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each topic in this 2 volume encyclopedia is discussed as it relates to the education of african americans the entries provide a comprehensive overview of educational institutions at every level from preschool through graduate and professional training

with special attention to historically and predominantly black colleges and universities the encyclopedia follows the struggle of african americans to achieve equality in education beginning among an enslaved population and evolving into the present as the efforts of many remarkable individuals furthered this cause through court decisions and legislation a unique appendix the complete bibliography of the journal of negro education 1932 2008 includes listings of the tables of contents and reprinted articles on segregation desegregation and equality key features highlights individuals organizations and publications that have had a significant impact on african american education incorporates discussions of curriculum concepts theories and alternative models of education that facilitate the learning process addresses the topics of gender and sexual orientation religion and the media key themes alternative educational models associations and organizations biographies collegiate education curriculum economics gender graduate and professional education historically black colleges and universities legal cases precollegiate education psychology and human development public policy publications religious institutions segregation desegregation the encyclopedia is valuable resource for students educators and scholars of education and all readers who seek an understanding of african american education both historically and in the 21st century

as part of a project on the status of african americans that was initiated by the william monroe institute for the study of black culture at the university of massachusetts at boston this volume takes a comprehensive look at the education of african americans specifically early childhood through postsecondary education and relevant public policy issues since 1940 the list of contributors to the study includes both white and black scholars who are affiliated with primarily urban institutions located in the northwest the south and on the east coast who are deeply committed to educational research by focusing on the known status of the education of african americans to date and the additional factors which need to be considered in order to develop appropriate educational strategies these essays evaluate current programs and provide recommendations for public policy improvements each essay addresses some aspect of the history of the education of african americans or the effectiveness of pertinent laws and policies enacted within the past fifty years trends in the educational advancement of blacks are clearly defined with particular focus on the forecasting of circumstances that could affect future progress topics ranging from counseling and guidance of minority children to the need for more black teachers and the continuing struggle with racial violence on campus demonstrate the broad scope of this volume suggestions for further reading on a specific topic appear in the list of references at the end of each chapter

james anderson critically reinterprets the history of southern black education from reconstruction to the great depression by placing black schooling within a political cultural and economic context he offers fresh insights into black commitment to education the peculiar significance of tuskegee institute and the conflicting goals of various philanthropic groups among other matters initially ex slaves attempted to create an educational system that would support and extend their emancipation but their children were pushed into a system of industrial education that presupposed black political and economic subordination this conception of education and social order supported by northern industrial philanthropists some black educators and most southern school officials conflicted with the aspirations of ex slaves and their descendants resulting at the turn of the century in a bitter national debate over the purposes of black education because blacks lacked economic and political power white elites were able to control the structure and content of black elementary secondary normal and college education during the first third of the twentieth century nonetheless blacks persisted in their struggle to develop an educational system in accordance with their own needs and desires

undoubtedly the most influential black intellectual of the twentieth century and one of america s finest historians w e b dubois knew that the liberation of the african american people required liberal education and not vocational training he saw education as a process of teaching certain timeless values moderation an avoidance of luxury a concern for courtesy a capacity to endure a nurturing love for beauty at the same time dubois saw education as fundamentally subversive this was as much a function of the well established role of education from plato forward as the realities of the social order under which he lived he insistently calls for great energy and initiative for african americans controlling their own lives and for continued experimentation and innovation while keeping education s fundamentally radical nature in view though containing speeches written nearly one hundred years ago and on a subject that has seen more stormy debate and demagoguery than almost any other in recent history the education of black people approaches education with a timelessness and timeliness at once rooted in classical thought that reflects a remarkably fresh and contemporary relevance

this book presents a discussion of the contributions made by african americans to public and private black schools in the usa in the 19th and 20th centuries it suggests that cultural capital from african american communities may be important for closing the gap in the funding of black schools in the 21st century

the african american heritage is interwoven throughout the history of the united states but few educators are prepared to teach children about the events that shaped the african american experience most of the stories about slavery the days when it was illegal to teach black children to read and when blacks were not allowed to vote or own land are part of the remembered oral history of black families morgan retells american history from the point of view of the events that effected blacks the great depression the wpa and the federal policies that led to current head start programs school integration in the 1950s and the civil rights movement in the 1960s the war on poverty and the iq controversy he shows how aesop and the teachings of socrates and aristotle established the philosophical traditions perpetuated by the great black educators w e b dubois and booker t washington with the purpose of providing black children with a better understanding of their heritage their importance in american history and their place in the world

the most influential work by the father of black history reflecting the long standing tradition of antiracist teaching pioneered by black educators a penguin classic the mis education of the negro 1933 is woodson s most popular classic work of black social criticism drawing on history theory and memoir as both student and teacher woodson witnessed distortions of black life in the history and literature taught in schools and universities he identified a relationship between these distortions in curriculum and the violence circumscribing black life in the material world declaring there would be no lynching if it did not start in the schoolroom woodson s primary focus was the impact dominant modes of schooling had on black youth this systematic process of mis education undermined black people s struggles for freedom and justice and it was an experience that scholars before and after woodson recognized and worked to challenge woodson argued that students teachers and leaders needed to be educated in a manner that was accountable to black experiences and lived realities both past and present this edition includes an appendix of selected letters and articles by woodson and suggestions for further reading

collection of essays on the role of education in the newly independent states of africa and in vietnam the caribbean and the united states

in teaching equality adam fairclough provides an overview of the enormous contributions made by african american teachers to the black freedom movement in the united states beginning with the close of the civil war when the efforts of the slave regime to prevent black literacy meant that blacks associated education with liberation fairclough explores the development of educational ideals in the black community up through the years of the civil rights movement he traces black educators connection to the white community and examines the difficult compromises they had to make in order to secure schools and funding teachers did not he argues sell out the black community but instead instilled hope and commitment to equality in the minds of their pupils defining the term teacher broadly to include any person who taught students whether in a backwoods cabin or the brick halls of a university fairclough illustrates the multifaceted responsibilities of individuals who were community leaders and frontline activists as well as conveyors of knowledge he reveals the complicated lives of these educators who in the face of a prejudice based social order and a history of oppression sustained and inspired the minds and hearts of generations of black americans

how do race and class intersect to shape the identities and experiences of black middle class parents and their children what are black middle class parents strategies for supporting their children through school what role do the educational histories of black middle class parents play in their decision making about their children s education there is now an extensive body of research on the educational strategies of the white middle classes but a silence exists around the emergence of the black middle classes and their experiences priorities and actions in relation to education this book focuses on middle class families of black caribbean heritage drawing on rich qualitative data from nearly 80 in depth interviews with black caribbean middle class parents the internationally renowned contributors reveal how these parents attempt to navigate their children successfully through the school system and defend them against low expectations and other manifestations of discrimination chapters identify when how and to what extent parents deploy the financial cultural and social resources available to them as professional middle class individuals in support of their children s academic success and emotional well being the book sheds light on the complex and relatively neglected relations between race social class and education and in addition poses wider questions about the experiences of social mobility and the intersection of race and class in forming the identity of the parents and their children the colour of class the educational strategies of the black middle classes will appeal to undergraduates and postgraduates on education sociology and social policy courses as well as academics with an interest in critical race theory and bourdieu the colour of class was awarded 2nd prize by the society for educational studies book prize 2016

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
