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the diversity of Nietzsche's books and the sheer range of his philosophical interests have posed daunting challenges to his interpreters this Oxford handbook addresses this multiplicity by devoting each of its 32 essays to a focused topic picked out by the book's systematic plan the aim is to treat each topic at the best current level of philosophical scholarship on Nietzsche the first group of papers treat selected biographical issues his family relations his relations to women and his ill health and eventual insanity in part 2 the papers treat Nietzsche in historical context his relations back to other philosophers the Greeks Kant and Schopenhauer and to the cultural movement of Romanticism as well as his own later influence in an unlikely place on analytic philosophy the papers in part 3 treat a variety of Nietzsche's works from early to late and in styles ranging from the aphoristic the *Gay Science* and *Beyond Good and Evil* through the poetic mythic *Thus Spoke Zarathustra* to the florid autobiography *Ecce Homo* this focus on individual works their internal unity and the way issues are handled within them is an important complement to the final three groups of papers which divide up Nietzsche's philosophical thought topically the papers in part 4 treat issues in Nietzsche's value theory ranging from his metaethical views as to what values are to his own values of freedom and the overman to his insistence on order of rank and his social political views the fifth

group of papers treat nietzsche s epistemology and metaphysics including such well known ideas as his perspectivism his insert included in starkmann 40 promotion september october 2014 being and his thought of eternal recurrence finally part 6 treats another famous idea the will to power as well as two linked ideas that he uses will to power to explain the drives and life this handbook will be a key resource for all scholars and advanced students who work on nietzsche

examines the birth of a new philosophical position resulting from heidegger s notorious confrontation with nietzsche

this book investigates the role of humor in the good life specifically as discussed by three prominent french intellectuals who were influenced by nietzsche s thought georges bataille gilles deleuze and clément rosset lydia amir begins by discussing nietzsche s reception in france and she explains why and how he came to be considered a philosopher of laughter in the french academe each of the subsequent three chapters focuses on the significance of humor and laughter in the good life as advocated by bataille deleuze and rosset these chapters also explore the complex relationship between the comic and the tragic and of humor and laughter to irony satire and ridicule the legacy of nietzsche s philosophy of laughter makes an invaluable contribution to recent interpretive work done on bataille and deleuze and offers further introduction to the relatively understudied rosset it illuminates the philosophies of these three thinkers their connection to nietzsche and overall the significant role that humor plays in philosophy

the way in which we read kant s critique of pure reason has profound consequences for our understanding of his thought in relation to the work of other thinkers kant deleuze and architectonics presents a unified reading of this text in order to respond to the concerns surrounding the method and arguments kant employs in showing us how the first critique comes to make greater sense when read as a whole or in terms of its architectonic unity edward willatt breathes new life into a text often considered rigid and artificial in its organisation on the basis of this reading kant s relation to deleuze is revealed to be much more productive than is often realized deftly relating the unifying method of kant s critique of pure reason with deleuze s account of experience and using kant s concern to secure the conditions that make experience possible to develop deleuze s attempt to convincingly relate the actual and the virtual this book constitutes an important step in our understanding of deleuze and his philosophical project

derrida profanations presents a re appraisal of jacques derrida s deconstruction if philosophy articulates what it means to be human then deconstruction which patrick o connor argues consigns all existence to a mortal profane and worldly life remains radically philosophical the assertion demands an analysis of derrida s radicalisation of the key philosophers who influenced him as well as a rebuttal of theological accounts of deconstruction this book closely examines how the phenomenological lineage is received in deconstruction especially the relation between deconstruction and derrida s radical readings of hegel husserl levinas and heidegger this book presents a theorisation of deconstruction as profane atheistic and egalitarian it reveals how deconstruction holds the resources to think ontology as a multiplicity of worlds through demonstrates the ways in which derrida expresses a phenomenology which disjoins humans orientation to the world deconstruction is characterized as radically hubristic for deconstruction nothing is sacred if nothing sustains itself as separate exclusive or sacrosanct then nothing can sustain the implementation of its own hierarchy

the intensification of interest in deleuze over the last decade has coincided with the end of the linguistic paradigm in both continental and analytic philosophy indeed

the division between the two traditions appears to be closing and the philosophy of gilles deleuze seems to be crucial to this convergence as he is both indebted to the phenomenological tradition at the same time as he operates with concepts drawn from the sciences claire colebrook explores these ideas and offers a new and alternative assessment of deleuze s contribution to philosophy she argues that while deleuze does draw upon sciences that explain the emergence of language art and philosophy his own thought is distinguished by a discontinuist thesis systems may emerge from tendencies of life but always have the capacity to operate without reference to their original aim colebrook makes new claims regarding how deleuze s philosophy might be used to read contemporary art and thus offers an original and crucial contribution to the deleuzian debate

alienation after derrida rearticulates the hegelian marxist theory of alienation in the light of derrida s deconstruction of the metaphysics of presence simon skempton aims to demonstrate in what way derridian deconstruction can itself be said to be a critique of alienation in so doing he argues that the acceptance of derrida s deconstructive concepts does not necessarily entail the acceptance of his interpretations of hegel and marx in this way the book proposes radical reinterpretations not only of hegel and marx but of derridian deconstruction itself the critique of the notions of alienation and de alienation is a key component of derridian deconstruction that has been largely neglected by scholars to date this important new study puts forward a unique and original argument that derridian deconstruction can itself provide the basis for a rethinking of the concept of alienation a concept that has received little serious philosophically engaged attention for several decades

this highly comprehensive and carefully researched study examines the temporal structures underlying the basic concepts of nietzsche s thought the apollinian dionysian relationship the historical and the suprahistorical the perspectival sphere and force then will to power the innocence of becoming justice and eternal recurrence stambaugh also analyzes nietzsche s later writings and discovers that they are gradually extricated from traditional influences particularly those of his early mentor schopenhauer and that they finally deviate from the concept of time as a form in which something happens although a new concept is never explicitly formulated

a clear concise student guide that covers the full range of nietzsche s major works and ideas including a detailed examination of his best known work thus spoke zarathustra

some are expected to protest the conjoining of the two german philosophers arguing that friedrich nietzsche s 19th century vision of politics and critical rationality seems radically at odds with the philosophical contributions of j gen haberman especially his most recent work undaunted scholars of philosophy and political science in europe and

this introduction to nietzsche s philosophical work provides students new to nietzsche with a framework for understanding the central concerns of his philosophical and cultural writings and why nietzsche s ideas continue to spark controversy in philosophy and allied disciplines

nietzsche s legacy for political thought is a highly contested area of research today with papers representing a broad range of positions this collection takes stock of the central controversies nietzsche as political anti political thinker nietzsche and contra democracy arendt and contra nietzsche as well as new research on key concepts power the agon aristocracy friendship i a on historical contemporary and
