the intention of trauma sensitive theology is to help theologians professors clergy spiritual care givers and therapists speak well of god and faith without further wounding survivors of trauma it explores the nature of traumatic exposure response processing and recovery and its impact on constructive theology and pastoral leadership and care through the lenses of contemporary traumatology somatics and the internal family systems model of psychotherapy the text offers a framework for seeing trauma and its impact in the lives of individuals communities society and within our own sacred texts it argues that care of traumatic wounding must include all dimensions of the human person including our spiritual practices religious rituals and community participation and theological thinking as such clergy and spiritual care professionals have an important role to play in the recovery of traumatic wounding and fostering of resiliency this book explores how trauma informed congregational leaders can facilitate resiliency and offers one way of thinking theologically in response to traumatizing abuses of relational power and our resources for restoration

how the pastor reads a situation theologically will define the possibilities for ministry now and for the church's future the pastor's theological lens affects every ministry task this book introduces students to the importance of theological reflection it tells them why theological reflection is crucial to who they are and what they do and it shows them how they can acquire and strengthen their capacity for theological attentiveness central to wood and blue's approach is the conviction that pastoral character and pastoral practice are mutually formative also through the practice of ministry the pastor's identity is both continually discovered and continually worked on and worked out all pastors must integrate who they believe themselves to be and who they believe god is to be effective leaders

starting right thinking theologically about youth ministry is the first academic textbook that introduces youth ministry students whether undergraduate or graduate level to a marriage of solid research real life and accessible design whereas most college level texts may reflect a thorough though impenetrable mastery of the field they tend to expect readers to plow through unnecessarily thick prose and bland design because it's good for them youth specialties doesn't agree in this debut title to a continuing academic book line college and seminary students will be introduced to real life research real life youth ministry dilemmas and real life solutions contributing writers represent a spectrum of christian education thought and practice as well as widespread recognition in their field transdenominational yet the perfect background to ministry in any denomination or ministry organization this text includes thorough indexes design and graphics that compel readers from page to page now that's a first for a college text organization that permits professors to use any part of the text in any order rather than plod through the entire book from beginning to end a perfect primary text that gives students a rich academic and readable though not popular grasp of every aspect of youth ministry a typical intro course touches while also serving as an ideal secondary text

thinking theologically explores the difference between mystical eastern and juridical western christianity the authors summarize it this way the authentic patristic theologizing of the orthodox church is not an intellectual enterprise but the struggle for the acquisition of the holy spirit as the holy new testament prophet st seraphim of sarov reminds us this acquisition of the holy spirit leads to union with god in christ theosis thus orthodox theologians have been neither academicians nor lawyers but mystics though in an orthodox christian understanding of the word in the west theology has been primarily a dialectical exercise while in the east it has been perceived primarily as an ontological process an existential experience that is the theology must be shaped by a living encounter an actual experiencing in contemplative prayer theoria of the object of the theologizing
