long before the first european explorers set foot on florida soil numerous native american tribes hunted honored their gods built burial mounds and coexisted with one another in pockets of settlements across the state explores the importance of archaeology in preserving the past for future generations how archaeologists do their work and even how young people can gain hands on experience on a real dig the different types of indian mounds burial mounds shell middens and platform mounds and their uses are explained as well as indian languages and reservations provides detailed descriptions of 185 sites on the native american heritage trail that mark important historical events as well as a calendar of important dates that highlights the history culture setbacks and successes of florida s native americans

carol ward examines persistent dropout rates among native american youth which remain high despite overall increases in native adult education attainment in the last twenty years focusing on the experiences of the northern cheyenne nation she evaluates historical ethnographic and quantitative data to determine the causes of these educational failures and places this data in an economic political and cultural context she shows that the rate of failure in this community is the result of conflicting approaches to socializing youth the struggle between native capital and human capital development systems with high rates of unemployment poverty and school dropouts the northern cheyenne reservation provides some important lessons as native americans pursue greater educational success this volume will be of use to policy makers instructors of comparative education native american studies sociology and anthropology

this first volume in the new stories of the susquehanna valley series describes the native american presence in the susquehanna river valley a key crossroads of the old eastern woodlands between the great lakes and the chesapeake bay in northern appalachia combining archaeology history cultural anthropology and the study of contemporary native american issues contributors describe what is known about the native americans from their earliest known presence in the valley to the contact era with europeans they also explore the subsequent consequences of that contact for native peoples including the removal forced or voluntary of many from the valley in what became a chilling prototype for attempted genocide across the continent euro american history asserted that there were no native people left in pennsylvania the center of the susquehanna watershed after the american revolution but with revived native american cultural consciousness in the late twentieth century pennsylvanians of native ancestry began to take pride in and reclaim their heritage this book also tells their stories including efforts to revive native cultures in the watershed and native perspectives on its ecological restoration while focused on the susquehanna river valley this collection also discusses topics of national significance for native americans and those interested in their cultures

since the 1990s the relation between liberalism and colonialism has been one of the most important issues in locke studies and also in the field of modern political thought this present work is a unique contribution to discussion of this issue in that it elucidates locke s concept of the law of nature and his view of war locke s law of nature includes despite its ostensible universal validity some particular rules which favour the rights of a european form of political society and individualistic land acquisition at the sacrifice of native traditional land rights and subsistence concerning wars between settlers and the natives locke s concept of punishment in state of nature allows the militarily superior side to make a war with the inferior in disregard for the latter s claim and nevertheless after winning victory proclaim its own just cause of war by putting locke s discourse on colonization and war in the context of contemporary relations between english colonists and the natives this book makes clear that the expansive element of his theory of property actually overbalanced his rule of limitation of property according to equitableness and that it after all

undermines the general principles of freedom and equality of all in his law of nature

as the first americans hundreds of indigenous bands and nations already lived in north america when european explorers first set out to conquer an inhabited land this book captures the early history of these complex societies and their 500 year struggle to survive against all odds from war displacement broken treaties and boarding schools not only a history of tribal nations native american history for kids also includes profiles of famous native americans and their many contributions from early leaders to superstar athlete jim thorpe dancer maria tallchief astronaut john herrington author sherman alexie actor wes studi and more readers will also learn about indian culture through hands on activities such as planting a three sisters garden corn squash and beans making beef jerky in a low temperature oven weaving a basket out of folded newspaper strips deciphering a world war ii navajo code talker message and playing ball and triangle a game popular with penobscot children and before they are finished readers will be inspired to know that the history of the native american people is the history of all americans

sports mascots have been a tradition for decades along with the usual lions and tigers many schools are represented by native american images once considered a benign practice numerous studies have proved just the opposite that the use of native american mascots in educational institutions has perpetuated a shameful history of racial insensitivity the native american mascot controversy provides an overview of the issues that have been associated with this topic for the past 40 years the book provides a comprehensive and critical account of the issues surrounding the controversy explicating the importance of anti indian racism in education and how it might be challenged a collection of important primary documents and an extensive list of resources for further study are also included expounding the dangers and damages associated with their continued use the native american mascot controversy is a useful guide for anyone with an interest in race relations
