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excerpt from history of prose fiction vol 1 the value of dunlop s history of fiction now again after a long lapse of years placed within reach of the english reader needs no demonstration it is amply attested by the numerous quotations from and references to it in all works even of the most recent date upon the history of imaginative literature the explorations in the field of the genesis and genealogy of fiction have indeed recently attained such extensive development that probably no single writer could now be found bold enough to review such a vast domain as forms the scope of dunlop s undertaking writing at a period when comparatively little had been done in the ground he occupied dunlop was sensible of the magnitude of his task and found it expedient to keep it within practicable compass by confining his attention to works in prose a limitation however as need hardly be said altogether artificial in tracing the evolutions of fictive composition which passes according to certain social conditions and by laws which might almost be determined from verse to prose and again from

the latter to the metrical form in the domain of letters as of material industries increase of labour begets its subdivision and specialization about the publisher forgotten books publishes hundreds of thousands of rare and classic books find more at forgottenbooks.com this book is a reproduction of an important historical work forgotten books uses state of the art technology to digitally reconstruct the work preserving the original format whilst repairing imperfections present in the aged copy in rare cases an imperfection in the original such as a blemish or missing page may be replicated in our edition we do however repair the vast majority of imperfections successfully any imperfections that remain are intentionally left to preserve the state of such historical works

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this 1999 volume was the first to explore as part of an unbroken continuum the critical legacy both of the humanist rediscovery of ancient learning and of its neoclassical reformulation focused on what is arguably the most complex phase in the transmission of the western literary critical heritage the book encompasses those issues that helped shape the way european writers thought about literature from the late middle ages to the late seventeenth century these issues touched almost every facet of western intellectual endeavour as well as the historical cultural social scientific and technological contexts in which that activity evolved from the interpretative reassessment of the major ancient poetic texts this volume addresses the emergence of the literary critic in europe by exploring poetics prose fiction contexts of criticism neoclassicism and national developments sixty one chapters by internationally respected scholars are supported by an introduction detailed bibliographies for further investigation and a full index

in 1933 northrop frye was a recent university graduate beginning to learn his craft as a literary essayist by 1963 with the publication of the educated imagination he had become an international academic celebrity in the intervening three decades frye wrote widely and prodigiously but it is in the papers and lectures collected in this installment of the collected works of northrop frye that the genesis of a distinguished literary critic can be seen here is frye tracing the first outlines of a literary cosmology that would culminate in the anatomy of criticism 1958 and shapethe great code 1982 and words with power 1990 at the same time that frye garnered such international acclaim he was also a

recognizing that every literary era presents scholars with particular challenges this volume covers the best practices and describes important reference resources both print and electronic that can be used in conducting literary research of the british renaissance and early modern period although the primary emphasis is on literature produced in england the guide also covers literature from scotland wales and ireland this book addresses specific research characteristics integral to studying the period including a more inclusive canon and the predominance of shakespeare a dual environment of print and manuscript production the challenges of reading early modern handwriting a lack of reviewing media the role of translations and researching non standardized genres among others central to this volume and to literary research of the era are the equally valid approaches to studying this literature through the more traditional renaissance lens or through the varying theoretical approaches falling under the rubric early modern bowers and keeran explore primary and secondary research resources of this era including general literary research guides union library catalogs print and online bibliographies scholarly journals manuscripts and archives microfilm and digitization projects 17th century periodicals contemporary reception translations and lexicons genres and electronic texts journals and resources a final chapter entitled researching a thorny problem demonstrates how many of the research tools and strategies presented in the volume can be employed to explore a question that perhaps has no definitive answer each chapter addresses how research methods and tools are best used to extract relevant information and compare and evaluate sources the strengths and weaknesses of core and specialized electronic and print research tools and standard search techniques are also examined making this book an invaluable guide to any scholar of the renaissance and early modern era

this work on french literary style covers basic language features various kinds of abstraction language patterns inference narrative structures interpretation and evaluation and poetry drama and prose the book ends with coverage of the kinds of problems excess of inference that can occur

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the major claim made by this study is that early modern english prose fiction self consciously invented a new form of literary culture in which professional writers created books to be printed and sold to anonymous readers it further claims that this period s narrative innovations emerged not solely from

changes in early modern culture like print and the book market but also from the rediscovery of a forgotten late classical text from north africa heliodorus s aethiopian history in making these claims steve mentz provides a comprehensive historicist and formalist account of prose romance the most important genre of elizabethan fiction he explores how authors and publishers of prose fiction in late sixteenth century england produced books that combined traditional narrative forms with a dynamic new understanding of the relationship between text and audience though prose fiction would not dominate english literary culture until the eighteenth century mentz demonstrates that the form began to invent itself as a distinct literary kind in england nearly two centuries earlier examining the divergent but interlocking careers of robert greene sir philip sidney thomas lodge and thomas nashe mentz traces how through differing commitments to print culture and their respective engagements with heliodoran romance these authors helped make the genre of prose fiction culturally and economically viable in england mentz explores how the advent of print and the book market changed literary discourse influencing new conceptions of what he calls middlebrow narrative and new habits of reading and writing this study draws together three important strains of current scholarly inquiry the history of the book and print culture the study of popular fiction and the re examination of genre and influence it also connects early modern fiction with longer histories of prose fiction and the rise of the modern novel

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
