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many western philosophers are poorly informed about the issues involved in nonduality since this topic is usually associated with various kinds of absolute idealism in the west or mystical traditions in the east increasingly however this topic is finding its way into western philosophical debates in this scholarly but leisurely and very readable spectrum review analysis of the philosophies of nondualism of hindu vedanta mahayana buddhism and taoism loy extracts what he calls a core doctrine of nonduality of seer and seen from these three worldviews and then applies the doctrine in various ways including a critique of derrida s deconstructionism

one of western buddhism s most sophisticated thinkers on one of buddhism s most central topics the concept of nonduality lies at the very heart of mahayana buddhism in the west it s usually associated with various kinds of absolute idealism in the west or mystical traditions in the east and as a result many modern philosophers are poorly informed on the topic increasingly however nonduality is finding its way into western philosophical debates in this scholarly but leisurely and very readable spectrum review analysis of the philosophies of nondualism of hindu vedanta mahayana buddhism and taoism renowned thinker david r loy extracts what he calls a core doctrine of nonduality loy clarifies this easily misunderstood topic with thorough subtle and understandable analysis previously published as nonduality by humanity books

the time has come for nondualism as a fundamentally unifying concept nondualism may seem out of place in an age of rising nationalism and bitter deglobalization but our current debates over tribalism and universalism all grant nondualism an informative relevance nondualism rejects both separation and identity thereby encouraging unity in difference yet nondualism as a word occupies a large semantic field nondual theists advocate the unity of humankind and god while nondual atheists advocate the inseparability of all persons without reference to a divinity ecological nondualism asserts that we are in nature and nature is in us while monistic nondualists assert that only god exists and all difference is illusion edited by jon paul sydnor and anthony watson and guided by scholars from different religions and specializations nondualism an interreligious exploration explores the

semantic field that nondualism occupies the collection elicits the expansive potential of the concept clarifies agreement and disagreement and considers current applications in every case nondualism is universal in its relevance yet always distinctive in its contribution

all lineages of tibetan buddhism today claim allegiance to the philosophy of the middle way the exposition of emptiness propounded by the second century indian master nagarjuna but not everyone interprets it the same way a major faultline runs through tibetan buddhism around the interpretation of what are called the two truths the deceptive truth of conventional appearances and the ultimate truth of emptiness an understanding of this faultline illuminates the beliefs that separate the gelug descendents of tsongkhapa from contemporary dzogchen and mahamudra adherents the two truths debate digs into the debate of how the two truths are defined and how they are related by looking at two figures one on either side of the faultline and shows how their philosophical positions have dramatic implications for how one approaches buddhist practice and how one understands enlightenment itself

zurchungpa's eighty chapters of personal advice was the final teaching given by the great nyingma master zurchung sherab trakpa before he passed away his counsels are the distillation of a lifetime's experience and comprise the practical instructions of a master who had made the teachings of the great perfection truly part of himself the original text consists of almost 580 maxims organized into eighty chapters covering the entire path of dzogchen from fundamental teachings on devotion and renunciation through to a whole series of pith instructions that bring the dzogchen view to life much of the meaning of these pithy

often cryptic instructions could be lost on the reader without the help of the notes shechen gyaltsap rinpoche provided in his annotated edition which he based on the explanations he received from his own teacher jamyang khyentse wangpo this book contains a complete detailed teaching on zurchungpa's text by dilgo khyentse rinpoche based on shechen gyaltsap's notes originally intended as essential instructions for a group of practitioners in three year retreat it will undoubtedly serve as an indispensable guide to anyone who seriously wishes to practice the great perfection zurchung sherab trakpa 1014 1074 was a key teacher in the zur tradition one of the handful of kama lineages through which the teachings of the ancient tradition were transmitted from master to disciple beginning with guru padmasambhava and vimalamitra right down to the nyingma masters of the present day he was a learned scholar and accomplished meditation master who spent many years in retreat practicing the teachings of the great perfection shechen gyaltsap rinpoche 1871 1926 was an important disciple of jamyang khyentse wangpo the great and one of dilgo khyentse rinpoche's root teachers an accomplished meditator he was also one of the most respected scholars of his day whose writings fill thirteen volumes

beginning with a discussion of life in a zen buddhist monastery nobel peace prize nominee thich nhat hanh provides a thorough overview of zen practice offering readers a clear explanation of the central elements of zen practice and philosophy and illustrating the character of zen as practiced in vietnam

taigu ryokan 1758 1831 remains one of the most popular figures in japanese buddhist history despite his religious and artistic sophistication he excelled in scriptural studies in calligraphy and in poetry ryokan referred to himself as great fool refusing to place himself within any established religious institution in contrast to zen masters of his time who presided over large monasteries trained students or produced recondite treatises ryokan followed a life of mendicancy in the countryside instead of delivering sermons he expressed himself through kanshi poems composed in classical chinese and waka poems in japanese syllabary and could typically be found playing with the village children in the course of his daily rounds of begging great fool is the first study in a western language to offer a comprehensive picture of the legendary poet monk and his oeuvre it includes not only an extensive collection of the master's kanshi topically arranged to facilitate an

appreciation of ryokan s colorful world but selections of his waka essays and letters the volume also presents for the first time in english the ryokan zenji kiwa curious accounts of the zen master ryokan a firsthand source composed by a former student less than sixteen years after ryokan s death consisting of anecdotes and episodes sketches from ryokan s everyday life the curious accounts is invaluable for showing how ryokan was understood and remembered by his contemporaries to further assist the reader three introductory essays approach ryokan from the diverse perspectives of his personal history and literary work
