in social work with groups including issues in teaching group work holistic thinking about groups team building staff development programs and university agency collaborations to strength group work practice there are chapters focusing on how mutual aid groups support trauma recovery including one with firemen addressing the aftermath of the 9 11 disaster as well as chapters that examine group work s place in community development challenging social isolation mask making as a medium for growth and special issues in addressing concerns of children and youth this book

will be of interest to researchers professionals and students in social work and human service fields

it is difficult to ignore the fact that even as the united states becomes much more racially and ethnically diverse our neighborhoods remain largely segregated the 1968 fair housing act and 1977 community reinvestment act promised to end discrimination yet for millions of americans housing options remain far removed from the american dream why do most neighborhoods in american cities continue to be racially divided the problem suggests mara sidney lies with the policies themselves she contends that to understand why discrimination persists we need to understand the political challenges faced by advocacy groups who implement them in unfair housing she offers a new explanation for the persistent color lines in our cities by showing how weak national policy has silenced and splintered grassroots activists sidney explains how political compromise among national lawmakers with divergent interests resulted in housing legislation that influenced how community activists defined discrimination what actions they took and which political relationships they cultivated as a result local governments became less likely to include housing discrimination on their agendas existing laws went unenforced and racial segregation continued a former undercover investigator for a fair housing advocacy group sidney takes readers into the neighborhoods of minneapolis and denver to show how federal housing policy actually works she examines how these laws played out in these cities and reveals how they eroded activists capability to force more sweeping reform in housing policy sidney also shows how activist groups can cultivate community resources to overcome these difficulties looking across levels of government to analyze how national policies interact with local politics in the first book to apply policy design theories of anne schneider and helen ingram to an empirical case sidney illuminates overlooked impacts of fair housing and community reinvestment policies and extends their theories to the study of local politics and nonprofit organizations sidney argues forcefully that understanding the link between national policy and local groups sheds light on our failure to reduce discrimination and segregation as battles over fair housing continue her book helps us understand the shape of the battlefield and the prospects for victory
