the lives and aspirations of young chinese those between 14 and 26 years old have been transformed in the past five decades by examining youth cultures around three historical points 1968 1988 and 2008 this book argues that present day youth culture in china has both international and local roots paul clark describes how the red guards and the sent down youth of the cultural revolution era carved out a space for themselves asserting their distinctive identities despite tight political controls by the late 1980s chinese style rock music sports and other recreations began to influence the identities of chinese youth and in the twenty first century the internet offers a new broader space for expressing youthful fandom and frustrations from the 1960s to the present this book shows how youth culture has been reworked to serve the needs of the young chinese

this book explores the impact of globalisation and new technologies on youth cultures around the world from the birmingham school to the youthscape of south korea in a timely reappraisal of youth cultures in contemporary times this collection profiles the best of new research in youth studies written by leading scholars in the field

first published in 1995 youth cultures critically studies an anthropologically neglected population the youth the book broadens the scope for analysing young people s behaviour by moving away from notions of resistance and deviance and offers a range of ethnographically based studies of different kinds of youth in varied national contexts from nepal to canada europe the solomon islands and algeria it addresses issues relating to globalisation in third world cities ethnic diversity in european cities and consumption practices and places the lives of these young people in the contexts of wider cultures youth cultures contributes to the general concern in anthropology with rewriting culture even while it seeks to close particular gaps in studies on youth culture by challenging the limitation of previous youth research and acknowledging children and young adults as agents to be respected rather than objectified this book will be invaluable reading to students of anthropology sociology education psychology and cultural studies

what does it mean to be young in a country that is changing so fast what does it mean to be young in a place ruled by one party during a time of intense globalization and exposure to different cultures this fascinating and informative book explores the lives of chinese youth and examines their experiences the ways in which they are represented in the media and their interactions with old and especially new media the authors describe and analyze complex

entanglements among family school workplace and the state engaging with the multiplicity of chinese youth cultures their case studies include among others the romantic fantasies articulated by pop idols in tv dramas in contrast with young students working hard for their entrance exams and dream careers this book will be essential reading for students and scholars of youth culture the sociology of youth and china studies more broadly by showing how chinese youth negotiate these regimes by carving out their own temporary spaces from becoming a goldfarmer in a virtual economy to performing as a cosplayer this book ultimately poses the question will the current system be able to accommodate this rapidly increasing diversity

essay from the year 2014 in the subject cultural studies miscellaneous grade 75 a university of strathclyde language english abstract when the american director john hughes chose to open the credits of his 1985 film the breakfast club with following lyrics taken from david bowie s 1971 single changes his intention in doing so was to challenge the commonplace notions of youth plaguing 1980s teen culture in america and these children that you spit on as they try to change their worlds are immune to your consultations they re quite aware of what they re going through the film s troubled teenage protagonists exaggerated caricatures of rebellious youth who spend an entire saturday detention within a school library in atonement for their individual delinquencies begin their journey defined in the simplest terms and the most convenient definitions lavished upon them by their adult authorities bowie s lyrics were applied to the breakfast club by hughes in order to glamorize the notion of us versus them and youth isolation within the cultural landscape of 1980s america however these lyrics can also be aptly applied to the much discussed issue of youth culture within the british post war landscape although changes was not released until the early 1970s its lyrics effectively capture the tone of the previous two decades in britain decades in the throes of social and political change with a newly formed youth group who were becoming increasingly aware of that fact following the arrival of rock n roll in the late 1950s

british youths underwent a period of self realisation in the 1960s as music particularly rock n roll drove a wedge between teenagers and the parent culture effectively isolating them into their own unique cultural island the primary ambition of this essay therefore will be to assess the change implemented by music during these post war decades and whether it is possible to utilize music as a tool for effectively understanding youth culture and sub cultures although each decade could be argued to embody its own distinct mood effectively captured and echoed in its musical output this essay will hone its energies primarily towards studying the late 1950s and early 1960s in which a fizzy electrical storm of a radiant post war atmosphere was reflected and charged by its music
