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can one be nostalgic for the home one never had why is it that the age of globalization is accompanied by a no less global epidemic of nostalgia can we know what we are nostalgic for in the seventeenth century swiss doctors believed that opium leeches and a trek through the alps would cure nostalgia in 1733 a russian commander disgusted with the debilitating homesickness rampant among his troops buried a soldier alive as a deterrent to nostalgia in her new book svetlana boym develops a comprehensive approach to this elusive ailment combining personal memoir philosophical essay and historical analysis boym explores the spaces of collective nostalgia that connect national biography and personal self fashioning in the twenty first century she guides us through the ruins and construction sites of post communist cities st petersburg moscow berlin and prague and the imagined homelands of exiles benjamin nabokov mandelstam and brodsky from jurassic park to the totalitarian sculpture garden from love letters on kafka s grave to conversations with hitler s impersonator boym unravels the threads of this global epidemic of longing and its antidotes

although david bowie has famously characterized himself as a leper messiah a more appropriate moniker might be rock god someone whose influence has crossed numerous sub genres of popular and classical music and can at times seem ubiquitous by looking at key moments in his career 1972 1977 79 1980 83 and 1995 97 through several lenses theories of sub culture gender sexuality studies theories of sound post colonial theory and performance studies waldrep examines bowie s work in terms not only of his auditory output but his many reinterpretations of it via music videos concert tours television appearances and occasional movie roles future nostalgia looks at all aspects of bowie s career in an attempt to trace bowie s contribution to the performative paradigms that constitute contemporary rock music

the indian ocean rim this edited book is organized into three broad areas the heritage and identity of communities their sustainability and their security the first section examines how heritage and identity are negotiated in establishing the basis of communities and public discussion of their futures the second part explores different practices technologies and communities of sustainability from technologies being developed for sustainable coastal regions to the adoption of traditional practices for food management the final section canvasses the changing landscapes and seascapes of the indian ocean in relation to the broad concerns of food environmental and political security as such this volume offers the reader valuable engagement with the complex relations of communities and environments and key discourses shaping understandings of the future of the indian ocean region

are truth and reconciliation commission processes enough to achieve reconciliation this volume discusses issues that arise once the task of reconciliation emanates from the limited scope of a specific truth and reconciliation commission and into the larger society and political system that originated it scholars spanning several research fields from law to history to theology discuss how transformative reconciliation can be cultivated in a society using decolonization and other perspectives along three lines by specifying transformative issues and processes in law and politics by criticizing historical perspectives on the past and its concepts as deliberations of the status quo and by instilling the inherent dynamics of truth and reconciliation processes as permanent features within broader society the volume embarks on an investigation of the norwegianization policy a historical framework that brought injustices upon minority groups such as the sámi and kvens norwegian finns in norway and parallel groups in sweden and finland it extends its exploration to analogous unjust policies in south africa canada and various other contexts within the complex web of cultural social political and economic struggles stemming from colonial policies the roles of religion politics research institutions and civil society are critically examined

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focused on the myths and mythologies of european cultural history this volume seeks to address the present and past functions of foundation texts in the evolution of the european idea one of the specific objectives of this volume is to reconsider in the context of ongoing european expansion and integration the functionalist approach of benedict anderson according to whom imagined communities are to be distinguished not by their falsity genuineness but by the style in which they are imagined the common denominator of each of the essays contained in this volume is the problem of the discontinuity of time in relation to tradition cultural and individual memory as well as in relation to historical and literary narratives time becomes the locus of its own reflexivity it is self temporalized it undergoes endless reiteration within itself and needs a semantics which sets valid accents for specific moments jean bessiere

this volume was first published by inter disciplinary press in 2016 sad bad mad and sweet considers nostalgia as a force that shapes culture the self and the state it describes ways in which the nostalgic impulse is co opted created questioned and championed from a diverse array of disciplinary perspectives nostalgia as feeling is pivotal in the construction and contradiction of identity as tool it is vital in the morphing and moulding of history from post colonial to post soviet to post national views of home and the past to the sculpting of story itself this volume asks questions about how we remember and what those memories might offer the chapters seek to warn and reassure to imagine and to restrain they all acknowledge the power of this bitter and sweet longing for something lost whether real or imagined and explore the ways in which nostalgia shapes the stories we tell about ourselves the volume is an important contribution to the ways in which this

multifaceted much maligned sentiment is considered

abbott offers a fruitful new way to read science fiction one that also greatly enriches our understanding of western history and its impact on our collective imagination detailing the overlap of science fiction and western fiction especially relating to their mutual interest in and concerns about frontier expansionism he reveals an unsuspected common ground that informs the writings of both camps reviewing the work of many hugo and nebula award winners as well as drawing upon popular film and television series like the buck rogers serials abbott s study journeys across the far reaches of science fiction s universe

late nineteenth and early twentieth century theorists such as freud durkheim weber and marx built their intellectual edifices on what they thought would be the remains or ruins of religion in the wake of modernization but today the decline and disappearance of religion can no longer be simply assumed in the face of contemporary entanglements of religion and violence the establishment of meaning and morality remains troubling the experience of loss and change remains paradoxically constant and new theoretical perspectives feminism race studies postcolonial studies queer studies postmodernism have emerged challenging the works that mourned religion and created meaning in earlier periods the effects of this ongoing experience of mourning and symbolic loss on culture on subjectivity and on the academic disciplines of religious studies though immense are poorly understood and underinterpreted in order to correct this lacuna in scholarly thought this volume brings together a notable group of scholars who examine the ways in which recent cultural transformations inform the place of religion in the modern world methodologically they represent the intersection of religious studies and the social scientific study of religion bringing the disciplines of psychology sociology and anthropology into this dialogue

this collection of previously unpublished autobiographical and semi autobiographical snippets of experience written by

svetlana boym in the final period of her life capture her penchant for seamlessly melding poetically and dream like the intensively personal with the everyday and the world historical they illuminate the formative conditions for the thinking which she was to develop into her majestic work on nostalgia importantly these pieces fill in gaps in understanding the genesis and scope of her take on the world for readers both familiar with her work and for those new to it the origins of nostalgia will enable our own cultural past as well as that of the former soviet union to be viewed in a different light

baudrillard s culture of simulation destroys our sense of paramount reality it has created as chris rojek puts it a huge refugee camp in which viewers dissociated from place and community are caught up in global indexing and dragging processes which no one controls what is thus also perversely inscribed within the cultural landscape is a nostalgia for authenticity for the dissimulated spaces and places which though no longer there stimulate their semiotic reconstructions and reproductions and yet the possibility of lying is the prioprium of semiosis as umberto eco has once remarked truth and falsity are inherent in the sign and in representation generally subverting the tertium non datur principle this book is an attempt to unmask representation to see through the signs of the real and through the real itself at the realm of simulation those signs are not only signs of what they signify but also signs of culture of the cultural real which the articles included in the volume try to penetrate from various theoretical and philosophical perspectives

the dominant paradigm in the sciences of language conceives the subject in community as a truth sayer a communicator and a player economist the major ontology of the human community reconstructs being together as a system of interactions and transactions subject to the rules of economic rationality and as a consequence the community as source and target of finite strategical games the primordial value then is the circulation of information and ideal communication is favored by the truth functional status of our discourses however this dominant ontology has a few cracks this is where the aesthetic dimension intrudes establishing here and there the blink of an eye shattering the economic communicational and truth saying phantasm scattering the field of being together fragmenting it these aesthetic fringes conduct themselves according to the isotopy of blossoming of rupture and fracture of thresholds and discontinuity their effect is one of bedazzlement trembling shaking upheaval lightheadedness infinite games in conversation the musicality of voices understanding by flair and tact the temporariness of nostalgic memory reasonable pathos are what has been emphasized in this book

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
