intersubjectivity and usage play central roles in figurative language and are pivotal notions for a cognitively realistic research on figures of thought speech and communication this volume brings together thirteen studies that explore the relationship between figurativity intersubjectivity and usage from the cognitive linguistics perspective the studies explore the impact of figurativity on areas of lexicon and grammar on real discourse and across different semiotic systems some studies focus on the psychological processes of the comprehension of figurativity other studies address the ways in which figures of thought and language are socially shared and the variation of figures through time and space moreover some contributions are established on advanced corpus based techniques and experimental methods there are studies about metaphor metonymy irony and puns about related processes such as humor empathy and ambiguation and about the interaction between figures overall this volume offers the advantages and the opportunities of an interactional and usage based perspective of figurativity embracing both the psychological and the intersubjective reality of figurative thought and language and empirically emphasizing the multidimensional character of figurativity its central function in thought and its impact on everyday communication

explanations of nearly 1 000 ancient idioms metaphors and figures of speech in the old and new testaments from a renowned bible translator george m lamsa who was raised speaking aramaic in a community that followed customs largely unchanged since the times of christ offers accurate translations of important idioms metaphors and

figures of speech found in the scripture and provides clear explanations of their meaning in biblical context just as shakespeare milton and browning wrote in the vernacular for english speaking people moses the prophets and the apostles wrote for their own people in the plain language of their times so that even the unlearned might understand god s word over the centuries inaccurate translations and misunderstandings of customs and concepts have led to difficulties in bringing the biblical message to contemporary english speaking readers for example when a man says to jesus let me bury my father lamsa points out that this expression means let me first take care of my father until he dies traditionally scholars assumed that this man s father was dead and that jesus was not interested in his burial lamsa s scholarship offers a more accurate understanding of the intent and spirit of this passage idioms in the bible explained and a key to the original gospels goes far in correcting such errors that have crept into biblical scholarship obscure and difficult passages from both old and new testaments are listed and compared with the king james version though it will be helpful when used with any english version these make clear the original meaning of such ancient idioms and assure that our grasp of the biblical message is more sound and rewarding to further uncover the original teachings of scripture lamsa discusses at greater length such topics as the language of jesus aramaic phraseology the sayings of jesus early translations and more

metaphor has been an issue of intense research and debate for decades see for example 1 researchers in various disciplines including linguistics psychology computer science education and philosophy have developed a variety of theories and much progress has been made 2 for one metaphor is no longer considered a rhetorical flourish that is found mainly in literary texts rather linguists have shown that metaphor is a pervasive phenomenon in everyday language a major force in the development of new word meanings and the source of at least some grammatical function words 3 indeed one of the most influential theories of metaphor involves the suggestion that the commonality of metaphoric language results because cross domain mappings are a major determinant in the organization of semantic memory as cognitive and neural resources for dealing with concrete domains are recruited for the conceptualization of more abstract ones 4 researchers in cognitive neuroscience have explored whether particular kinds of brain damage are associated with metaphor production and comprehension deficits and whether similar brain regions are recruited when healthy adults understand the literal and metaphorical meanings of the same words see 5 for a review whereas early research on this topic focused on the issue of the role of hemispheric asymmetry in the comprehension and production of metaphors 6 in recent years cognitive neuroscientists have argued that metaphor is not a monolithic category and that metaphor processing varies as a function of numerous factors including the novelty or conventionality of a particular metaphoric expression its part of

both word formation (wf) and the coinage of multi-word expressions (mwe) can be characterised in terms of creativity and routine. routine in word formation and multi-word expressions is traditionally described in terms of morphological, lexical, syntactic and pragmatic rules, but creativity is defined in different ways, with definitions ranging from seeing creativity at the heart of human linguistic cognition to seeing creativity as precisely beyond regular routines. e.g. as an attention-seeking tool or wordplay. in this latter sense, creativity is usually sharply distinguished from productivity, i.e. rule-governed behaviour. despite these categorisations, the question on what basis patterns are to be defined as creative still remains subject to debate. furthermore, creativity and routine are often studied independently of each other by different research communities. the volume aims to bring together these different research communities to discuss empirical evidence on the role of creativity and routinization in wf and mwes.
