for a major reassessment of its significance in particular the authors place the satellite monuments firmly in a tradition of ritual practice that is attested to at cities and important monasteries throughout early medieval christendom this book offers the reader an understanding of how the sacred topography of inishmurray was experienced both by its resident community of monks and by the pilgrims who journeyed there book jacket
