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in the 1850s drapetomania was the medical term for a disease found among black slaves in the united states the main symptom was a

strange desire to run away from their masters in earlier centuries gout was understood as a metabolic disease of the affluent so much so that it became a badge of uppercrust honor and a medical excuse to avoid hard work today is there such a thing as mental illness or is mental illness just a myth is alzheimer s really a disease what is menopause a biological or a social construction historically one can see that health disease and illness are concepts that have been ever fluid modern science sociology philosophy even society among other factors constantly have these issues under microscopes learning more defining and redefining ever more exactly yet often that scrutiny instead of leading toward hard answers only leads to more questions health disease and illness brings together a sterling list of classic and contemporary thinkers to examine the history state and future of ever changing concepts in medicine divided into four parts historical discussions characterizing health disease and illness clinical applications of health and disease and normalcy genetic disease and enhancement the future of the concepts of health and disease the reader can see the evolutionary arc of medical concepts from the greek physician galen of pergamon ca 150 ce who proposed that the best doctor is also a philosopher to contemporary discussions of the genome and morality the editors have recognized a crucial need for a deeper integration of medicine and philosophy with each other particularly in an age of dynamically changing medical science and what it means medically philosophically to be human

health and illness are intensely personal matters it seems self evident that health is a basic necessity of the good life though it is often taken for granted illness on the other hand challenges our sense of security and may introduce acute anxiety into our lives health and illness in a changing society provides a lively and critical account of the impact of social change on the experience of health and illness it also examines the different sociological perspectives that have been used to analyse health matters while some of the ideas developed in the last twenty years remain relevant to social research in health today many are in need of urgent revision

both health care practitioners and health planners are beginning to recognize the importance of differences between lay and

professional concepts of health and illness the editors of this volume having themselves worked in this field for many years have selected and brought together writings by distinguished scholars from britain france the united states germany and poland what impresses most is the range of problems synthesized from a genuinely international and interdisciplinary perspective no reader can fail to be fascinated by the often peculiar ways in which different societies have tried to cope with the existential questions of health and illness

health and illness underpin our everyday existence health allows us to live full lives and to function as social beings illness disrupts our lives sometimes seriously but health not only affects individuals it also impacts upon society as a whole medical breakthroughs and scandals health scares and health service problems all vie for the attention of politicians and public alike michael bury provides a lively introduction to the sociology of health and illness for students approaching the topic for the first time drawing on classic writings and up to date research he discusses the conceptualization and patterning of health and illness in contemporary society he highlights a range of factors such as gender age ethnicity and class which influence the occurrence and distribution of illness over time the book then focuses on debates about the body the role of health services and the politics of health policy in conclusion bury argues that we must take a dynamic view of health and illness as processes that are shaped by social circumstances and altering perceptions this short introduction will be essential reading for all students studying the sociology of health as part of their degree programme

originally published in 1984 this book focuses firstly on how patients interpret and act in response to symptoms of illness secondly on how social and psychological factors influence the treatment process and thirdly on certain kinds of illness where the psychosocial perspective is of particular importance to the providers of health care for example chronic or particularly disabling illnesses it demonstrates how essential it is to bring an interdisciplinary perspective from the social and behavioural sciences to an understanding and interpretation of behaviour in relation to illness it will be of central concern to all health professionals in training and in practice and

to social scientists interested in health care

this reader brings together recent writing on health illness and health care in contemporary society it emphasizes the empirical nature of medical sociology and its relationship with the development of sociological theory

between sickness and health is about illness rather than disease and recovery rather than cure the book argues that illness is an experience represented by the feeling that i am not myself from the book s phenomenological point of view feelings of illness cannot be unreal or fake whatever their biological basis nor need they be categorised as physical psychosomatic or psychiatric the book challenges the disease centred ethos of medicine and medical education it demonstrates that a clearer conception of illness as distinct from disease is therapeutic the feeling that i am once again myself can return in some degree whatever state the body is in resilience becomes more available when it is seen as a set of personal skills that can be developed rather than as an inborn trait possibilities of wellness are enhanced by recognising that medical and other therapies can either support or impede recovery as can human relationships and the socio political environment the book s many clinical examples are drawn from the author s broad experience as a neurologist rehabilitation physician and systemic family therapist between sickness and health will be useful for students practitioners and academics and also for anyone who has been or might one day be ill

health and illness provides a comprehensive concise and accessible introduction to the topic presented in an attractive manner with relevant activities and exercises to ensure that students learning is as active as possible the activities which are a central feature of the book develop study skills such as essay writing note taking and responding to data stimulus questions

this timely study demonstrates how images of beauty and ugliness have constructed a visual history that records the artificial boundaries dividing healthy bodies from those that are ill gilman tells an excellent tale jewish chronicle

this new text explores the intricate relationships between health illness and families and the nurses s integral role in this system designed to help the nurse understand the development of families varied responses to illness stressors the book presents practical interventions needed to prevent and decrease stress during illness content focuses on the family as the essential resource in the treatment of illness and the promotion of wellness this text utilizes both a classic framework and an original model created by the authors

in recent years the study of illness as experienced by patients has emerged as an approach to understanding sickness descriptions of the everyday situations of people with particular diseases provide a commentary upon the nature of symptoms and upon the relation of the body to society this approach stresses the biographical and cultural contexts in which illness arises and is borne by individuals and those who care for them it emphasises the need to understand illness in terms of the patients own interpretation of its onset the course of its progress and the potential of the treatment for the condition worlds of illness examines people s experience of illness and their understanding of what it means to be healthy the contributors are the first to offer this biographic and cultural approach in one volume redefining the perspective further and drawing attention to its potential for questioning theoretical assumptions about health and illness

culture health and illness is an introduction to the role of cultural and social factors in health and disease showing how an understanding of these factors can improve medical care and health education the book demonstrates how different cultural social or ethnic groups explain the causes of ill health the types of treatment they believe in and to whom they would turn if they were ill it discusses the relationship of these beliefs and practices to the instance of certain diseases both physical and psychological this new edition has been extended and modernised with new material added to every chapter in addition there is a new chapter on new research methods in medical anthropology and the book is now illustrated where appropriate anyone intending to follow a career in medicine allied health nursing or counselling will benefit from reading this book at an early stage in their career

a comprehensive overview of the way bodily experiences of health and disease in everyday life are given meaning in a society dominated by the biomedical model of well being radley draws on studies from a variety of disciplines including medical sociology health psychology and medical anthropology by addressing the issues in this way he clarifies how the kind of research methodology adopted reveals different kinds of truths the book provides a valuable and critical introduction to the social and psychological consideration of health and illness furthermore given the increasing interest in user perspectives in health care provision it will be useful reading for all those interested in health promotion and how ideas of health and illness are constructed social sciences in health accounts of health and illness are identified and described drawing upon notions of stress willpower and personal autonomy upon explanatory frameworks such as the medical model health promotion and the socio politics of health and disease as well as theistic and traditional accounts

the chapters in this volume represent the psychological and sociological perspectives of health and illness the text is broadly divided into four sections health cognitions health care and health initiatives mental health and mental illness and health challenges the chapters in the first section discuss aspects related to illness severity health beliefs and illness representations the second section focusses on alternative health care systems health finance and sociological and psychological aspects of health care the third section deals with mental health care and social representation of mental health and illness the last section presents health challenges of specific groups this volume thus covers a wide spectrum of health issues theoretical standpoints and practical concerns it is expected that this volume will prove to be a good research resource for academics and health professionals who are interested in an interdisciplinary social scientific perspective

what is illness is it a physiological dysfunction a social label or a way of experiencing the world how do the physical social and emotional worlds of a person change when they become ill and can there be well being within illness in this remarkable and thought

provoking book havi carel explores these questions by weaving together the personal story of her own serious illness with insights and reflections drawn from her work as a philosopher carel s fresh approach to illness raises some uncomfortable questions about how we all whether healthcare professionals or not view the ill and challenges us to become more thoughtful illness unravels the tension between the universality of illness and its intensely private often lonely nature it offers a new way of looking at a matter that affects every one of us
