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can we do without religion can we have ethics without god is there such thing as atheistic spirituality in this powerful book the internationally bestselling author andré comte sponville presents a philosophical exploration of atheism and reaches startling conclusions atheists comte sponville argues are no less interested in a spiritual life than religious believers but by allowing the concept of spirituality to become intertwined with religion and dogma humanity has lost touch with the nature of a true spiritual existence using rigorous reasoned arguments and clear concise and often humorous prose comte sponville draws on both eastern and western philosophical traditions to propose the atheistic alternative to religion based on the human need to connect to each other and to the universe in doing so he offers a convincing treatise on a new form of spiritual life

prose 2020 single volume reference finalist philosophers throughout history have debated the existence of gods but it is only in recent years that the absence of such a belief has become a significant topic of philosophical analysis in particular for philosophers of religion although it is difficult to trace the historical contours of atheism as the lack of belief in a higher power the reasoned reflective and thoughtful rejection of theism has become commonplace in many modern intellectual circles including academic philosophy where disciplinary data indicates that a large majority of philosophers self identify as atheists as the first book of its kind to bring together a collection of writing on the philosophical aspects of atheism both historical and contemporary the companion to atheism and philosophy stages an explicit constructive and comprehensive conversation between philosophy and atheism to examine the ways in which atheist thought intersects with ideas and positions from a variety of philosophical and theological sub disciplines the companion begins by addressing the foundational questions and lingering controversies which underpin philosophical thought about atheism exploring the implications of major developments in the history of philosophy for the modern atheistic worldview divided into eight distinct sections essays consider a range of thinkers who were widely believed to have been atheists including david hume mary wollstonecraft karl marx and elizabeth cady stanton and survey different kinds of objections to theism and atheism including logical evidential normative and prudential later chapters trace the relationship between atheism and metaphysics epistemology ethics and political philosophy oriented around topics such as pragmatism postmodernism freedom education violence and happiness deftly curated and thoughtfully composed a companion to atheism and philosophy is the most ambitious and authoritative account of philosophical thinking on atheism available and is a first rate resource for academics professionals and students of philosophy religious studies and theology

hurray for michael palmer is how michael martin the distinguished american philosopher greeted palmer's the atheist's primer lutterworth 2012 atheism for beginners by providing a coursebook for schools and colleges differs from its predecessor in being designed specifically for teachers and their students yet although different in focus and format the intention remains the same to reinstate the importance of philosophy within the debate about god's existence and to act as a corrective to the largely darwinian criticisms levelled against religious belief by richard dawkins and the so called new atheists so in palmer's lively history of atheism extending from the ancient greeks to the present day we meet the enduring philosophical arguments against god and the great literature in which they are expressed atheism for beginners is user friendly and presumes no

special grounding in philosophy throughout assistance is given by numerous aids to learning there are exercises marginal notes essay questions bibliographies and a glossary also provided are fourteen short biographies of famous atheists in these respects palmer follows the format first presented in his widely read moral problems of 1991 long established as a core text in the teaching of philosophy in atheism for beginners palmer covers the main atheistic arguments discussing issues such as creation morality evil miracles and the motivations of belief particular attention is paid to the work of hume marx nietzsche and freud with a special chapter devoted to the development of disproof atheism atheism is often criticized for being unduly pessimistic that without god there is nothing to look forward to no life after death no final righting of wrongs and no hope of salvation but this palmer argues is a slander against the atheistic outlook he concludes therefore on a positive note explaining that happiness and personal fulfilment are to be found in the very materialism that religious belief rejects

discover atheism is very easy to define it is the belief that there is neither god nor the gods from now we will just talk about belief in god but the arguments in this book are equally applicable to the monotheistic and polytheistic religions however many think that atheists believe that there is no god no morality or that there is no god nor the meaning of life or again neither god nor human goodness as we shall see there is nothing to stop the atheist believe in morality the meaning of life or human goodness atheism is only the truly negative when it comes to believing in god it

a comprehensive biography of the treatise of the three impostors a controversial nonexistent medieval book like a lot of good stories this one begins with a rumor in 1239 pope gregory ix accused frederick ii the holy roman emperor of heresy without disclosing evidence of any kind gregory announced that frederick had written a supremely blasphemous book de tribus impostoribus or the treatise of the three impostors in which frederick denounced moses jesus and muhammad as impostors of course frederick denied the charge and over the following centuries the story played out across europe with libertines freethinkers and other strong minds seeking a copy of the scandalous text the fascination persisted until finally in the eighteenth century someone brought the purported work into actual existence in not one but two versions latin and french although historians have debated the origins and influences of this nonexistent book there has not been a comprehensive biography of the treatise of the three impostors in the atheist s bible the eminent historian georges minois tracks the course of the book from its origins in 1239 to its most salient episodes in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries introducing readers to the colorful individuals obsessed with

possessing the legendary work and the equally obsessive passion of those who wanted to punish people who sought it minois s compelling account sheds much needed light on the power of atheism the threat of blasphemy and the persistence of free thought during a time when the outspoken risked being burned at the stake

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
