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this text covers the key features of a technical communicator's work from understanding an audience to effectively creating documents many chapters contain a practicum a brief narrative written by a workplace professional

communicating project management argues that the communication practices of project managers have necessarily become participatory made up of complex strategies and processes solidly grounded in rhetorical concepts the book draws on case studies across organizational contexts and combines individual experiences to investigate how project management relies on communication as teams develop products services and internal processes the case studies also provide examples of how project managers can be understood and studied as writers further arguing project managers must approach communication as designed experience that must be

intentionally inclusive author benjamin lauren illustrates to readers how teams work together to manage projects through complex coordinative communication practices and highlights how project managers are constantly learning and evolving by analyzing where they succeed and fail he concludes that technical and professional communicators have a pivotal role in supporting and facilitating participative approaches to communicating project management

bringing together scholars from around the world this collection examines many of the historical developments in making data visible through charts graphs thematic maps and now interactive displays today we are used to seeing data portrayed in a dizzying array of graphic forms virtually any quantified knowledge from social and physical science to engineering and medicine as well as business government or personal activity has been visualized yet the methods of making data visible are relatively new innovations most stemming from eighteenth and nineteenth century innovations that arose as a logical response to a growing desire to quantify everything from science economics and industry to population health and crime innovators such as playfair alexander von humboldt heinrich berghaus john snow florence nightingale francis galton and charles minard began to develop graphical methods to make data and their relations more visible in the twentieth century data design became both increasingly specialized within new and existing disciplines science engineering social science and medicine and at the same time became further democratized with new forms that make statistical business and government data more accessible to the public at the close of the twentieth century and the beginning of the twenty first an explosion in interactive digital data design has exponentially increased our access to data the contributors analyze this fascinating history through a variety of critical approaches including visual rhetoric visual culture genre theory and fully contextualized historical scholarship

this reader contains 20 cases that show students how real world organizations address communications issues

spurious coin constructs a cultural history of technical writing in the united states and the system of scientific knowledge and power it controls embedded in this history are tensions

between scientific and liberal arts knowledge making that render technical writing both the genuine and counterfeit coin of scientific knowledge within our culture when scientific knowledge is made by scientists and engineers it can circulate as genuine currency in an economy where communication makes knowledge when scientific knowledge is made by liberal arts trained technical writers however it circulates as spurious currency and threatens the purity of the knowledge economy because the stability of the scientific knowledge economy is at stake scientists and technical writers often find themselves at odds over the value of scientific knowledge minted by non scientists longo constructs this cultural history around a framework of five intellectual trends the use of clear correct english maximum efficiency of production and operation the need to contribute to a general fund of scientific knowledge for the betterment of the human condition the tension between the role of science and art within a culture and a redemptive urge to purify language and standardize practice she also explores the role of mechanical engineers in designing management systems which rely on technical writing to control operations and profits

teamwork tqm and re engineering require large writing groups expert in and committed to organizational decision making this volume focuses on how to conceptualize organize and implement the documents that serve as mediators in the transformation from task based to process based organizations

for about two decades say johnson and pace the discussion of how to address prose style in teaching college writing has been stuck with style standing in as a proxy for other stakes in the theory wars the traditional argument is evidently still quite persuasive to some that teaching style is mostly a matter of teaching generic conventions through repetition and practice such a position usually presumes the traditional view of composition as essentially a service course one without content of its own on the other side the shortcomings of this argument have been much discussed that it neglects invention revision context meaning even truth that it is not congruent with research that it ignores 100 years of scholarship establishing composition s intellectual territory beyond service the discussion is stuck there and all sides have been giving it a rest in recent scholarship yet style remains of vital practical interest to the field because everyone has to teach it one way or another a consequence of the impasse is that a theory of style itself has not been well articulated johnson and pace suggest that moving the field toward a better consensus will require establishing style as a clearer subject of inquiry accordingly this collection takes up a comprehensive study of the subject part i explores the recent history of composition studies the ways it has figured and all but effaced the whole question of prose style part ii takes to heart elbow s suggestion that composition and literature particularly as conceptualized in the context of creative writing courses have something to learn from each other part iii sketches practical classroom procedures for heightening students abilities to engage style and part iv explores new theoretical frameworks for defining this vital and much neglected territory the hope of the essays here focusing as they do on historical aesthetic practical and theoretical issues is to awaken composition studies to the possibilities of style and in turn to rejuvenate a great many classrooms
