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david a desilva sets a new standard for new testament introductions emphasizing the social and rhetorical contexts of the texts and their authors highlighting a variety of interpretive approaches to the new testament and considering implications of the new testament for ministry formation

for almost fifty years much has been written concerning mark 16 9 20 during the same time period evidence once counted against mark 16 9 20 was shown to be otherwise in this study david w hester surveys modern scholarship 1965 2011 surrounding the passage he examines the passage itself the external evidence with particular attention paid to the manuscripts and the patristics especially those of the second and third centuries and the internal evidence featuring details that are problematic as well as those that favor markan authorship finally a proposal concerning the origin of the passage is presented the first edition of mark s gospel ended at 16 8 resulting in the manuscript tradition that omits the passage but this was not his intended ending later his associates attached mark s notes and published a second edition of the gospel with the last twelve verses this led to its inclusion given that the passage is cited by second and third century witnesses and attributed to mark along with the biblical prohibition against adding to or taking from scripture it is doubtful that an anonymous second century author could have been successful in adding his own composition and it being widely accepted by the early church

good girls bad girls of the new testament takes readers on a powerful journey through the vast landscape of roman occupied judea during the first century and the genesis of christianity this landscape serves as the backdrop for twelve amazing stories of women whose paths intersect either by providence or design with the paths of jesus or paul some of these women are familiar such as mary the mother of jesus while others like the wife of the infamous pontius pilate are lesser known whether she is popular or obscure good or bad each woman s story is an important part of the overall christian narrative good girls bad girls of the new testament invites readers to take a more nuanced look at twelve stories that feature women to explore their lives more deeply in historical context and to understand the real story that includes both men and women the book goes beyond simply telling the story of a particular biblical woman to challenge readers to explore the enduring lessons the ancient writers sought to impart these timeless lessons are as important for us today as they were thousands of years ago

while the early church exercised proper discernment and the canon of the new testament was soon definitely recognised and universally accepted the apocryphal writings were not without influence the sacred legends the ecclesiastical traditions all too potent in their effect are in many cases to be traced to these writings

much that rome inculcates is derived from these books which the western church constantly rejected included are the protevangelium of james the gospel of pseudo matthew the gospel of the nativity of mary the history of joseph the carpenter the gospel of thomas the gospel of nicodemus the letter of pontius pilate and many more

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
