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the mysteries of christianity is matthias joseph scheeben s youthful magnum opus a logically rigorous and spiritually profound dogmatic theology in its pages he explores the intelligibility of christianity s supernatural mysteries and their deep connectedness ultimately demonstrating that

christian theology constitutes a science before the court of human reason even as its object transcends human comprehension scheeben s task is to present a unified view of the whole panorama of revealed truth and he pursues this by considering nine key christian mysteries the trinity creation sin the incarnation the eucharist the church and its sacraments justification eschatological glory and predestination since the mystery of the trinity is the root of the supernatural order scheeben begins here showing that the foundation of the salvific economy lies in the eternal processions of persons in god the begetting of the son and the spiration of the spirit being in different ways the cause of the life of grace in the human soul when the son and the spirit are sent into the world in the incarnation and through the bestowal of grace they provide the way for human beings to see god face to face in the beatific vision the end for which god created humans among the means of return to god scheeben particularly emphasizes the eucharist on account of its close connection with the mystery of the incarnation by placing his treatment of the eucharist before that of the church he signals that his is a genuinely eucharistic ecclesiology centered on the abiding presence of the incarnate divine son

god has always been the same though people change human nature remains the same from the time of adam and eve forces that include angels and evil spirits have been in existence for ages and have built barriers between god and his creation scripture explains much of the associated mysterious evidence that has been uncovered by science god s plan is to reconcile to himself as many as would be willing he revealed and confirmed this plan and continues to do so by the work of his spirit through the lives of many this plan is framed and executed by love in order to participate in god s plan exposure to this largely misunderstood love is required since the plan is communicated through imperfect people it is often misunderstood and rejected this book is for assisting god s people to obtain an improved understanding of both his love and his plan tony murray raised in denominational churches the author helped start and served for years as assistant pastor in non denominational churches in ohio he then served as pastor for a period of time for over twenty years he worked in the training profession while observing the reactions and tendencies of people as they dealt with various circumstances he recognized first in himself but in others also that these reactions and tendencies varied very little regardless of someone s abandonment to a church person or cause he sees that while it is a decent gesture to commit to one s concept of christianity christ often is not served misconceptions about god abound he resolved to stress that the responsibility of the christian is to abandon themselves completely to the person and teaching of christ jesus anything less will result in falling short of impacting the world the way that god desires

because of his sense of the interconnectedness of the spiritual world with nature art medicine and all the rest of life rudolf steiner was a profound polymath in his seminal study christianity as mystical fact he turned his esoteric genius to interpreting the christ event as the turning point in the world s spiritual history an incarnation whose significance he saw transcending all religions bishop frederick h borsch professor of new testament and chair of anglican studies lutheran theological seminary philadelphia as simultaneously mysticism and fact christianity is a breakthrough in the historical development of humanity for which the mysteries with the results that they brought about form a prior evolutionary stage rudolf steiner during the fall and winter of 1901 1902 steiner gave a series of lectures called christianity as mystical fact to members of the theosophical society the lectures were rewritten and issued as a book later that year they mark a watershed in the development of western esotericism steiner wrote of the idea behind his book the title christianity as mystical fact was one i gave to this work eight years ago when i gathered together the content of lectures given in 1902 it was meant to indicate the special approach adopted in the book its theme is not just the mystical side of christianity in a historical presentation it was meant to show from the standpoint of a mystical awareness how christianity came into being behind this was the idea that spiritual happenings were factors in the emergence of christianity which could only be observed from such a point of view it is for the book itself to demonstrate that by mystical i do not in any way imply a vague intuition rather than strict scientific argument in many circles mysticism is understood as just that and therefore it is distinguished from the concerns of all genuine science in this book however i use the term to mean a presentation of spiritual reality a reality accessible only to a knowledge drawn from the sources of spiritual life itself anyone who denies the possibility of such knowledge in principle will find its contents hard to comprehend any reader who accepts the idea that mysticism may coexist with the clarity of the natural sciences may acknowledge that the mystical aspect of christianity must be described mystically this is a fundamental book in steiner s own development in that of western esotericism and for our understanding of the christ event readers will find the evolutionary development from the ancient mysteries through the great greek philosophers to the events portrayed in the gospels included are an informative introduction and annotated notes by andrew welburn and an afterword by michael debus a priest of the christian community who summarizes the book and places it in context

philosophy of religion too often confines itself to a few well worn philosophical puzzles such as the proof of god's existence and overworked examples which are usually drawn from western christianity this book considers religion practice and expression in a number of cultural contexts both familiar and exotic from sacred texts to rites of passage from the british israel movement to spiritism and aztec devil worship the author argues that although there are many points on which religious persons disagree and no definite way of settling these disagreements neoplatonic theory about the world and our place in it does at least provide the context for debate is religion an irrational human attempt to disguise an essentially meaningless universe or is irreligion itself unreasonable and a spiritual universe the best explanation using a wide range of examples the mysteries of religion provides an invaluable philosophical background for a discussion of such fundamental questions

contemporary christianity the world religion established by the god man christ jesus and founded on the revelatory principle that god is love is hardly the shining example of ideological unity and universal brotherhood that it was intended to be there are approximately 41 000 different christian denominations in the world today many of which are fervently hostile to each other atheistic and anti christian polemicists have concluded that there is something inherently wrong with christianity itself and in consequence it is doomed to failure and eventual extinction discerning christian advocates however know that any apparent failure to realize the high ideals of christianity is not due to the profound teachings and the illustrious life example of christ jesus but instead to the limitations of wounded human nature corrupt power hungry destructive and evil minded human beings have twisted distorted and fragmented true christianity for the past two thousand years and continue to do so today moreover on a much deeper spiritual level since christianity is indeed a divinely initiated endeavor to help restore fallen humanity powerful and demonic beings have attempted to destroy nascent christianity from its very inception but thankfully according to christ jesus himself the powers of hell will not prevail against it christianity matt 16 18 sadly contributing to the injurious fragmentation of christianity the religion of divine love is the sectarian hostility between certain proponents of anthroposophy and select members of the catholic church in both cases this is largely due to ignorance that is an almost complete lack of understanding about the true significance and mission of the other anthroposophical critics know almost nothing of catholicism and catholic critics know almost nothing about anthroposophy the wonderful reconciliatory fact is that anthroposophy and catholicism are not conflicting polar opposites but are instead like two sides of the same golden coin different but complementary instead of only one side or the other being the only true approach to christ jesus both are uniquely necessary and both positively

contribute to the complete truth of christianity since this author is happily and harmoniously both an anthroposophist and a catholic the greater and lesser mysteries of christianity the complementary paths of anthroposophy and catholicism earnestly seeks to correct the misinformation and lack of understanding that each partisan critic has for the other as in almost every significant dispute increased knowledge and familiarity about each other will in time bring both sides closer together for mutual growth and benefit

the ancient mysteries have long attracted the interest of scholars an interest that goes back at least to the time of the reformation after a period of interest around the turn of the twentieth century recent decades have seen an important study of walter burkert 1987 yet his thematic approach makes it hard to see how the actual initiation into the mysteries took place to do precisely that is the aim of this book it gives a thick description of the major mysteries not only of the famous eleusinian mysteries but also those located at the interface of greece and anatolia the mysteries of samothrace imbros and lemnos as well as those of the corybants it then proceeds to look at the orphic bacchic mysteries which have become increasingly better understood due to the many discoveries of new texts in the recent times having looked at classical greece we move on to the roman empire where we study not only the lesser mysteries which we know especially from pausanias but also the new ones of isis and mithras we conclude our book with a discussion of the possible influence of the mysteries on emerging christianity its detailed references and up to date bibliography will make this book indispensable for any scholar interested in the mysteries and ancient religion but also for those scholars who work on initiation or esoteric rituals which were often inspired by the ancient mysteries

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
