this is the second unit of three devoted to an explication of the structure and function of symbols in this unit the emphasis is on the psychotherapeutic use of symbols the following topics are covered ch 1 symbols and mental illness ch 2 symbol theory applied ch 3 regressive symbolization psychotic ch 4 regressive symbolization neurotic ch 5 regressive symbolization psychosomatic ch 6 psychoanalytic symbols and transference ch 7 the use during child psychotherapy of the symbols that occur in fantasies and dreams

folktales from eastern europe presents 71 tales from ashkenasic culture in the most important collection of jewish folktales ever published it is the second volume in folktales of the jews the five volume series to be released over the next several years in the tradition of louis ginzberg s classic legends of the jews the tales here and the others in this series have been selected from the israel folktale archives at the university of haifa israel ifa a treasure house of jewish lore that has remained largely unavailable to the entire world until now since the creation of the state of israel the ifa has collected more than 20 000 tales from newly arrived immigrants long lost stories shared by their families from around the world the tales come from the major ethno linguistic communities of the jewish world and are representative of a wide variety of subjects and motifs especially rich in jewish content and context each of the tales is accompanied by in depth commentary that explains the tale s cultural historical and literary background and its similarity to other tales in the ifa collection and extensive scholarly notes there is also an introduction that describes the ashkenasic culture and its folk narrative tradition a world map of the areas covered illustrations biographies of the collectors and narrators tale type and motif indexes a subject index and a comprehensive bibliography until the establishment of the ifa we had had only limited access to the wide range of jewish folk narratives even in israel the gathering place of the most wide ranging cross section of world jewry these folktales have remained largely unknown many of the communities no longer exist as cohesive societies in their representative lands the holocaust migration and changes in living styles have made the continuation of these tales impossible this volume and the others to come will be monuments to a rich but vanishing oral tradition

this book constitutes the second volume of a three volume study of christian testimonies to divine suffering god s wounds hermeneutic of the christian symbol of divine suffering vol 2 evil and divine suffering the larger study focuses its inquiry into the testimonies to divine suffering themselves seeking to allow the voices that attest to divine suffering to speak freely then to discover and elucidate the internal logic or rationality of this family of testimonies rather than defending these attestations against the dominant claims of classical christian theism that have historically sought to eliminate such language altogether from christian discourse about the nature and life of god this second volume of studies proceeds on the basis of the presuppositions of this symbol those implicit attestations that provide the conditions of possibility for divine suffering that which constitutes divine vulnerability with respect to creation as identified and examined in the first volume of this project an understanding of god through the primary metaphor of love god is love and an understanding of the human as created in the image of god with a life though finite analogous to the divine life the

imago dei as love the second volume then investigates the first two divine wounds or modes of divine suffering to which the larger family of testimonies to divine suffering normally attest 1 divine grief suffering because of betrayal by the beloved human or human sin and 2 divine self sacrifice suffering for the beloved human in its bondage to sin or misery to establish the possibility of redemption and reconciliation each divine wound thus constitutes a response to a creaturely occasion the suffering in each divine wound also occurs in two stages a passive stage and an active stage in divine grief god suffers because of human sin betrayal of the divine lover by the beloved human divine sorrow as the passive stage of divine grief and divine anguish as the active stage of divine grief in divine self sacrifice god suffers in response to the misery or bondage of the beloved human s infidelity divine travail focused on the divine incarnation in jesus of nazareth as the active stage of divine self sacrifice and divine agony focused on divine suffering in the crucifixion of jesus of nazareth as the passive stage of divine self sacrifice

the philosophy of symbolic forms is one of the landmarks of twentieth century philosophy drawing from the influential work of wilhelm dilthey it transformed neo kantianism into a new robust philosophy of culture the second volume on mythical thinking analyzes the fundamental layers of perception and expression as well as the articulations with religion and the dialectic with other forms essentially language and art the intellectual breadth of the volume is remarkable it initiated the debate with martin heidegger and prompted a long lasting meditation by hans blumenberg we are only beginning to recognize its importance for our understanding of the power of images in the construction of aesthetics the self and the socio political world it initiated a discussion within french sociology Émile durkheim marcel mauss that ultimately resurfaced in pierre bourdieu while today it is considered as a resourceful path for cultural and critical theory drucilla cornell and kenneth m panfilio finally this volume also offers solid grounds for a political critique of nazism specifically alfred rosenberg s myth of the 20th century and adolf hitler s mein kampf as well as the new emerging totalitarian ideologies fabien capeilleres professor of philosophy editor of the french edition of cassirer s works this new translation makes cassirer s seminal work available to a new generation of scholars each volume includes a translator s introduction by steve g lofts a foreword by peter e gordon a glossary of key terms and an index

ernst cassirer occupies a unique space in twentieth century philosophy a great liberal humanist his multi faceted work spans the history of philosophy the philosophy of science intellectual history aesthetics epistemology the study of language and myth and more the philosophy of symbolic forms is cassirer s most important work it was first published in german in 1923 the third and final volume appearing in 1929 in it cassirer presents a radical new philosophical worldview at once rich creative and controversial of human beings as fundamentally symbolic animals placing signs and systems of expression between themselves and the world this major new translation the first for over fifty years brings cassirer s magnum opus to a new generation of students and scholars volume 2 mythical thought considers the role of myth in human thought and expression cassirer examines the main features of morphology of myth before tackling the relationship between myth and self consciousness he argues that human beings experience of the world around them is charged with affective and

emotional significance as desirable or hateful comforting or threatening it is this type of meaning which underlies mythical consciousness and explains its disregard for the distinction between appearance and reality from mythical thought religion and art develop cassirer argues making the mythical view of the world the earliest form of philosophical expression correcting important errors in previous english editions this translation reflects the contributions of significant advances in cassirer scholarship over the last twenty to thirty years each volume includes a new introduction and translator s notes by s g lofts a foreword by peter gordon a glossary of key terms and a thorough index
