the first compilation of writings by a master of photography one of the leading lights in photography of the twentieth century henri cartier bresson is also a shrewd observer and critic his writings on photography and photographers which have appeared sporadically over the past forty five years are gathered here for the first time several have never before appeared in english the mind's eye features cartier bresson's famous text on the decisive moment as well as his observations on moscow cuba and china during turbulent times which ring with the same immediacy and visual intensity that he brings to his photography cartier bresson remains as direct and insightful as ever in his writings his commentary on photographer friends he has known including robert capa andre kertesz ernst haas and sarah moon reveal the impassioned and compassionate vision for which cartier bresson is beloved

essays on photography and the medium's history and evolving identity in each wild idea geoffrey batchen explores a wide

range of photographic subjects from the timing of the medium's invention to the various implications of cyberculture along the way he reflects on contemporary art photography the role of the vernacular in photography's history and the australianness of Australian photography the essays all focus on a consideration of specific photographs from a humble combination of baby photos and bronzed booties to a masterwork by Alfred Stieglitz although Batchen views each photograph within the context of broader social and political forces he also engages its own distinctive formal attributes in short he sees photography as something that is simultaneously material and cultural in an effort to evoke the lived experience of history he frequently relies on sheer description as the mode of analysis insisting that we look right at rather than beyond the photograph being discussed a constant theme throughout the book is the question of photography's past present and future identity

this diverse collection of writings by Taco Hidde Bakker addresses the philosophy politics and art of photography with topics ranging from the tension between artist and model to the landscapes of the American West and the predicament of transcultural photography Bakker selected and revised sixteen pieces of writing from a variety of publications spanning the past decade of his journeys through photography and art in addition he penned four new pieces especially for this book often engaging in close collaboration with the artists about whose work he writes Bakker explores different literary forms in response to their views with a recurring reference to poetry

this anthology offers a fresh approach to the philosophical aspects of photography the essays written by contemporary philosophers in a thorough and engaging manner explore the far-reaching ethical dimensions of photography as it is used today a first of its kind anthology exploring the link between the art of photography and the theoretical questions it raises written in a thorough and engaging manner essayists are all contemporary philosophers who bring with them an exceptional understanding of the broader metaphysical issues pertaining to photography takes a fresh look at some familiar issues photographic truth objectivity and realism introduces newer issues such as the ethical use of photography or the effect of digital imaging technology on how we appreciate images

Peter C Bunnell has been a major force in shaping the discourse about photography this collection of texts selected from work published throughout Bunnell's career marks his significant contribution to the field he has helped to establish in each of the thirty-four essays each devoted to individual predominantly American photographers and three key galleries Bunnell brings to bear his distinctive sensibility and insight while encouraging the reader to see previously overlooked aspects of the images he discusses so eloquently he also provides an invaluable historical context for the photographers and their work Bunnell offers a unique personal perspective on the world of art photography documenting its journey as it morphed from a small group of practitioners to the supercharged international marketplace of today

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the importance of vision and visual arts such as painting theatre and sculpture in marcel proust s *a la recherche du temps perdu* has long been affirmed another significant system of visual representation in the novel is photography proust appropriated photography as a practice with its own distinctive characteristics which could inform his writing about the processes of perception and memory through close textual analysis of scenes where photography is experienced or observed as a practice and scenes where photography is written into the body of the text aine larkin offers an invigorating new study that sheds genuinely new light on the presence of photographic motifs in proust s novel and the subtlety of proust s engagement with this modern imaging system in his work

blind corners is a book every photographer should own w scott olsen frames for many years photographer michael collins had wondered what exactly it was that he found so mysterious about photography in this series of linked pieces collins offers a reappraisal of humble and often ubiquitous photographic genres that he believes are worthy of greater understanding from restoring abandoned photos whose subjects are lost to time to a quotidian history of the studio portrait from tracing the origins of the panorama within the wider field of art history to an experiment in photographic portraiture using gorillas collins reveals what it is about photography that continues to fascinate us

photography is not dying and has not died it has been an ever changing medium since its earliest days and while near obsession with the technology of the day may have defined photography over the course of its existence photography is so much more than hardware and software photography is communication whether chemical or digital tangible or ephemeral in form photography beyond technique is a compelling selection of essays and images that reveal the thoughts and methods of some of today s most exciting contemporary photographers these artists employ alternative historical or handmade processes and techniques and they share a comprehensive view of the medium that the choice of photographic process is just as important as the selection of subjects while other books concentrate solely on process or theory or artistic intent none focus on photography in which these decisions are considered inseparable these 20 essays originally presented at the annual f295 symposium and seminar series provide a thought provoking read for anyone interested in photography as an art form and as a medium through which to view the world includes looking backward seeing forward reframing visual history by robert hirsch mystery memory and narrative by martha casanave finding confidence combining process with purpose by mark osterman photograph material and metaphor by jerry spagnoli

collected here for the first time are essays by one of photography s outstanding critics and historians jussim investigates the meaning of images incorporating postmodern deconstructionist and feminist viewpoints

this is a comprehensive collection of twentieth century writings on photography its production its uses and effects encompassing essays by photographers including edward weston and laslo moholy nagy and key thinkers from walter benjamin to roland barthes and susan sontag the reader traces the development of ideas about photography exploring issues such as identity consumption the gaze and digital technology

ph emerson s naturalistic photography is one of the classics of photographic literature this newly designed and typeset edition includes the complete text of the definitive 1899 third edition which includes additional essays by emerson among them the controversial photography not art compared at the time to dropping a bombshell at a tea party naturalistic photography marked the start of a crusade against the academism of artistic photography dubbed the martin luther of photography john szarkowski and more recently the one of the most virulent polemicists in the history of photography thomas galifot mus e d orsay emerson s fierce and trenchant writing is in sharp contrast to the gentle atmospheric images of his pioneering photobooks such as life and landscapes of the norfolk broads and marsh leaves emerson s texts are today recognised as ranking alongside those of john berger roland barthes and john szarkowski as the precursors to contemporary thinking on photography

media philosopher vilém flusser proposed a revolutionary new way of thinking about photography an analysis of the medium in terms of aesthetics science and politics provided him with new ways of understanding both the cultural crises of the past and the new social forms nascent within them flusser showed how the transformation of textual into visual culture from the linearity of history into the two dimensionality of magic and of industrial into post industrial society from work into leisure went hand in hand and how photography allows us to read and interpret these changes with particular clarity

a new edition of john berger and jean mohr s classic investigation into the nature of photography and what makes it so different from other art forms one of the world s most influential art critics berger sees clearly with fresh surprise yet profound understanding washington times in one of the most eloquent accounts of photography ever devised the writer john berger and the photographer jean mohr set out to understand the fundamental nature of photography and how it makes its impact asking a range of questions what is a photograph what do photographs mean how can they be used they give their answers in terms of a photograph as a meeting place where the interests of the photographer the photographed the viewer and those who are using the photography are often contradictory from these beginnings they develop a theory of photography that has at its centre the form s essential ambiguity arguing that photography is totally unlike a film and has nothing to do with reportage rather it constitutes another way of telling the unique combination of critic and photographer results in a work that moves beyond the landmarks established by walter benjamin roland barthes and susan sontag to establish a new theory of photography this unique combination of words and pictures includes 230 photographs by jean mohr
