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a powerful and important book that explains the epidemic rise and complex underlying causes of youth violence and opens a discussion on strategies to protect our children from physical and emotional harm our children are our future yet every day new reports come in describing violent assaults against youths or dramatic increases in gang recruitment of teens or the terrible hostile environments children are forced to grow up in teen violence in america is a careful examination of the causes of this epidemic rise in youth violence but more than that it opens a discussion on strategies that have been proven most effective for protecting our children from physical and emotional harm each of us has a responsibility to do all we can to ensure that children are raised happy healthy and emotionally whole change is needed as is a renewed commitment to our youth and the only way that can happen is if we understand the dangers our children face in their daily lives teen violence in america identifies those circumstances that place youths at risk for violent behavior what ignites this predilection into violent action and identifies strategies that can be employed to mitigate the damage and put them on a positive life track from family life to school environment and opportunities cultural and political influences drugs and gangs teen violence in america looks deeply into the different factors contributing to this epidemic

this compilation of original essays does more than just illuminate the serious problem of teen violence and victimization it also provides resources that parents and teachers can use to address issues of violence with their teens and make a difference while it's widely known that hate crimes represent a serious issue among today's adolescent population most parents and perhaps even some educators may be unaware that gender based violence is the most prevalent type of hate crime committed by and experienced by teens and that adolescent girls are exposed to more violence

than boys a complete understanding of the nature of the problem is fundamental to curtailing problems like cyberbullying and sexual harassment the psychology of teen violence and victimization is a two volume set that fills a gap in the current literature on teen violence by addressing the incidence psychological explanations and impact of all forms of teen violence the author a psychologist who has focused upon interpersonal problems centered on violence harassment and gender provides in depth discussion of the various types of violence committed by and against teens the set offers actionable prevention strategies for parents and teachers as well as individuals involved in community programs special attention is given to the impact of violence on adolescents emotional and physical health interpersonal relationships career development and self concept

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the complexities and tragedies arising from teen violence are problems faced on every continent in the world fourteen case studies of carefully selected countries representative of every region of the world are presented in this absorbing volume that is the first to examine the causes and possible solutions for the problem of teen violence around the world students and teachers can make cross cultural comparisons to discover how the problem is viewed in different countries how the problem is changing which factors seem to contribute to the rate of teen violence in almost all of the

countries and which are unique to specific countries readers can also take a fascinating look at the various solutions to the problem that have been proposed and tested throughout the world each chapter is divided into similar subsections so students can easily compare specific topics among different countries and cultures they will find that the perception of teen violence in different countries does not always reflect the reality they can discover how such factors as drug use family dynamics and educational settings play an important role in teen violence across many different cultures while also discovering the unique settings and situations that contribute to violence in unfamiliar cultures this world view will help build better understanding of how social issues affect all societies

adolescent violence in the home examines a form of violence that has a profound impact on families but is often overlooked and frequently misunderstood teen aggression and violence toward members of their family especially parents violence in adolescents is often seen as the result of a mental health diagnosis delinquency or as a response to dysfunctional parenting and though understanding a youth s mental health status or a parenting style can be helpful complete focus on either is misplaced adolescent violence in the home uses a restorative framework developed by the authors and in use in court systems and organizations around the world to situate violent behaviors in the context of power and the intergenerational cycle of violence readers will come away from this book with a profound understanding of the social and individual factors that lead youth to use violence and how adolescent violence affects parents and they ll also learn about a variety of interventions that specifically address teen violence against parents

review of the current knowledge concerning youth violence and gang behavior considers risk factors for violence and gang formation functions served by violence and gang membership and strategies that have been empirically validated to be either beneficial or ineffective following an introductory chapter the first chapter looks at the nature of aggression including risk factors associated with aggression and violence the function of violence and peer association and the development of violence and aggression the following chapter focuses on youth gangs including reasons for gang memberships and why schools cannot combat violence and gang activity alone a self study to help schools identify needs and resources is included next prevention and intervention programs are addressed with emphasis on empirically validated or promising programs the role of functional assessment of behavior and the student is then considered followed by some cautionary notes concerning grouping high risk students together for intervention use of highly punitive consequences for behavior and employing gang members or ex gang members to deter gang affiliation contains approximately 75 references db

teen violence can break out anywhere and at any time violent behavior in teens can include a wide range of behaviors including explosive temper tantrums date rape physical aggression school shootings suicide bullying fighting threats or attempts to hurt others including homicidal thoughts use of weapons cruelty toward animals fire setting and intentional destruction of property what are the risk factors violent behavior is experienced on an individual basis so it is difficult to pinpoint specific risk factors signs that suggest violent behavior is imminent include antisocial beliefs and behaviors use of drugs and alcohol gang involvement lack of commitment to school victim of teasing or bullying poor

anger management and conflict resolution skills and interpersonal problems the question of why teens become violent has been thoroughly researched and studied unfortunately pinpointing the exact causes of teen violence is complex some of the potential causes include teens tend to model behavior when teens see violence from family members at home from actors and actresses in the movies in video games they play in the form of gangs in their community from bullies at school and on the internet they are often inclined to replicate such behaviors this theory social learning theory suggests that most behaviors are learned through observation and modeling teens often have difficulty appropriately channeling their frustrations and lash out in anger these frustrations can include such factors as being bullied in school having a learning disability and not being able to do well in school feeling pressured by peers to do things they don t want to do experiencing pressure from parents to succeed teens often become enraged and seek revenge on those who bully or hurt them some teens tired of being bullied or abused simply lash out in revenge over the last century many different workbooks workshops and self help systems have been designed to help people explore ways of safely dealing with teen violence in the past twenty years many research studies have focused on the value of self reflection and journaling as a way of exploring personal characteristics identifying ineffective behaviors and examining thoughts and feelings that lead to these ineffective behaviors this book is unique in that it combines two powerful psychological tools designed to enhance domestic violence coping skills self assessment and journaling the teen violence workbook contains five separate sections that will help participants learn more about themselves as well as the impact of dating relationships and violence in their lives participants will develop an awareness of the violence that they are exposed to daily they will complete assessments and activities to help them explore the violence in their lives and develop strategies for coping with violence the sections in the book are types of violence scale helps individuals explore the types of abuse they are experiencing in their relationships these teen violence types include sexual abuse physical abuse verbal emotional abuse and financial abuse self empowerment signs scale helps individuals explore whether they

are empowered to avoid or reject violent acts dating violence scale helps individuals identify if they or their relationship partners possess harmful beliefs about dating relationships personal safety scale helps individuals examine how cautious they are being to remain safe in a violent society symptoms of dating violence scale helps individuals explore the signs related to violence and determine if they are experiencing violence in their life this book has been designed as a practical tool for helping professionals such as therapists school counselors psychologists guidance counselors teachers and group leaders depending on the role of the professional using the teen violence workbook and the specific group s needs these sections can be used individually

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
