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transnational canadas marks the first sustained inquiry into the relationship between globalization and canadian literature written in english tracking developments in the literature and its study from the centennial period to the present it shows how current work in transnational studies can provide new insights for

researchers and students arguing first that the dichotomy of canadian nationalism and globalization is no longer valid in today's economic climate transnational canadas explores the legacy of leftist nationalism in canadian literature it examines the interventions of multicultural writing in the 1980s and 1990s investigating the cultural politics of the period and how they increasingly became part of canada's state structure under globalization the book concludes we need to understand new forms of subjectivity and mobility as sites for cultural politics and look beyond received notions of belonging and being an original contribution to the study of canadian literature transnational canadas seeks to invigorate discussion by challenging students and researchers to understand the national and the global simultaneously to look at the politics of identity beyond the rubric of multiculturalism and to rethink the slippery notion of the political for the contemporary era

walter smolin works as a line cook in the busiest restaurant in eugene oregon after rising from bed and going about his normal day walter must confront a battle between technology and chopping enough onions for 200 people after arriving at work computer systems fail before the busy saturday night rush and the restaurant is pinned against dire consequences when pencil and paper communication is all they are left with after the chef commits truancy and the acting manager loses his wits walter must fight through a chaotic kitchen insomnia illegible handwriting and drunkenness to deliver sanity to co workers and shrimp scampi to table 16 to be victorious walter must carry his comrades through conflict and himself through a struggle to resolve inner vulnerabilities

this book brings together new theoretical perspectives and bilingual education models from different sociopolitical and cultural contexts across the globe in order to address the importance of sociocultural educational and linguistic environments that create enhance or limit the ways in which diasporic children and young people acquire the chinese language the chapters present a variety of research based studies on chinese heritage language education and bilingual education drawing on detailed investigations of formal and informal educational input including language socialization in families community heritage language schools and government sponsored educational institutions exploring the many pathways of learning chinese and being chinese this volume also examines the complex nature of language acquisition and development involving language attitudes and ideologies as well as linguistic practices and identity formation learning chinese in diasporic communities is intended for researchers teacher educators students and practitioners in the fields of chinese language education and bilingual education and more broadly those concerned with language policy studies and sociolinguistics

recent years have witnessed a rapid rise in engagement with emotion and affect across a broad range of disciplines in the humanities and social sciences with geographers among others making a significant contribution by examining the emotional intersections between people and places building on the achievements of emotional geographies 2005 the editors have brought together leading scholars such as nigel thrift alphonso lingis and frances dyson as well as young up and coming academics from a diverse range of disciplines to investigate feelings and affect in various spatial and social contexts environments and landscapes the book is divided into five sections covering the themes of remembering understanding mourning belonging and enchanting

they were born in the city from people born elsewhere what we all long for follows the overlapping stories of a close circle of second generation twenty somethings living in downtown toronto there s tuyen a lesbian avant garde artist and the daughter of vietnamese parents who ve never recovered from losing one of their children in the crush to board a boat out of vietnam in the 1970s tuyen defines herself in opposition to just about everything her family believes in and strives for she s in love with her best friend carla a biracial bicycle courier who s still reeling from the loss of her mother to suicide eighteen years earlier

and who must now deal with her brother Jamal's latest acts of delinquency. Oku is a jazz-loving poet who unbeknownst to his Jamaican-born parents has dropped out of university. He is in constant conflict with his narrow-minded and verbally abusive father and tormented by his unrequited love for Jackie, a gorgeous black woman who runs a hip clothing shop on Queen Street West and dates only white men like each of her friends. Jackie feels alienated from her parents, former hipsters from Nova Scotia who never made it out of subsidized housing after their lives became entangled with desire and disappointment. The four characters try to make a life for themselves in the city, supporting one another through their family struggles. There's a fifth main character, Quy, the child whose parents were lost in Vietnam. In his first-person narrative, Quy describes how he survived in various refugee camps, then in the Thai underworld. After years of being hardened, he has finally made his way to Toronto and will soon be reunited with his family. Whether to love them or hurt them, it's not clear. His story builds to a breathless crescendo in an ending that will both shock and satisfy readers. What we all long for is a gripping and at times heart-rending story about identity, longing, and loss in a cosmopolitan city. No other writer has presented such a powerful and richly textured portrait of present-day Toronto. Rinaldo Walcott writes in the *Globe and Mail*: "Every great city has its literary moments, and contemporary Toronto has been longing for one we can now say with certainty that we no longer have to long for: a novel that speaks this city's uniqueness."
