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this is a special edition hebrew translation hebrew uses the hebrew alphabet with optional vowel diacritics the romanization of hebrew is the use of the latin alphabet to transliterate hebrew words for example the hebrew name

spelled יִשְׂרָאֵל israel in the hebrew alphabet can be romanized as yisrael or yiśrā'ēl in the latin alphabet romanization includes any use of the latin alphabet to transliterate hebrew words usually it is to identify a hebrew word in a non hebrew language that uses the latin alphabet such as german spanish turkish and so on transliteration uses an alphabet to represent the letters and sounds of a word spelled in another alphabet whereas transcription uses an alphabet to represent the sounds only romanization can do both to go the other way that is from english to hebrew see hebraization of english both hebraization of english and romanization of hebrew are forms of transliteration where these are formalized these are known as transliteration systems and where only some words not all are transliterated this is known as transliteration policy english to hebrew of translation of the bible the world's fastest growing bible translation the hebrew transliteration bible is a new edition of the world's fastest growing bible translation this edition is perfect for commemorating christenings graduations and other special moments and will be cherished for years to come this new compact typesetting uses a clearer larger typeface to enhance readability

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this is a literal word for word interlinear translation of the 1900 year old aramaic old testament called the peshitta aramaic was the native language of jesus and of israel in the 1st century ad this volume contains the minor prophets hosea through malachi the last 12 books of the old testament the text translated is the 6th or 7th century codex ambrosianus the oldest complete semitic old testament extant the peshitta old testament was very likely translated from the hebrew bible in the 1st century ad in israel by christian converts from judaism or possibly syrian christians from across israel's border the author has also translated and published interlinears of the aramaic peshitta torah job psalms proverbs and ecclesiastes song of solomon the major prophets isaiah jeremiah lamentations ezekiel daniel as well as the entire aramaic peshitta new testament and plain english translations of the nt the torah the psalms proverbs paperback 8x11 146 pages in b w

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of many words some of the original old testament is aramaic such as daniel chapters 2 through 7 inclusive and ezra 4 through much of 7 it even appears in a verse of genesis 31 461 pages hardback

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in this lexicon tal ilan collects all the information on names of jews in lands west of palestine in which greek and latin was spoken and on the people who bore them between 330 bce a date which marks the hellenistic conquest of east and 650 ce approximately the date when the muslim conquest of east and the southern mediterranean basin was completed the corpus includes names from literary sources but those mentioned in epigraphic and papyrological documents form the vast majority of the database this lexicon is an onomasticon in as far as it is a collection of all the recorded names used by the jews of the western diaspora in the above mentioned period tal ilan discusses the provenance of the names and explains them etymologically given the many possible sources of influence for the names at that time in addition she shows the division between the use of biblical names and the use of greek latin and other foreign names and points out the most popular names this book is also a prosopography since ilan analyzes the identity of the persons mentioned therein the lexicon is accompanied by a lengthy and comprehensive introduction that scrutinizes the main trends in name giving current at the time a large part of it is devoted to the question of how one can identify a jew in a mostly non jewish society

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
