now in an affordable edition a splendid pageant of the animal kingdom as the middle ages saw it as the 587 colorful images in this magnificent volume reveal animals were a constant and delightful presence in illuminated manuscripts throughout the middle ages they were illustrated not only in bestiaries the compendiums of animal fact and fable that were exceedingly popular in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries but in every sort of manuscript sacred and profane from the gospels to the romance of the rose this book is arranged in manner of a proper bestiary with essays on the medieval lore and iconography of one hundred creatures alphabetized by their latin names from the alauda or lark whose morning song was thought to be a hymn to creation to the vultur whose taste for carrion made it a symbol of the sinner who indulges in worldly pleasures the selection includes a number of creatures that would now be considered fantastic including

the griffin the manticore and of course the fabled unicorn

taking darwin s publication of origin of species as a significant point of departure it discusses such key authors as hardy lawrence kipling wells orwell and others arguing that the variety and richness of this literature represents a revival in the fortunes of bestiary literature

the photographs in this volume show the incomparable richness of the pharaonic fauna in all forms of artistic expression painting sculpture relief carving architectural ornamentation and even in hieroglyphs ranging from astonishing realism in the depiction of birds and beasts both wild and domesticated with which the people of the Nile valley came into daily contact to hieratic stylization in portraying the pantheon of animal headed gods and the sacred and fabulous creatures that inhabited the ancient Egyptians devotional funerary and magic world

this sourcebook serves both as an introduction and a wide ranging reference work for human attitudes to nonhuman animals in latin europe during the middle ages under twelve headings it includes numerous translated passages from latin and vernacular texts that reflect human conceptions and uses of other animals during the period 300 1520 theologians philosophers encyclopaedists bestiaries hagiographers chroniclers huntsmen and writers of agricultural manuals cookbooks and plague treatises all had something to say about the place of nonhuman animals in their world and their interaction with humans or simply recorded incidentally what they did in their writings all are represented here

from the familiar to the improbable the gross to the endearing the modern bestiary is a compendium of curious creatures it includes both animals that have made headlines and those you ve probably never heard of such as skin eating caecilians

harp sponges or zombie worms also known as bone eating snout flowers arranged by elements earth water air the modern bestiary contains well known species told from new unexpected angles rats that drive cars fish that communicate by passing wind as well as stranger and lesser known creatures including carnivorous mice that howl at the moon cross dressing cuttlefish and antechinuses small marsupials that literally mate themselves to death finally there are the aliens on earth the incredible the surreal the magical such as tardigrades tongue eating lice and immortal jellyfish creatures so astonishing that they make unicorns look rather commonplace written by a zoologist with a flair for storytelling this is a fascinating celebration of the animal kingdom

from the bestiaries in the collections of the british library ann payne has culled wonderful illustrations she has linked them with a sampling of the poetry the folk wisdom and the romantic imagination of the formative years of western civilization the antioch review

the bestiary is a book of animals the second family bestiary is the most important version this study addresses the work's purpose and audience it includes a critical edition and new english translation and a catalogue raisonne of the manuscripts

what strange transactions take place in the mobile spaces between loci how does the flow of forces between fixed points enliven texts suggest new connections and map out the dizzying motion of myriad interactions the essays in this volume were first presented at the 2014 new chaucer society congress in reykjavik iceland where a meeting of minds in a shared intermediate space initiated dialogue from diverse perspectives and wended its way through the invisible spaces between concrete categories objects and entities the resulting volume asks a core question what can we learn by tarrying at the nexus points and hubs through which things move in and out of texts attempting to trace not the things themselves or their supposedly stable significations but rather their forms of emergence and retreat of disorder and disequilibrium the answer is complex and intermediate for we ourselves are emerging and retreating within our own systems of transit and experiencing our own disequilibrium scholarship like transit is never complete and yet never congeals into inertia through the manifold explorations of the dynamic transit transports scapes and flows found within literary and chaucerian thought worlds new vistas of motion and motivation emerge following john urry's mobile sociology the volume advances the notion that we can no longer view either social worlds or textual worlds as uniform surfaces upon which one can trace or write a history of the horizontal movements of humans and human mentalities rather everything is in constant motion objects images information ideas and mobility is thus also vertical involving human and non human actants the essays in this volume consider then how medieval literary texts in chaucer's period rewrap time and space by the means of sophisticated transit and transport structures which might be traced within specific works but also across works such as in text networks motive entities within literature twist and turn interact and collide and

a redefinition of the animal s relationship to sound and language in french texts from medieval england the barks hoots and howls of animals and birds pierce through the experience of medieval texts in captivating episodes of communication between species a mandrake shrieks when uprooted from the ground a saint preaches to the animals and a cuckoo causes turmoil at the parliament of birds with his familiar call this book considers a range of such episodes in old french verse texts including bestiaries treatises on language the life of saint francis of assisi and the fables by marie de france aiming to reconceptualize and reinterpret animal soundscapes it argues that they draw on sound to produce competing perspectives forms of life and linguistic subjectivities suggesting that humans owe more to animal sounds than we are disposed to believe texts inviting readers to listen and learn animal noises to seek spiritual consolation in the jargon of birds or to identify with the speaking wolf create the conditions for an assertion of human exceptionalism even as they simultaneously invite readers to question such forms of control by asking what it means for an animal to cry make noise or speak in french this book provides an important resource for theorizing sound and animality in multilingual medieval contexts and for understanding the animal s role in the interpretation of the natural world

the third edition of the beast within has been updated throughout to include current scholarship new discussion of definitions and fresh perspectives on critical animal theory that places animals rather than humans at the center of the discourse organized thematically salisbury incorporates many new sections and subsections to reveal the multifaceted history of the relationship between humans and animals domestication animal diseases and pandemics dogfights cockfights islamic dietary restrictions menageries and zoos and animals as entertainers to show how modern concerns have been informed by medieval precedents sections have been expanded to uncover medieval understandings of animal sexuality animals before the law and vegetarianism and modern fake meat the logical narrative concludes with chapters on animals as humans and humans as animals demonstrating that the lines between humans and animals have become increasingly blurred from the fourth to the twenty first century with an interdisciplinary approach that discusses humans and animals in relation to domestication symbolism science law religion food and diet sexuality and entertainment the beast within is an essential resource for all students of animal history literature and art in the middle ages

cartoonists and animators have given animals human characteristics for so long that audiences are now accustomed to seeing bugs bunny singing opera and mickey mouse walking his dog pluto the animated bestiary critically evaluates the depiction of animals in cartoons and animation more generally paul wells argues that artists use animals to engage with issues that would be more difficult to address directly because of political religious or social taboos consequently and principally through anthropomorphism animation uses animals to play out a performance of gender sex and sexuality racial and national traits and shifting identity often challenging how we think about ourselves wells draws on a wide range of examples from the original king kong to nick park's chicken run to disney cartoons such as tarzan the jungle book and brother bear to reflect on people by looking at the ways in which they respond to animals in cartoons and films

bestiary is a compendium of animals or birds real or mythical with a description of their habits and appearance this book seeks to build on the traditions of the medieval bestiary and considers the unique animals of the alberta mountains and foothills

taking its cue from medieval bestiaries this alphabet book is composed of 63 entries ranging from adder to wolfhounds with each entry juxtaposing an image an excerpt from a story by alice munro and a commentary the images are reproduced from original medieval illuminations the excerpts feature an animal or a human being depicted through animal comparison and the commentaries highlight the way munro suggests relationality between the human and the non human munro troubles the boundaries between good and evil as she troubles the boundaries between human and non human through the mask of the animal she effects a release from strict morality and proposes an uncommon and undomesticated

representation of human life revolving on simultaneous transcendence and derision the volume will appeal to munro scholars and to lovers of alice munro alike because it solves some of the enigmas set by her stories but suggests other riddles and more secrets
