far too ignorant of the histories of the rest of the world being aware of only the accomplishments of greece rome and europe westerners have been made to believe that their societies represent the most superior examples of civilization however the western value system stems from a misconception that as in nature human society too is evolving the idea derives from the hidden influence of secret societies who followed the belief in spiritual evolution of the kabbalah which taught that history would attain its fulfillment when man would become god and make his own laws therefore the infamous illuminati gave its name to the enlightenment of the eighteenth century which claimed that human progress must abandon superstition meaning christianity in favor of reason thus the illuminati succeeded in bringing about the french and american revolutions which instituted the separation of church and state and from that point forward the western values of humanism seen to include secularism human rights democracy and capitalism have been celebrated as the culmination of centuries of human intellectual evolution this is the basis of the propaganda which has been used to foster a clash of civilizations where the islamic world is presented as stubbornly adhering to the anachronistic idea of theocracy where once the spread of christianity and civilizing the world were used as pretexts for colonization today a new white man s burden makes use of human rights and

democracy to justify imperial aggression however because after centuries of decline the islamic world is incapable of mobilizing a defense the western powers as part of their age old strategy of divide and conquer have fostered the rise of islamic fundamentalism to both serve as agent provocateurs and to malign the image of islam these sects known to scholars as revivalists opposed the traditions of classical islamic scholarship in order to create the opportunity to rewrite the laws of the religion to better serve their sponsors thus were created the wahhabi and salafi sects of islam from which were derived the muslim brotherhood which has been in the service of the west ever since but the story of the development of these islamic sects involves the bizarre doctrines and hidden networks of occult secret societies being based on a rosicrucian myth of egyptian freemasonry which see the muslim radicals as inheritors of an ancient mystery tradition of the middle east which was passed on to the knights templar during the crusades thus forming the foundation of the legends of the holy grail these beliefs would not only form the cause for the association of western intelligence agencies with islamic fundamentalists but would fundamentally shape much of twentieth century history

winner of the pen ackerley prize 2022 this is family history at its best the words fizz off the page and flutter in the mind sunday times if you open that suitcase you ll never close it again ten years ago frances stonor saunders was handed an old suitcase filled with her father s papers her father s life had been a study in borders exiled from romania during the war to turkey then egypt and eventually britain and ultimately to the borderless territory of alzheimer s the unopened suitcase seems to represent everything that had made her father unknowable to her in life so begins a captivating exploration of history memory and geography as frances stoner saunders decides to unpick her family s past

between two fires is about the transnational movement of poetry during the cold war beginning in the 1950s it examines transnational engagements across the iron curtain reassessing us poetry through a consideration of overlooked radical poets of the mid century and then asking what such transactions tell us about the way that anglophone

culture absorbed new models during this period the cold war synchronized culture across the globe leading to similar themes forms and critical maneuvers poetry a discourse routinely figured as distant from political concerns was profoundly affected by the ideological pressures of the period but beyond such mirroring there were many movements across the iron curtain despite the barriers of cultural and language difference state security surveillance spies traitors and translators justin quinn shows how such factors are integral to transnational cultural movements during this period and have influenced even postwar anglophone poetry that is thematically distant from the cold war for the purposes of the study czech poetry its writers its translators its critics stands on the other side of the iron curtain as receptor and which has been overlooked part creator of the anglophone tradition in this period by stepping outside the frameworks by which anglophone poetry is usually considered we see figures such as robert lowell derek walcott allen ginsberg and seamus heaney in a new way with respect to the ideological mechanisms that were at work behind the promotion of the aesthetic as a category independent of political considerations foremost among these postcolonial theory

during the cold war writers and artists were faced with a huge challenge in the soviet world their freedom was often denied while in the west freedom came at a cost this book

the hugely acclaimed best selling life of hawkwood one of the outstanding figures of english and european history john hawkwood was an essex man who became the greatest mercenary in an age when soldiers of fortune flourished an age that also witnessed the first stirrings of the renaissance when england made a peace treaty with the french in 1360 during a pause in the hundred years war john hawkwood instead of going home travelled south to avignon where the papacy was based during its exile from rome he and his fellow mercenaries held the pope to ransom and were paid off hawkwood then crossed the alps into italy and found himself in a promised land he made and lost fortunes extorting money from city states like florence siena and milan who were fighting vicious wars between themselves and against the popes this man of war husbanded his use of violence but for all his caution he committed one of the most notorious massacres of his time an atrocity that still clouds his name

in february 1950 senator joseph mccarthy launched an anti communist that lasted for more than four years his attempts to unmask communists in the american administration and governmental agencies gave rise to actions that infringed on democratic procedure and civil liberties as the cold war grew fear of communism at home and abroad meant that minorities were particularly under threat as tensions and frustrations were channelled towards the handiest scapegoats american jewish organizations who were having to come to terms with the holocaust in europe were forced to contend with the real possibility of a serious anti semitic outburst at home jewish presence in the american communist party was conspicuous although the overwhelming majority of jewish americans did not sympathise with its politics there was concern that anti communism would develop into anti semitism mccarthy s anti communist campaign endangered the very civil liberties that protected minorities but criticism of mccarthy and his actions could be interpreted as support for communism in order to convey the message that jews were patriotic americans concerned about both national security and civil liberties jewish organizations chose to present a united front whilst also cooperating with non sectarian american bodies by doing so they professed an alternative anti communism to the hardline mccarthy this book sheds new light on mccarthy s attitudes to the jews to the jewish organizations and to the jewish individuals identified with communism

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
