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remember the days of longing for the hands on the classroom clock to move faster most of us would say we love to learn but we hated school why is that what happens to creativity and individuality as we pass through the educational system walking on water is a startling and provocative look at teaching writing creativity and life by a writer increasingly recognized for his passionate and articulate critique of modern civilization this time derrick jensen brings us into his classroom whether college or maximum security prison where he teaches writing he reveals how schools perpetuate the great illusion that happiness lies outside of ourselves and that learning to please and submit to those in power makes us into lifelong clock watchers as a writing teacher jensen guides his students out of the confines of traditional education to find their own voices freedom and creativity jensen's great gift as a teacher and writer is to bring us fully alive at the same moment he is making us confront our losses and count our defeats it is at the center of walking on water a book

that is not only a hard hitting and sometimes scathing critique of our current educational system and not only a hands on method for learning how to write but like julia cameron s the artist s way a lesson on how to connect to the core of our creative selves to the miracle of waking up and arriving breathless but with dry feet on the far shore

when faced with a blank page in their readers notebooks students often fall back on what is familiar summarizing despite our best efforts to model through comprehension strategies what good readers do many students struggle to transfer this knowledge and make it their own when writing independently about books readers writing elizabeth hale offers ninety one practical lessons that show teachers how students of all ability levels can use readers notebooks to think critically on their own one step at a time each of the lessons uses a fiction or nonfiction book to address a comprehension strategy questioning connecting analyzing synthesizing evaluating visualizing or monitoring by showing students one specific way they can write about their thinking each lesson also provides an example of how to model the strategy all of the lessons follow a similar format with five components name it why do it model it try it and share it and include time for students to actively process what they learn by talking about and trying out the strategy in their readers notebooks elizabeth also provides suggestions for supporting student independence managing independent writing time scaffolding comprehension of nonfiction texts as well as assessing and conferencing with readers notebooks helpful appendices include a table that illustrates how each lesson aligns with the common core state standards and a list of additional titles that can be used to demonstrate each of the ninety one lessons readers writing gives teachers a way to engage all children with readers notebooks to learn the language of thinking one strategy at a time and to become lifelong readers who can think and write critically on their own

in this practical guide literacy experts show teachers how to use project based inquiry to build students discipline specific skills and knowledge in grades 6 12 the authors present a five phase framework that incorporates their professional development experience working with over 3 000 teachers by making the intuitive practices of the disciplines explicit within an inquiry process students have opportunities to construct new knowledge by employing practices used by literary critics scientists historians and mathematicians read write inquire responds to the current focus on disciplinary literacy across multiple sets of standards offering a clear blueprint to help teachers meet these standards while also providing students with deep learning across the curriculum this unique approach encourages students to adopt sophisticated literacy practices in the same way the disciplines developed them as a natural outgrowth of knowledge creation timothy shanahan distinguished professor emeritus university of illinois at chicago

after a discussion of current theory and research findings relating to rehabilitation of brain injury this book presents 20 case studies of adults with severe brain injuries sustained several years earlier the causes of their brain damage include traumatic head injuries encephalitis stroke and hypoxia problems that follow such injuries including loss of self care skills memory impairment language reading visuoperceptual and behavioural difficulties are analysed in detail the book describes the premorbid lifestyle of each of the 20 individuals the onset of their brain damage subsequent symptoms neuropsychological assessment rehabilitation and long term outcome most chapters include a report by the patient and or family member thus providing an extra dimension that helps to increase the reader s understanding of the predicaments faced by brain injured individuals as they learn to cope with traumatic changes in

lifestyle although improvement for most brain injured people is slow and limited all those described in this book made some progress after their admission to rehabilitation services the exhaustive analysis of each case and step by step description of treatment will encourage professionals and other care givers that much can be done for this severely injured group for students of neuropsychology and rehabilitation the book should serve as an inspiring and informative supplementary text
