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village voice favorite books of 2000 the popular book challenging the idea of a model minority now in paperback how does it feel to be a problem asked w e b du bois of black americans in his classic the souls of black folk a hundred years later vijay prashad asks south asians how does it feel to be a solution in this kaleidoscopic critique prashad looks into the complexities faced by the members of a model minority one he claims that is consistently deployed as a weapon in the war against black america on a vast canvas the karma of brown folk attacks the two pillars of the model minority image that south asians are both inherently successful and

pliant and analyzes the ways in which u s immigration policy and american orientalism have perpetuated these stereotypes prashad uses irony humor razor sharp criticism personal reflections and historical research to challenge the arguments made by dinesh d souza who heralds south asian success in the u s and to question the quiet accommodation to racism made by many south asians a look at deepak chopra and others whom prashad terms godmen shows us how some south asians exploit the stereotype of inherent spirituality much to the chagrin of other south asians following the long engagement of american culture with south asia prashad traces india s effect on thinkers like cotton mather and henry david thoreau ravi shankar s influence on john coltrane and such essential issues as race versus caste and the connection between antiracism activism and anticolonial resistance the karma of brown folk locates the birth of the model minority myth placing it firmly in the context of reaction to the struggle for black liberation prashad reclaims the long history of black and south asian solidarity discussing joint struggles in the u s the caribbean south africa and elsewhere and exposes how these powerful moments of alliance faded from historical memory and were replaced by indian support for antiblack racism ultimately prashad writes not just about south asians in america but about america itself in the tradition of toqueville du bois richard wright and others he explores the place of collective struggle and multiracial alliances in the transformation of self and community in short how americans define themselves

in a world of supercomputers genetic engineering and fiber optics technological creativity is ever more the key to economic success but why are some nations more creative than others and why do some highly innovative societies such as ancient china or britain in the industrial revolution pass into stagnation beginning with a fascinating concise history of technological progress mokyr sets the background for his analysis by tracing the major inventions and innovations that have transformed society since ancient greece and rome what emerges from this survey is often surprising the classical world for instance was largely barren of new technology the relatively backward society of medieval europe bristled with inventions and the period between the reformation and the industrial revolution was one of slow and unspectacular progress in technology despite the tumultuous developments associated with the voyages of discovery and the scientific revolution what were the causes of technological creativity mokyr distinguishes between the relationship of inventors and their physical environment which determined their willingness to challenge nature and the social environment which determined the openness to new ideas he discusses a long list of such factors showing how they interact to help or hinder a nation s creativity and then illustrates them by a number of detailed comparative studies examining the differences between europe

and china between classical antiquity and medieval europe and between britain and the rest of europe during the industrial revolution he examines such aspects as the role of the state the chinese gave up a millennium wide lead in shipping to the europeans for example when an emperor banned large ocean going vessels the impact of science as well as religion politics and even nutrition he questions the importance of such commonly cited factors as the spill over benefits of war the abundance of natural resources life expectancy and labor costs today an ever greater number of industrial economies are competing in the global market locked in a struggle that revolves around technological ingenuity the lever of riches with its keen analysis derived from a sweeping survey of creativity throughout history offers telling insights into the question of how western economies can maintain and developing nations can unlock their creative potential

sterling a brown s achievement and influence in the field of american literature and culture are unquestionably significant his poetry has been translated into spanish french german and russian and has been read in literary circles throughout the world he is also one of the principal architects of black criticism his critical essays and books are seminal works that give an insider s perspective of literature by and about blacks leopold sedar senghor who became familiar with brown s poetry and criticism in the 1920s and 1930s called him an original militant of negritude a precursor of our movement yet joanne v gabbin s book originally published in 1985 remains the only study of brown s work and influence gabbin sketches brown s life drawing on personal interviews and viewing his achievements as a poet critic and cultural griot she analyzes in depth the formal and thematic qualities of his poetry revealing his subtle adaptation of song forms especially the blues to articulate the aesthetic principles brown recognized in the writings of black authors gabbin explores his identification of the various elements that have come together to create american culture

a masterful study by a preeminent scholar that situates cather as a visionary practitioner of literary modernism willa cather is often pegged as a regionalist a feminine and domestic writer or a social realist in cather among the moderns janis p stout firmly situates cather as a visionary practitioner of literary modernism something other scholars have hinted at but rarely affirmed stout presents cather on a large dramatic stage among a sizable cast of characters and against a brightly lit social and historical backdrop invoking numerous figures and instances from the broad movement in the arts and culture that we call modernism early on stout addresses the matter of gender the term cross dresser has often been applied to cather but stout sees cather s identity as fractured or ambiguous a reading that links her firmly to

early twentieth century modernity later chapters take up topics of significance both to cather and to twentieth century american modernists including shifting gender roles world war i s devastation of social and artistic norms and strains in racial relations she explores cather s links to a small group of modernists who after the war embraced life in new mexico a destination of choice for many artists and which led to two of cather s most fully realized modernist novels the professor s house and death comes for the archbishop the last chapter addresses cather s place within modernism stout first places her in relation to ezra pound and t s eliot with their shared ties to tradition even while making sometimes startling innovations in literary form then showing parallels with william faulkner with respect to economic disparity and social injustice

a breathtaking achievement this concise companion is a suitable crown to the astonishing production in african american literature and criticism that has swept over american literary studies in the last two decades it offers an enormous range of writers from sojourner truth to frederick douglass from zora neale hurston to ralph ellison and from toni morrison to august wilson it contains entries on major works including synopses of novels such as harriet jacobs s incidents in the life of a slave girl richard wright s native son and lorraine hansberry s a raisin in the sun it also incorporates information on literary characters such as bigger thomas coffin ed johnson kunta kinte sula peace as well as on character types such as aunt jemima brer rabbit john henry stackolee and the trickster icons of black culture are addressed including vivid details about the lives of muhammad ali john coltrane marcus garvey jackie robinson john brown and harriet tubman here too are general articles on poetry fiction and drama on autobiography slave narratives sunday school literature and oratory as well as on a wide spectrum of related topics compact yet thorough this handy volume gathers works from a vast array of sources from the black periodical press to women s clubs making it one of the most substantial guides available on the growing exciting world of african american literature

the second edition of a new history of asian america offers an expansive updated synthesis of the asian american experience making it essential reading for those seeking a nuanced understanding of asian america s role in shaping contemporary society covering asian american history from early orientalist conceptions preceding the united states founding to the racial reckonings of the 2020s this work integrates cutting edge research with enduring historical narratives groundbreaking in its approach the book addresses urgent contemporary issues such as neoliberal multiculturalism intensified immigration enforcement and anti asian violence alongside deepened analysis of class gender and transnational dynamics prominent

case studies include post 9 11 racial profiling of arabs and south asians activism during the george floyd protests and anti asian violence linked to covid 19 rhetoric this edition has been thoroughly revised incorporating significant developments and scholarly innovations of the last decade while reframing familiar histories to yield fresh insights into structural violence and diasporic agency the book remains committed to a central claim that asian american history is fundamental to understanding broader american histories of race power and resistance accessible yet rigorous this book is a vital resource for students scholars librarians booksellers and general readers alike

the powerful novelist here turns penetrating critic giving us in lively style both trenchant literary analysis and fresh insight on the art of writing when african american writers began to trust the literary possibilities of their own verbal and musical creations writes gayl jones they began to transform the european and european american models and to gain greater artistic sovereignty the vitality of african american literature derives from its incorporation of traditional oral forms folktales riddles idiom jazz rhythms spirituals and blues jones traces the development of this literature as african american writers celebrating their oral heritage developed distinctive literary forms the twentieth century saw a new confidence and deliberateness in african american work the move from surface use of dialect to articulation of a genuine black voice the move from blacks portrayed for a white audience to characterization relieved of the need to justify innovative writing such as charles waddell chesnutt's depiction of black folk culture langston hughes's poetic use of blues and amiri baraka's recreation of the short story as a jazz piece redefined western literary tradition for jones literary technique is never far removed from its social and political implications she documents how literary form is inherently and intensely national and shows how the european monopoly on acceptable forms for literary art stifled american writers both black and white jones is especially eloquent in describing the dilemma of the african american writers to write from their roots yet retain a universal voice to merge the power and fluidity of oral tradition with the structure needed for written presentation with this work gayl jones has added a new dimension to african american literary history

portray a rounded picture of chopin as composer pianist and teacher of his music and of his overall achievement and legacy historical perspectives are offered on chopin s biography as cultural discourse on the evolution and origins of his style and on the contexts of given works a fascinating contemporary overview of chopin s oeuvre is also provided seven source studies assess the status and role of chopin s notational practices as well as some enigmatic sketch material essays in the field of performance studies scrutinise the cultural work carried out by chopin s performances and discuss his playing style along with that of his contemporaries and students this paves the way for a body of essays on analysis aesthetics and reception considering aspects of genre and including an overview of analytical approaches to select works the remaining essays address chopin s handling of form rhythm and other musical elements as well as the meaning of his music the collection as a whole underscores one of the most important aspects of chopin s legacy namely the paradoxical manner in which he drew from the past in particular certain eighteenth century traditions while stretching inherited conventions and practices to such an extent that a highly original music of the future was heralded

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
