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everyone has their own thoughts and ideas about our origins morality and even spirituality but where do our thoughts begin why do we think the way that we do and should we rely on our own thoughts

to guide us in our daily interactions with one another stephen j fyson dives deeper into thinking examining the roots of these questions and pointing the reader to discover why good thinking starts with god in this short look into the history of psychology and the history of some thinking religions fyson encourages the reader to examine their thoughts a little more closely to find what everyone is searching for truth

bringing together leading scholars from belgium canada france and the united states french thinking about animals makes available for the first time to an anglophone readership a rich variety of interdisciplinary approaches to the animal question in france while the work of french thinkers such as jacques derrida gilles deleuze and felix guattari has been available in english for many years french thinking about animals opens up a much broader cross cultural dialogue within animal studies these original essays many of which have been translated especially for this volume draw on anthropology ethology geography history legal studies phenomenology and philosophy to interrogate human animal relationships they explore the many ways in which animals signify in french history society and intellectual history illustrating the exciting new perspectives being developed about the animal question in the french speaking world today built on the strength and diversity of these contributions french thinking about animals demonstrates the interdisciplinary and internationalism that are needed if we hope to transform the interactions of humans and nonhuman animals in contemporary society

the world we make reflects the way reality is perceived and today the world is perceived primarily in technological terms so argues gil germain in thinking about technology how the technological mind misreads reality given the connection between perception and action or thinking and doing germain first highlights the central features of technological worldview to better understand the contemporary drive to master the conditions of human existence he then boldly proposes that the technological worldview seriously misreads the nature of the world it seeks mastery over and shows how this misinterpretation invariably leads to the technologically related challenges currently vexing the contemporary social order from the drift toward a posthuman future to the anti globalization backlash germain closes thinking about technology by articulating an alternative worldview to the technological perspective and illustrating how this re reading of reality might help us inhabit the technological landscape in ways better attuned to the human condition

the crisis of 21st century religion is upon us with fewer people remaining committed to traditional religions and most new religious movements in their infancy where does that leave the vast silent spiritual majority who find the old religions to be obsolete and the new religions to be not yet credible for everyday people who feel lost between a rejected religion of the past and a still obscure religion of the future thinking about religion in the 21st century suggests that there is indeed another way to look at religion fully informed by 21st century sensibilities that requires no sacrifice of the intellect or abandonment of moral sensibilities the old religions can be set aside and the religions of the future might not yet have evolved into something worthy of full commitment but there already exists a viable

evolving alternative spiritual perspective grounded in the elements of everyday ordinary human experience already available

this book explores a new pedagogical model called the third model which places the encounter between the child and the curriculum at the center of educational theory and practice the third model is implemented in an alternative classroom called community of thinking teaching and learning in a community of thinking is based on three stations the fertile question research and concluding performance the essence of a community of thinking is the formation of a group of students and teachers who grapple with a troubling question to which they do not know the answer at the outset and sometimes even at the end of their investigation the community of thinking framework is supported by a whole school model the intellect school the model or parts of it is currently implemented in schools in israel england australia and new zealand the book suggests a new pedagogical narrative based on alternative atomic pictures of learning teaching knowledge mind and the aim of education and a systematic pedagogical practice based on this narrative

cities are raucous cacophonous and complex many dimensions of life play out and conflict across cities intricate landscapes be they political cultural economic or social urban policy makers and analysts often attempt to cut through the noise of urban disagreement by emphasizing a dominant lens for understanding the key central logic of the city how to think about cities sees this tendency to selective vision as misleading and ultimately unjust cities are many things at once to different people and communities this book describes the various ways of seeing the functions and landscapes of the city as place frames and the constant process of negotiating which place frames best explain the city as place making martin and pierce call for an explicitly hybrid perspective that shifts between many different frames for making sense of cities this approach highlights how any given stance opens up some lines of inquiry and understanding while closing off others thinking of cities as sites of contested perspectives promotes a synthetic approach to urban analysis that emphasizes difference and political possibility this mosaic view of the city will be a welcome read for those within urban studies geography and social sciences exploring the many faces of urban life
