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history memory and public life introduces readers to key themes in the study of historical memory and its significance by considering the role of historical expertise and understanding in contemporary public reflection on the past divided into two parts the book addresses both the theoretical and applied aspects of historical memory studies approaches to history and memory introduces key methodological and theoretical issues within the field such as postcolonialism sites of memory myths of national origins and questions raised by memorialisation and museum presentation difficult pasts looks at history and memory in practice through a range of case studies on contested complex or traumatic memories including the northern ireland troubles post apartheid south africa and the holocaust examining the intersection between history and memory from a wide range of perspectives and supported by guidance on further reading and online resources this book is ideal for students of history as well as those working within the broad interdisciplinary field of memory studies

how does the historian approach memory and how do historians use different sources to analyze how history and memory interact and impact on each other memory and history explores the different aspects of the study of this field taking examples from europe australia the usa and japan and treating periods beyond living memory as well as the recent past the volume highlights the contours of the current vogue for memory among historians while demonstrating the diversity and imagination of the field each chapter looks at a set of key historical and historiographical questions through research based case studies how does engaging with memory as either source or subject help to illuminate the past what are the theoretical ethical and or methodological challenges that are encountered by historians engaging with memory in this way and how might they be managed how can the reading of a particular set of sources illuminate both of these questions the chapters cover a diverse range of approaches and subjects including oral history memorialization and commemoration visual cultures and photography autobiographical fiction material culture ethnic relations the individual and collective memories of war veterans the chapters collectively address a wide range of primary source material beyond oral testimony photography monuments memoir and autobiographical writing fiction art and woodcuttings everyday and exotic cultural artefacts journalism political polemic the law and witness testimony this book will be essential reading for students of history and memory providing an accessible guide to the historical study of memory through a focus on varied source materials

in recent years memory has become a central though also a controversial concept in historical studies a term that denotes both a new and distinctive field of study and a fresh way of conceptualizing history as a field of inquiry more

generally this book which is aimed both at specialists and at students provides historians with an accessible and stimulating introduction to debates and theories about memory and to the range of approaches that have been taken to the study of it in history and other disciplines contributing in a wide ranging way to debate on some of the central conceptual problems of memory studies the book explores the relationships between the individual and the collective between memory as survival and memory as reconstruction between remembering as a subjective experience and as a social or cultural practice and between memory and history as modes of retrospective knowledge

in this book the author provides a comprehensive overview of the intense and sustained work on the relationship between collective memory and history retracing the royal roads pioneering scholars have traveled in their research and writing on this topic notably the politics of commemoration purposes and practices of public remembrance the changing uses of memory worked by new technologies of communication from the threshold of literacy to the digital age the immobilizing effects of trauma upon memory with particular attention to the remembered legacy of the holocaust he follows with an analysis of the implications of this scholarship for our thinking about history itself with attention to such issues as the mnemonics of historical time and the encounter between representation and experience in historical understanding his book provides insight into the way interest in the concept of memory as opposed to long standing alternatives such as myth tradition and heritage has opened new vistas for scholarship not only in cultural history but also in shared ventures in memory studies in related fields in the humanities and social sciences

when people experience a traumatic event such as war or the threat of annihilation they often turn to history for stories that promise a positive outcome to their suffering during world war ii the french took comfort in the story of joan of arc and her heroic efforts to rid france of foreign occupation to bring the joan narrative more into line with current circumstances however popular retellings modified the original story so that what people believed took place in the past was often quite different from what actually occurred paul a cohen identifies this interplay between story and history as a worldwide phenomenon found in countries of radically different cultural religious and social character he focuses here on serbia israel china france the soviet union and great britain all of which experienced severe crises in the twentieth century and in response appropriated age old historical narratives that resonated with what was happening in the present to serve a unifying restorative purpose a central theme in the book is the distinction between popular memory and history although vitally important to historians this distinction is routinely

blurred in people's minds and the historian's truth often cannot compete with the power of a compelling story from the past even when it has been seriously distorted by myth or political manipulation cohen concludes by suggesting that the patterns of interaction he probes given their near universality may well be rooted in certain human propensities that transcend cultural difference

the conventional wisdom about historical memory is summed up in george santayana's celebrated phrase those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it today the consensus that it is moral to remember immoral to forget is nearly absolute and yet is this right david rieff an independent writer who has reported on bloody conflicts in africa the balkans and central asia insists that things are not so simple he poses hard questions about whether remembrance ever truly has or indeed ever could inoculate the present against repeating the crimes of the past he argues that rubbing raw historical wounds whether self inflicted or imposed by outside forces neither remedies injustice nor confers reconciliation if he is right then historical memory is not a moral imperative but rather a moral option sometimes called for sometimes not collective remembrance can be toxic sometimes rieff concludes it may be more moral to forget ranging widely across some of the defining conflicts of modern times the irish troubles and the easter uprising of 1916 the white settlement of australia the american civil war the balkan wars the holocaust and 9 11 rieff presents a pellucid examination of the uses and abuses of historical memory his contentious brilliant and elegant essay is an indispensable work of moral philosophy

in these essays michael s roth uses psychoanalysis to build a richer understanding of history and then takes a more expansive conception of history to decode the cultural construction of memory he first examines the development in nineteenth century france of medical criteria for diagnosing memory disorders which signal fundamental changes in the understanding of present and past he next explores links between historical consciousness and issues relating to the psyche including trauma and repression and hypnosis and therapy roth turns to the work of postmodern theorists in connection with the philosophy of history and then examines photography's capacity to capture traces of the past he considers how we strive to be faithful to the past even when we don't care about getting it right or using it productively roth concludes with essays defending pragmatic and reflexive liberal education drawing on his experiences as a teacher and academic leader he speaks of living with the past without being dominated by it

in the last decade a focus on memory in the human sciences has encouraged new approaches to the study of the past as the humanities and social sciences have put into question their own claims to objectivity authority and universality memory has appeared to offer a way of engaging with knowledge of the past as inevitably partial subjective and local at the same time memory and memorial practices have become sites of contestation and the politics of memory are increasingly prominent this inter disciplinary volume demonstrates from a range of perspectives the complex cultural work and struggles over meaning that lie at the heart of what we call memory the chapters in this volume offer a complex awareness of the workings of memory and the ways in which different or changing histories may be explained they explore the relation between individual and social memory between real and imaginary event and fantasy history and myth contradictory accounts or memories in direct contradiction to the historical record are not always the sign of a repressive authority attempting to cover something up the tension between memory as a safeguard against attempts to silence dissenting voices and memory s own implication in that silencing runs throughout the book topics covered range from the basque country to cambodia from hungary to south africa from the finnish civil war to the cult jim jarmusch movie dead man from the rock and roll hall of fame to australia part i transforming memory is concerned primarily with the social and personal transmission of memory across time and generations part ii remembering suffering trauma and history brings the after effects of catastrophe to the fore part iii patterning the national past the relation between nation and memory is the central issue part iv and then silence reflects on the complex and multiple meaning of silence and oblivion wherein amnesia is often used as a figure for the denial of shamefu provided by publisher

this book focuses on the methodology of research on historical memory and contributes to theoretical discussions concerning the use of historical memory as a variable to explain political action and social movement the chapters of the book conceptualize the relationship between historical memory and national identity formation perceptions and policy making the author particularly analyses how contested memory and the related social discourse can lead to nationalism and international conflict based on theories and research from multiple fields of studies this book proposes a series of analytic frameworks for the purpose of conceptualizing the functions of historical memory these analytic frameworks can help categorize measure and subsequently demonstrate the effects of historical memory this book also discusses how to use public opinion polls textbooks important texts and documents monuments and memory sites for conducting research to examine the functions of historical memory

the advent of the new age has alerted us to the conflicted nature of historical memory which defined the 20th

century while simultaneously assaulting us with new historical upheavals that demand responsibility and critical consideration as the historical text bears traces of the writing subject the element of deception is remarkable meaning historical memory easily lends itself to forgery and false and subjective projections as such how do we think about the past about history about memory and how does memory function is history an objective account a collection of dry reliable facts is it an imaginative narrative tinged with nostalgia a projection of our wishful thinking the workings of our subjective perceptions and attitudes our states of mind the essays in this volume focus on the relevance of the past to the present and future in terms of the shifting attitudes to personal and collective experiences that have shaped dominant western critical discourses about history memory and nostalgia the contributors here take issue with the epistemological hermeneutic ethical and aesthetic dimensions of the representational practices through which we revisit and revise the meaning of the past

this volume explores two themes historical traditions in early modern india et mughal political culture as manifest in the cultures of history writing in bengal it analyses the interaction between islamic cultural traditions in the south asian sub continent with indic vernacular traditions

reflecting the growing interest of historians in memory studies this edited collection examines the relationship between memory and global social movements from 1848 to the present for a long time there has been little attempt by historians to consider memory and social activism in an integrated systematic and comparative way however in recent years scholars have demonstrated that social movements rely on collective memories to assert claims mobilize supporters and legitimize their political visions while also helping to further shape collective memories this book delves into the synergies between memory studies and social movements exploring how social movements have been constructing and creating memories of their own activity how specific landscapes of memory have influenced social movements and how activists have used memory as a cultural resource to further their own goals and ambitions the case studies presented cover a range of different types of political activism including the fights for workers gay feminist and pacifist rights as well as ecological urban and far right movements across the globe portraying the diverse interrelations that exist between social movements and collective memory

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
