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this short treatise explains in detail the principle of radical pluralism which asserts that the elements alone are realities while every combination of them is a mere name covering a plurality of separate elements the principle has been elucidated by its

contrast with arambhavada which maintains the reality of the whole as well as of the elements and with parinama vada which ascribes absolute reality to the whole the work is divided into sixteen sections dealing with skandhas ayatanas dhatus elements of mind pratityasamutpada karma impermanence in sankhya yoga theory of cognition pre buddhaic buddhism etc it has two appendices dealing with the views of vasubandhu on the fundamental principles of sarvastivada and the classification of all elements of existence according to the sarvastivadins the two indices appended to the work record proper names and sanskrit terms occurring in the work

ourvan offers a succinct but illuminating overview of zen tibetan and soka gakkai buddhism publishers weekly approximately four million americans claim to be buddhist moreover hundreds of thousands of americans of various faiths read about buddhism are interested in its philosophical tenets or fashionably view themselves as buddhists they re part of what s been described as the fastest growing religious movement in america a large group of people dissatisfied with traditional religious offerings and thirsty for an approach to spirituality grounded in logic and consistent with scientific knowledge the star spangled buddhist is a provocative look at these american buddhists through their three largest movements in the united states the soka gakkai international tibetan vajrayana buddhism and zen buddhism the practice of each of these american schools unlike most traditional asian buddhist sects is grounded in the notion that all people are capable of attaining enlightenment in this lifetime but the differences are also profound the spectrum of philosophical expression among these american buddhist schools is as varied as that observed between reformed orthodox and hasidic judaism the star spangled buddhist isn t written from the perspective of a monk or academic but rather from the view of author jeff ourvan a lifelong practicing lay buddhist as ourvan explores the american buddhist movement through its most popular schools he arrives at a clearer understanding for himself and the reader about what it means to be and how one might choose to be a buddhist in america

in posthuman buddhism and the digital self les roberts extends his earlier work on spatial anthropology to consider questions of time spaciousness and the phenomenology of self across the book s four main chapters which range from david bowie s long standing interest in buddhism to street photography of 1980s liverpool to the ambient soundscapes of derek jarman s blue or to the slow contemplative cinema of tsai ming liang roberts lays the groundwork for the concept of dwellspace as a means by which to unpick the shifting spatial temporal and experiential modalities of everyday mediascapes understood as a particular disposition towards time roberts s foray into dwellspace proceeds from a pascalian reflection on the self non self in which being content in an empty room vies with the demands of having content in an empty room taking the idea of posthuman buddhism as a heuristic lens roberts sets in motion a number of interrelated lines of enquiry that prompt renewed focus on questions of boredom distraction and reverie and cast into sharper relief the psychosocial and creative affordances of ambience spaciousness and slowness the book argues that the colonisation of empty time by 24 7 digital capitalism has gone hand in hand with the growth of the corporate mindfulness industry and with it the co option commodification and digitisation of dwellspace posthuman buddhism is thus in part an exploration of the dialectics of dwellspace that orbits around a creative self praxis rooted in the negation and dissolution of the self one of the foundational cornerstones of buddhist theory and practice

buddhism and its religious others examines how buddhist literature and art from pre modern asia understand and represent the character and value of other religions it looks at the strategies employed by indian chinese japanese and southeast asian buddhists to challenge and claim authority over traditions that opposed buddhism and its influence

it is generally accepted in the west that buddhism is a peaceful religion the western public tends to assume that the doctrinal rejection of violence in buddhism would make buddhist pacifists and often expects buddhist societies or individual asian buddhists to conform to the modern western standards of peaceful behavior this stereotype which may well be termed positive orientalism since it is based on assumption that an oriental religion would be more faithful to its original non violent teachings than western christianity has been periodically challenged by enthusiastic acquiescence by monastic buddhism to the most brutal sorts of warfare this volume demolishes this stereotype and produces instead a coherent nuanced account on the modern buddhist attitudes towards violence and warfare which take into consideration both doctrinal logic of buddhism and the socio political situation in asian buddhist societies the chapters in this book offer a deeper analysis of buddhist militarism and buddhist attitudes towards violence than previous volumes grounded in an awareness of buddhist doctrines and the recent history of nationalism as well as the role buddhism plays in constructions of national identity the international team of contributors includes scholars from thailand japan and korea

first published in 2000 the analysis of the tibetan bkah hgyur by alexander csoma de koros struck its readers with the wonderful patience and perseverance of this extraordinary scholar csoma s premature death prevented him examining as fully as

we could have desired the tibetan bstan hgyur to elucidate the difficulties which so frequently beset the canonical works in the bkah hgyur throughout this volume no attempt has been made to criticise the texts which have been studied they are only intended as materials for those who hereafter may undertake to write a history of the buddha

buddhism and postmodernity is a response to some of the questions that have emerged in the process of buddhism s encounters with modernity and the west jin y park broadly outlines these questions as follows first why are the interpretations and evaluations of buddhism so different in europe in the nineteenth century in the united states in the twentieth century and in traditional asia second why does zen buddhism which offers a radically egalitarian vision maintain a strongly authoritarian leadership and third what ethical paradigm can be drawn from the buddhist postmodern form of philosophy park argues that as unrelated as these questions may seem the issues that have generated them are related to perennial philosophical themes of identity institutional power and ethics respectively each of these themes constitutes one section of buddhism and postmodernity park discusses the three issues in the book through the exploration of the buddhist concepts of self and others language and thinking and universality and particularities most of this discussion is drawn from the east asian buddhist traditions of zen and huayan buddhism in connection with the continental philosophies of postmodernism hermeneutics and deconstruction self critical from both the buddhist and western philosophical perspectives buddhism and postmodernity points the reader toward a new understanding of buddhist philosophy and offers a buddhist postmodern ethical paradigm that challenges normative ethics of metaphysical traditions
