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paul randolph applies philosophy and psychology to the practice of mediating between people in conflict this practical guide with a foreword by nobel laureate archbishop desmond tutu will assist those interested in conflict resolution to better understand the psychological processes of parties in conflict and mediation as randolph argues psychology is increasingly perceived by lawyers as a vital tool for resolving conflicts in the litigation environment whether in commercial family community or employment disputes with an ever growing demand for mediators across international borders the psychologically informed mediator can also provide much needed facilitation in global trade and peace negotiations as well as being invaluable in helping to resolve a variety of political and international conflicts

small group research is of particularly wide interest to people working in a fairly broad variety of areas concerned with understanding conflict especially for practitioners and researchers concerned with conflict resolution peace and related areas the editors will focus on six main topical areas of small group research which include cooperation competition and conflict resolution coalitions bargaining and games group dynamics and social cognition the group and organization team performance intergroup relations

this is a powerful resource for anyone who wants to understand the nature of interpersonal conflict to study it understand why it s a consistent part of human history and perhaps avert it in their own lives why does conflict surround us in everyday life from spats between individuals to major conflicts involving large groups is conflict inevitable why are conflicts and differences of opinion often so hard to resolve blowing up the psychology of conflict focuses on interpersonal conflict and the ways that this level of conflict can move beyond the original relationship to permeate larger constructs small groups large groups whole organizations and even entire nations by examining both the positive and negative consequences of conflict and by documenting its existence as normal and common readers can appreciate how conflict does not immediately equate to negative feelings and how it also can be useful in creating rules and laws aiding in negotiation and bringing people together to work toward a common goal this clear and accessibly written book in greenwood s psychology of everyday life series provides students with an understanding of the important role conflict plays in our lives the many forms conflict may take and the ways that conflict can actually be constructive and useful as well as destructive to relationships discussions and groups the historical overview of

established theories and the study of conflict to date provides readers with invaluable perspective into the subject by identifying and analyzing specific conflicts including well publicized conflicts in foreign countries the book also charts conflict throughout the life cycle to help students identify the reasons for conflicts that occur in their own lives with parents friends siblings employers romantic partners and people in authority

the area of intergroup relations and social conflict has once again become a major focus of social psychological theorizing and research one of the consequences of this advance in knowledge is that social psychologists have increasingly been called upon to apply their ideas in order to advise on existing conflicts the significant contribution of this book is the way it builds on the research and theory of intergroup conflict and then applies this knowledge to the field the areas discussed include industrial conflicts interethnic conflicts and intergroup conflicts the chapters range from reports of experimental laboratory research through field studies to theoretical conceptual contributions the new advances offered by this broad spectrum of topics will be of interest not only to social psychologists but also to sociologists and political scientists

it was just over 12 years ago that we first sat down together to talk about psychological traps in the relative calm of late afternoons feet draped casually over the seedy furnishings of the tufts psychology department we entertained each other with personal anecdotes about old cars times spent lost on hold and the shakespearean concerns of rosenkrantz and guildenstern lord and lady macbeth and other notables eventually informed by our many illustrations and the excitement that their repeated telling engendered in the two of us we began to move more formally into trap analysis how do you know a trap when you see one what are the shared characteristics of all psychological traps regardless of origin scope or

complexity what are the key conceptual elements in any effort to differentiate among the traps of the world what factors make us more or less apt to fall prey to entrapment these were some of the questions that arose during these initial meetings a series of weekly meetings stretched over the ensuing years interrupted temporarily by various exigencies and led eventually to a research program that grew to involve a number of students and faculty colleagues at the time of course we did not regard our work as a research program rather even as our experiments proceeded to answer two burning questions at a time they managed to raise three or four new issues that we had not anticipated before

emphasises the underlying ideas and intellectual debates in social psychology

this book offers an informative scholarly yet readable overview of recent advances in research on the nature antecedents management and consequences of interpersonal and intergroup conflict and aggression

this book is about conflict resolution through mediation from a psychological perspective although written in part from the point of view of litigation the objective is to demonstrate how an appreciation of the psychological aspects of conflict and an understanding of the emotional strategies people adopt in dispute situations can assist both lawyers and non lawyers in resolving conflicts the book consists of three sections a theoretical analysis of conflict and conflict resolution a practical legal and experiential explanation of mediation and thirdly a series of mock mediations comprehensively analysed from the viewpoint of the mediator and the parties providing tips and guidance on the dilemmas and pitfalls that mediators encounter the book is based on three fundamental tenets that conflict is ever present and cannot be eliminated but can be worked with that the attitude and stance of the mediator towards the dispute can be of significance to the outcome and above all that the use of psychotherapeutic tools can facilitate a paradigm shift in the parties approach to conflict the authors demonstrate how the mediator can move parties in dispute from a position of intransigent adversity to a working alliance and thereby achieve a good enough resolution

for the most part groups and nations have blamed competition for scarce and coveted resources as an important source of conflict claiming that resolution depends on mutual agreement concerning how to divide these resources the present volume focuses on the removal of psychological barriers e g lack of trust feelings of victimization perceived lack of

power as a way to end conflict social psychology is uniquely equipped both theoretically and methodologically to deal with this challenge

originally published in 1966 the author challenges the accepted theories of group conflict of the time such as frustration and maladjustment for him conflict and its accompanying aggressiveness are features of interaction between groups and he supports this theory with a detailed experimental study of controlled groups at the time of publication dr otto klineberg director of the international centre for intergroup relations at the sorbonne wrote social scientists everywhere owe a great debt of gratitude to professor sherif the distinguished series of publications for which he and his co workers are responsible have an honoured place in our libraries in particular his contributions to the field of intergroup relations are outstanding his concept of superordinate goals based on a combination of theoretical insight and brilliant experimentation has become a household word for those concerned with this significant problem in his new volume group conflict and co operation he carries his analysis much further not only describing the results of several original investigations but also building a theoretical appraisal of an extensive research literature the author has made still another significant contribution toward a better understanding of one of the most complex and disturbing phenomena of our time

shalit draws on the research he conducted as field psychologist in the israeli military to offer an original behavioral model of combat that accounts for the fighting potential of an individual or group his model is based on the appraisal process that the individual undertakes in combat conditions to assess a situation whether it concerns him or not and regardless of his role it is through this process that the individual makes a judgment taking into consideration his past experience knowledge and expectations that in turn leads to a course of action shalit pinpoints and describes specific aspects of the psychology of combat and conflict including the motivation to act in combat with special reference to the aggression drive the definition of an enemy and the effects such appraisals have on behavior the situational factors in heroic acts and discipline and its affects on combat efficiency

conflict is inherent in virtually every aspect of human relations from sport to parliamentary democracy from fashion in the arts to paradigmatic challenges in the sciences and from economic activity to intimate relationships yet it can become among the most serious social problems humans face when it loses its constructive features and becomes protracted over

time with no obvious means of resolution this book addresses the subject of intractable social conflict from a new vantage point here these types of conflict represent self organizing phenomena emerging quite naturally from the ongoing dynamics in human interaction at any scale from the interpersonal to the international using the universal language and computational framework of nonlinear dynamical systems theory in combination with recent insights from social psychology intractable conflict is understood as a system locked in special attractor states that constrain the thoughts and actions of the parties to the conflict the emergence and maintenance of attractors for conflict can be described by means of formal models that incorporate the results of computer simulations experiments field research and archival analyses multi disciplinary research reflecting these approaches provides encouraging support for the dynamical systems perspective importantly this text presents new views on conflict resolution in contrast to traditional approaches that tend to focus on basic short lived cause effect relations the dynamical perspective emphasizes the temporal patterns and potential for emergence in destructive relations attractor deconstruction entails restoring complexity to a conflict scenario by isolating elements or changing the feedback loops among them the creation of a latent attractor trades on the tendency toward multi stability in dynamical systems and entails the consolidation of incongruent positive elements into a coherent structure in the bifurcation scenario factors are identified that can change the number and types of attractors in a conflict scenario the implementation of these strategies may hold the key to unlocking intractable conflict creating the potential for constructive social relations

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
