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the story of rama follows on from the stories of krishna part two and has been designed for elementary students the story of rama in 2 parts together relate in 16 episodes the story of the ramayana part one contains the first eight stories it begins with a revision of the grammar learned in the the stories of krishna books and then goes on to introduce the standard method of transliteration of the sanskrit script the gerund having done something various sanskrit idioms and the declension of the sanskrit word for that in all three genders the second part contains a revision of the grammar learned so far and then going on to cover in simple terms appropriate for

the level an introduction to the imperative mood other important noun and pronoun declensions having done something used with prefixes the part passive participle the conjugation of the middle voice and the verb to be in present future and past times and the completion of the standard method of transliterating sanskrit script

this is a detailed narrative based history of classical malay literature it covers a wide range of malay texts including folk literature the influence of the indian epics and shadow theatre panji tales the transition from hindu to muslim literary models muslim literature framed tales theological literature historical literature legal codes and the dominant forms of poetry the pantun and syair the author describes the background to each of these particular literary periods he engages in depth with specific texts their various manuscripts and their contents in so doing he draws attention to the historical complexity of tradisional malay society its worldviews and its place within the wider framework of human experience dr liaw s history of classical malay literature will be of benefit to beginning students of malay literature and to established scholars alike it can also be read with benefit by those with a wider interest in comparative literature and in southeast asian culture in general

a prose retelling of india s epic poem describing the good prince rama s triumph over the evil demon king ravana

the story of the ramayana intricately interwoven with mythologies legends and the supernatural bases upon events having taken place sometimes in the 8th century b c the lowest dateline determined by scholars it was in the state of kosala in east india that there flourished a king named dasharatha with his capital in ayodhya he was very pious truthful and righteous king in order to procure a successor he married three times with women named kausalya sumitra and kaikeyi in that order having failed to have a son from them he undertook a son begetting sacrifice resulting into births of rama to kausalya bharata to kaikeyi and the twins lakshmana and shatrughna to sumitra from the very beginning being the eldest son rama was groomed as the future king he was brave courageous and valorous person as well as truthful obedient and righteous son in an early age he killed several ferocious rakshasas belonging to a savage race comparable to demons rama won the hand of sita the daughter of king janaka of mithila by stringing a great celestial bow at the age twenty five he was to be consecrated as a crown prince however kaikaeyi mother of bharata played the spoiler as earlier she had been promised two boons by her husband she took that opportunity to get them fulfilled she secured crown for her son bharata and fourteen years of exile for rama in a forest reluctantly agreeing to kaikaeyi s dictates the king banished his beloved son but died out of grief rama left for the forest his wife sita and brother lakshmana accompanied him he spent his time

protecting the brahmanas and ascetics from the rakshasas in different forests and safeguarding their interests during the last year of their sojourn ravana the king of lanka and head of all the rakshasas abducted sita rama undertook journey to the southern state of kishkindha made friendship with sugriva the king of the vanara community by restoring his throne to him after killing his oppressive brother valin with the help of sugriva he was able to wage a war against ravana kill him and recover sita however for the fear of public opinion going against sita because of suspected violation of her chastity during her captivity by ravana rama was initially reluctant to take her back as a wife sita was required to undergo a trial by placing herself in the fire to prove her chastity although rama accepted her initially after her successful trial when he found later that the public opinion in ayodhya was against her he banished her into a forest sita took refuge in the hermitage of valmiki being already pregnant she delivered twin sons named kusha and lava there at an early age of twelve the two children sang ramayana as composed by valmiki in the streets of ayodhya and won a pardon for their mother not only by rama but also by the people however it was too late for sita she prayed the mother earth to take her in her lap and vanished into it after ruling for several more years and setting up a model system of administration still considered the ideal one rama finally took to heaven

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a re telling of the tale recounted in the ancient sanskrit poem the ramayana of prince rama of ayodhya and his wife sita exiled to the forest by a jealous stepmother and hounded by the demons who lived there this is a story of loyalty courage and bravery and the ability of love to overcome all suitable for children aged 4 and upwards the book is an exciting read at home story and an excellent educational resource to support the study of the festival of diwali

as the title indicates this book is a critical study of an indian epic ãthe ramayanaí it proceeds in the same order as that of sanskrit original consisting of bala kanda ayodhya kanda aranya kanda kishkindha kanda sundara kanda yuddha kanda and uttara kanda while valmikiís ramayana is composed of about 24 000 slokas verses ãramayana the poisonous treeí consists of 16 stories long and short accompanied by 11 ãlinksí narratives that ãlinkí the stories and 504 foot notes that show evidence from the sanskrit original in support of the critique besides the main components of the text this book has a long ãprefaceí discussing the social essence of the epic in the context of history of evolution of human society from the ancient times to the modern times the book also offers a critical review of the works of ãsome earlier critics of ramayanaí the authoress describes ramayana as a poisonous tree because it defends the autocratic rule of the kings against the people their imperial expansion

by invading other weak kingdoms exploitation of the poor by the rich oppression of lower castes by upper castes aggression of the civilized non tribal communities against primitive tribal communities male chauvinism against women superstitious beliefs against the rational thinking fathersí domination over sons elder brothersí superiority over younger brothers and so on she substantiated her arguments by providing hundreds of foot notes from the sanskrit original she characterizes the culture of ramayana as predominantly ěfeudalí in nature with an admixture of remnants of primitive ětribalí culture the book it is hoped will be of interest to both academic and non academic circles it is relevant to the students teachers and researchers who are connected with such disciplines as south asian studies cultural studies comparative literature comparative religions indology literary criticism and so on it is also relevant to the social and political activists who would like to disseminate ěprogressiveí ideas among the people who are subjected to various forms of inequality class caste gender race ethnicity rangamayakamma born 1939 is a writer of novels stories and essays in telugu she has published about 60 books
