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a quirky nervous wreck of a new england mom is forced to face her many fears in this touching uproarious send up of modern suburbia for fans of where d you go bernadette and eleanor oliphant is completely fine people agatha arch s life shatters when she discovers her husband in their backyard shed in flagrante delicto giving the local dog walker some heavy petting suddenly agatha finds herself face to face with everything that frightens her and that s a loooooong list agatha keeps those she loves close everyone else she keeps as far away as possible so she s a mystery to nearly everyone in her new england town to her husband she s a saucy no b s writer to her facebook moms group she s a provocateur to her neighbor she s a standoffish pain in the butt to her sons she s chocolate pudding with marshmallows and to her shrink she s a bundle of nerves on the brink of a cataclysmic implosion defying her abundant assortment of anxieties agatha dons her spy pants a pair of khakis whose many pockets she crams with binoculars fishing line scissors flashlight a leatherman super tool 300 eod candy and other espionage essentials and sets out to spy on her husband and the dog walker along the way she finds another intriguing target to follow a mysterious young woman who s panhandling on the busiest street in town it s all a bit much for timorous agatha but with the help of her bear grylls bobblehead a trio of goats and a dog named balderdash agatha may just find the courage to build a better life

introduction to modal logic and kripke semantics concluding with a discussion of philosophical problems with any logical accommodation of modalities instructors who do not wish to present proof methods will find chapters on truth trees for both sentential and first order logic and a presentation of trees for modal logic special features of this text include presentations of the history of logic alternatives to traditional methods of conditional and indirect proof and a discussion of semantic problems with universal and existential instantiations throughout the authors are sensitive to philosophical issues that arise from the relationship between ordinary language symbolic logic and justifications for the syntax and semantics of the various symbolic languages discussions range from the justification of the truth table for the sentential rendering of if then statements to semantic and syntactic paradoxes including some troubling paradoxes that arise in ordinary language e g the so called hangman or surprise quiz paradox logic and philosophy includes ample material for a one semester or two semester course and provides a thorough preparation for more advanced logic courses

this text is designed for those who desire a comprehensive introduction to logic which is both rigorous and student friendly numerous carefully graded exercise sets accompanied by crisp clear exposition take the student from sentential logic through first order predicate logic with identity the rules are carefully motivated and compared to other systems of rules for sentential and predicate logic the text includes a solid range of additional material including chapters devoted to aristotelian logic informal logic inductive logic and modal epistemic and deontic logics through all editions the goal has been to make symbolic logic understandable for the typical student careful explanation and pedagogy make this the easiest text from which to learn symbolic logic

self knowledge a person s knowledge of their own thoughts character and psychological states has long been a central focus of philosophical enquiry the concerns which occupy ancient thinkers with regard to self knowledge however diverge in critical ways from contemporary investigations on the topic in this volume based upon the eighth keeling colloquium in ancient philosophy leading scholars explore the treatment of self knowledge in ancient greek thought particularly in plato aristotle hellenistic thinkers and plotinus a number of chapters identify specific modes of self knowledge in ancient thought such as knowledge of one s individual moral or political character in plato or one s own discursive thought as compared to that arising from the self presence of intellect in plotinus others identify interesting points of convergence with contemporary thinking to make interventions in existing debates as well as to articulate new research questions such as whether plato regarded self knowledge as synoptic and diachronic in the republic or whether self knowledge is a condition on virtue for aristotle by exploring the distinctions between the fundamental assumptions and conceptual frameworks in which ancient and modern philosophers examine self knowledge this volume makes a novel contribution to current scholarship in the field

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
