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booker shortlisted for time's arrow and widely known for his novels short stories essays reviews and autobiographical works martin amis is one of the most influential of contemporary british writers this guide to amis's diverse and often controversial work offers an accessible introduction to the contexts and many interpretations of his texts from publication to the present an introduction to key critical texts and perspectives on amis's life and work situated within a broader critical history cross references between sections of the guide in order to suggest links between texts contexts and criticism suggestions for further reading part of the routledge guides to literature series this volume is essential reading for all those beginning detailed study of martin amis and seeking not only a guide to his works but also a way through the wealth of contextual and critical material that surrounds them

classroom based writing tutoring is a distinct form of writing support a hybrid instructional method that engages multiple voices and texts within the college classroom tutors work on location in the thick of writing instruction and writing activity on location is the first volume to discuss this emerging practice in a methodical way the essays in this collection integrate theory and practice to highlight the alliances and connections on location tutoring offers while suggesting strategies for resolving its conflicts contributors examine classroom based tutoring programs located in composition courses as well as in writing intensive courses across the disciplines

in the diversity of their clients as well as their professional and student staff writing centers present a complicated set of relationships that inevitably affect the instruction they offer in facing the center harry denny unpacks the identity matrices that enrich teachable moments and he explores the pedagogical dynamics and implications of identity within the writing center the face of the writing center be it mainstream or marginal majority or minority orthodox or subversive always has implications for teaching and learning facing the center will extend current research in writing center theory to bring it in touch with theories now common in cultural studies curricula denny takes up issues of power agency language and meaning and pushes his readers to ask how they themselves or the centers in which they work might be perpetuating cultures that undermine inclusive progressive education

as colleges and universities have responded to the demand of businesses and industries for graduates who can write effectively composition studies has gained significance however while new theories and approaches to the teaching of writing have been proposed and implemented many composition courses do not satisfactorily educate their students this volume includes essays by writing specialists who are concerned with their own failure to improve their students writing skills these contributors examine why entering college students still write poorly and why our various attempts to improve such poor writing skills have largely failed they compare the promise of previously touted new methods paradigm shifts and curricular innovations with the reality of little change or improvement they describe what their students can and cannot do in the writing classroom even after 12 years of primary and secondary education and they address what they see as needed reforms in the whole idea of college composition especially for the first year college student

how do definitions of literacy in the academy and the pedagogies that reinforce such definitions influence and shape our identities as teachers scholars and students the contributors gathered here reflect on those moments when the dominant cultural and institutional definitions of our identities conflict with our other identities shaped by class race gender sexual orientation location or other cultural factors these writers explore the struggle identify the sources of conflict and discuss how they respond personally to such tensions in their scholarship teaching and administration they also illustrate how writing helps them and their students compose alternative identities that may allow the connection of professional identities with internal desires and senses of self they emphasize how identity comes into play in education and literacy and how institutional and cultural power is reinforced in the pedagogies and values of the writing classroom and writing profession
