this vintage book contains a comprehensive treatise of baroque music it was written for the music student and music lover with the aim of acquainting them with this great period of music history and helping them to gain a historical understanding of music without which baroque music cannot be fully appreciated and enjoyed written in simple plain language and full of fascinating information about baroque music this text will appeal to those interested in music but who have little previous knowledge of baroque and it would make for a most worthy addition to collections of music related literature the chapters of this book include early baroque in italy the beginnings of the concertato style gabrieli the phases of baroque music tradition and progress in sacred music the netherlands school and its english background et cetera we are republishing this antiquarian volume now in an affordable modern edition complete with a new prefatory biography of the author

a history of baroque music is a detailed treatment of the music of the baroque era with particular focus on the seventeenth century the author s approach is a history of musical style with an emphasis on musical scores the book is divided initially by time period into early and later baroque 1600 1700 and 1700 1750 respectively and secondarily by country and composer an introductory chapter discusses stylistic continuity with the late renaissance and examines the etymology of the term baroque the concluding chapter on the composer telemann addresses the stylistic shift that led to the end of the baroque and the transition into the classical period jacket

although it lies far back running roughly from about 1600 to 1750 the baroque period is far from forgotten and baroque music is played widely today as well exercising numerous musicians and attracting rather substantial audiences it experienced the emergence of a new sort of music increasingly secular and increasingly good listening if you will and also the start of opera some of the baroque composers appear among the most popular of all time such as bach handel and vivaldi so yes this is a book for researchers but it is also a good book for anyone who enjoys this music the historical dictionary of baroque music certainly fills a significant space in the whole sub series on music since it tells us much more not only about the music but also the age that generated it this is done particularly well in an insightful introduction with the flow of events traced by the chronology the dictionary section fills in the missing details with over 400 entries on the most important composers and musicians some of the musical works themselves important places and institutions and a smattering of technical terms the bibliography directs us to further reading

music always functions in a specific environment and viewed from the other side environments use music to confirm and strengthen their identities institutions of power have in all times employed music to present themselves to the outside world alongside other means such as architecture fine arts design and fashion the present volume brings together a number of studies that all deal in one way or another with the question of how power was implemented in music in what is called the baroque era roughly the seventeenth century and the first half of the eighteenth the essays can be grouped under four main headings court opera ceremonial music musicians and miscellaneous studies several essays discuss court opera one of the most conspicuous musical forms with which a monarch could display his power music could also accompany festivities and ceremonies of all sorts of very different kinds of institutions courtly civil or ecclesiastical not only sovereign rulers could employ music to confirm their power also lower ranking powers such as nobility often invested in music in order to gain prestige various studies highlight this aspect of music and power finally there are studies that deal with more general questions such as the representation of power in baroque opera dedications of musical works to royals and other patrons and the social status of musicians as they are positioned between patrons and public

the baroque style in music emerged during the late sixteenth century and lasted well into the eighteenth italy was the source of this new artistic impulse which soon spread across europe and the period was one of striking contrasts and innovations few other eras witnessed such a profusion of new forms opera oratorio cantata sonata and concerto although baroque music contained distinct national idioms fundamental values were shared by all the leading creative figures of the time one such value was a declared intent to move the passions to stir emotions those emotions appropriate to the two great contemporary patrons of music the church and the nobility ecclesiastical commissions encouraged composers to depict suffering pathos and elation while secular and court patronage gave them the opportunity to evoke splendor and opulence nicholas anderson a leading authority on baroque music and a well known scholar and broadcaster relates musical history to the cultural milieu of church and court as well as to public patronage he considers both major figures such as bach handel and vivaldi and lesser known artists whose music is now being avidly collected and explored telemann charpentier and leclair among others the baroque period one of the richest in western music provided the foundation for all subsequent musical development its enduring strength is amply attested by the popularity of today s authentic performances and recordings now this growing interest

finds its proper complement in a complete and authoritative account of the baroque heritage

baroque music not long ago considered the province of the specialist now occupies a central place in the interests of any music lover not just bach and handel but vivaldi and monteverdi couperin and rameau purcell and schütz are familiar and loved figures there is place now for a survey that offers fresh perspectives on these men and the times in which they lived that is what the companion to baroque music is designed to offer to all those who are attracted by the music of that crucial century and a half 1600 1750 which we call the baroque era julie anne sadie herself scholar performer and critic brings to this survey two novel features first it is underpinned by a keen awareness of music as sound intended to be played heard and relished by the listener as witness the group of articles contributed by well known specialists such as nigel rogers and david fuller on the central issues of performance secondly it is concerned not only with what the music is like but why it is as it is and the series of essays again by specialists such as michael talbot on italy and peter holman on england which places each region s music in its social and cultural contexts helps to explain its character the lexicographical part of the book in which the life of every significant musician of the era is charted and his or her work outlined is subdivided geographically so as to convey with particular sharpness the special character of music making in each part of europe and a system of cross references defines the ebb and flow of influences as composers travelled from city to city or court to court disseminating their tastes their styles their ideas a detailed chronology enables the reader to take in at a glance the sequence of musical events across the entire period the companion to baroque music which contains a foreword by christopher hogwood offers both reliable reference material and lively enlightening reading to all those amateur and professional from the skilled practical musician to the person who has never played anything more demanding than a piece of stereo equipment who love the music of the era that culminated in the great masterworks of bach and handel
