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this volume presents a collection of articles centring on the language of the mishnah and the talmud the most important jewish texts after the bible which were compiled in palestine and babylonia in the latter centuries of late antiquity despite the fact that rabbinic hebrew has been the subject of growing academic interest across the past century very little scholarship has been written on it in english studies in rabbinic hebrew addresses this lacuna with eight lucid but technically rigorous articles written in english by a range of experienced scholars focusing on various aspects of rabbinic hebrew its phonology morphology syntax pragmatics and lexicon this volume is essential reading for students and scholars of rabbinic studies alike and constitutes the second in a new series studies in semitic languages and cultures in collaboration with the faculty of asian and middle eastern studies at the university of cambridge

this philological commentary offers students a gateway to knowledge of mishnaic hebrew through study of *pirke avoth* it has enabled generations of students to unlock with less pain and increased incentive the language of the rabbis as well as their mode of thinking and of operating students can use it to study on their own and it is equally effective as a textbook or supplement in the classroom the commentary covers differences between biblical and mishnaic hebrew helpful for students with some hebrew background as well as common idioms in rabbinic literature

in greek and roman palestine we find a hebrew dialect that had existed alongside the literary language of biblical hebrew but had followed its own pattern of development after the destruction of the temple the rabbis elevated this dialect to the status of a literary language rabbinic hebrew and employed it in the composition of the mishnah tosefta and halakhic midrashim this volume is a practical grammar of rabbinic hebrew that brings m h segal s 1927 grammar up to date by incorporating the results of recent investigations in this field it also adds a clearly pedagogic perspective with vocabulary and exercises in every unit and introduces readers to the thinking of the sages of israel each unit commences with a text that bears on a theological historical literary or methodological topic

the present volume presents the english reader with a representative selection of current research into mishnaic hebrew by israeli scholars twenty two articles are included in this collection two introductory essays which provide a detailed overview of the modern study of mishnaic hebrew as well as twenty more investigations into specific topics of grammar and lexicon

this publication is a collection of studies devoted to various aspects of the semantics and lexicography of ancient hebrew

all contributions except the last two were originally delivered as papers to a symposium held in July 1994 at Leiden University. The symposium rounded off a three year long international network funded by the European Science Foundation under the leadership of Prof. Dr. J. Hoftijzer from whose contribution to the present volume one may gain an insight into the conception and philosophy of the research project and its history. So far this volume will, in addition to some earlier publications which have appeared in the *Zeitschrift für Althebraistik*, give the reader some idea of the general thinking which has assisted the authors in the formulation of their approach to the task lying before them. It ought to be emphasised, however, that all the studies appearing in this volume ought to be of interest to any Hebraist and Old Testament scholar for they are hardly in-house publications but address some important aspects of the ancient Hebrew semantics and lexicography.

This is a stimulating description by an outstanding Hebraist and Semitist of some essential features characterising the syntax of Hebrew used in non-artistic prose during the 12th-15th centuries in Southern France and Spain. An essential reading for any Hebraist and Semitist interested in the historical development of Hebrew syntax.
