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a cofounder of the provincetown players the group that acted as midwife to the american theatre susan glaspell 1876 1948 can also lay claim to be a major figure in her own right her early plays were in many respects as challenging and original as those with which o neill made his debut her concern with language as subject with character as an expression of social role with plot as a mechanism that may ensnare rather than locate the self made her very much a modern in trifles 1916 she developed a feminist critique of social role in the outside 1917 she staged a debate between the life force and a perverse celebration of death in both plays silence becomes an eloquent expression of meaning the verge 1921 is an experimental work of considerable proportions more daring in many ways than anything attempted by o neill though inheritors 1921 is far more conventional it touched a contemporary nerve questioning the nature and reality of american pieties long known only for a single play susan glaspell now emerges as a significant figure in the history of american drama a woman of genuine creative daring

a pioneering feminist playwright and referred to as american drama s best kept secret susan glaspell was a top selling writer in her own time the founder of the first modern american theatre company and a leader in depression era theatrical productions she is also credited with having discovered playwright eugene o neill four of glaspell s plays trifles the outside the verge and inheritors are included in this volume

this is the first book to deal with glaspell and treadwell s plays from a theatrical perspective and presents a comprehensive overview from lesser known plays to seminal productions of trifles and machinal

susan keating glaspell july 1 1876 july 28 1948 was an american pulitzer prize winning playwright novelist journalist and actress with her husband george cram cook she founded the Provincetown Players the first modern american theater company during the great depression she served in the works progress administration as midwest bureau director of the federal theater project a prolific writer glaspell is known to have composed nine novels fifteen plays over fifty short stories and one biography often set in her native midwest these semi autobiographical tales frequently address contemporary social issues such as gender ethics and dissent while featuring deep sympathetic characters who make principled stands a best selling author in her own time glaspell's stories fell out of print after her death during which time she was remembered primarily for discovering eugene o'neill critical reassessment has led to renewed interest in her career and she is today recognized as a pioneering feminist writer and america's first important modern female playwright her one act play trifles 1916 is frequently cited as one of the greatest works of american theater though she remains according to britain's leading theatre critic michael billington american drama's best kept secret

influenced by ibsen and strindberg american drama had its origins in small theatre companies and groups of semi professional players in the early 1900s whose commitment was to inspire such writers as eugene o'neill susan glaspell imam amiri baraka arthur miller and tennessee williams born into this century american drama has acted both as a reflection and as a commentary on the dominance power and sometimes corruption of the american democratic dream today american theatre still challenges its audiences with a powerful voice unknown to television and commercial film bringing to the fore issues of gender colour and political oppression this collection of specially written essays offers a comprehensive introduction to the subject for students wishing to familiarise themselves with this exciting field and those already involved with the current debate in the area will welcome the broad approach adopted by this volume

susan glaspell 1876 1948 was the co founder of the Provincetown Players and won the pulitzer prize for drama she was one of the first playwrights though long neglected the four works compiled in this key edition reveal the profound modernity of her concerns trifles 1916

developed a feminist critique of social roles while *Outside* (1917) opened a debate between the vital force and the unjustified celebration of death. Glaspell showed a considerable proportion of her experimental work in *The Verge* (1921) which was bolder than O'Neill's attempts in many respects. *Inheritors* (1921) is more traditional; it questions the nature and reality of American dedication. Glaspell has long been known for her unique script and has now become an important figure in American theater history.

*Susan Glaspell in Context* provides new accessible and informative essays by leading international scholars and artists on Pulitzer Prize winner Susan Glaspell's life, career, development, writing, and ongoing global creative impact. The first complete collection of the works of American playwright Susan Glaspell, this book includes all of the Pulitzer Prize winner's works: *Suppressed Desires*, *Trifles*, *The People*, *The Outside Woman*, *Sonor*, *Close the Book*, *Tickless Time*, and *Free Laughter*. These eight are all one acts and the full-length plays *Bernice*, *Inheritors*, *The Verge*, *Alison's House*, *The Comic Artist*, *Chains of Dew*, and *Springs Eternal*, the last two of which are published here for the first time. Each play includes an introductory essay along with extended biographical and critical essays. Two appendices give details on both the first runs and select recent productions of the plays.

In this unprecedented fascinating book which covers women in theatre from the 1910s to the 2010s, author Lynne Greeley notes that for the purposes of this study, feminism is defined as the political impulse toward economic and social empowerment for females or the female identified a position perceived by many feminists as oppositional to ideas of femininity that they see as personally and politically constraining and that femininity comprises social behaviors and practices that mean as many different things as there are women, some of which are empowering and others of which are not. This book illuminates how throughout the twentieth century and into the twenty-first, playwrights and artists in American theatre both embodied and disrupted the feminine of their times through approaches as wide-ranging as performing their own recipes, energizing silences, raging against war and rape, and inviting the public to inscribe their naked bodies. Theatre artists have used performance as a site to insert themselves between the physicality of their female presence and the liminality of their disrupting the role of the feminine, capturing that place of liminality, a neither here nor there place that is often unsafe where the established order is overturned by acts as banal as raising a plant. Women have written and performed and disrupted their way through one hundred years of theatre history, even within the constraints of a variably rigid and usually unsympathetic social order, creating a feminist femininity. They have reinscribed their place in the culture and provided models for their audiences to do the same. This comprehensive tome, part of the *Cambria Contemporary Global Performing Arts* headed by John Clum, Duke University, is an essential addition for theater studies and women's studies.

Susan Glaspell was highly regarded in her time and was well known as a Pulitzer Prize-winning

playwright her short stories were regularly printed in the era's top periodicals and her New York Times obituary states that she was one of the nation's most widely read novelists with major achievements in drama, novel, and short fiction. Glaspell is often cited as a prime example of an overlooked female writer deserving canonization. This selection, specially chosen by the literary critic August Nemo, contains the following stories: *His Smile*, *Government Goat*, *A Jury of Her Peers*, *The Anarchist*, *His Dog*, *One of Those Impossible Americans*, *At Twilight*, *From A to Z*.

One of the founding members of the Provincetown Players, Susan Glaspell contributed to American literature in ways that exceed the work she did for this significant theatre group. Interwoven in her many plays, novels, and short stories is astute commentary on the human condition. This volume provides an in-depth examination of Glaspell's writing and how her language conveys her insights into the universal dilemma of society versus self. Glaspell's ideas transcended the plot and character; her work gave prominent attention to such issues as gender, politics, power, and artistic daring. Through an exploration of eight plays written between the years of 1916 and 1943—*Trifles*, *Springs Eternal*, *The People*, *Alison's House*, *Bernice*, *The Outside*, *Chains of Dew*, and *The Verge*—this work concentrates on one of Glaspell's central themes: individuality versus social existence. It explores the range of forces and fundamental tensions that influence the perception and communication of her characters. The final chapter includes a brief commentary on other Glaspell works; a biographical overview provides background for the author's reading and interpretation of the plays, placing Glaspell within the context of literary modernism.

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
