her bed when an awful giant mysteriously crashes to the ground upsetting the whole town Binky discovers exactly who is responsible author David Levinthal and illustrator John Nickle retell these classic stories in the style of a 1940s noir detective novel for kids

What would you do if you suspect your best friend who happens to be a giant egg was killed but everyone else thinks it was an accident? Humpty Dumpty was pushed, a collection of twenty-two short fairy tale like stories tackles that question and many more in this collection. Its title story, Chicken Little, is certain his friend did not fall from the ledge and he intends to prove there is a conspiracy. Will he discover the truth before it's too late? Filled with interesting and delightful characters, these short stories ask questions not raised before: Can a reverse vampire find true love? Can the world nose hair champion really make the world a better place? Is it ever wise to stick cheese noodles in your nose? Can one live their life squeezing other people's ears in peace? If a whale and a tiger had a fight, who would win? Incorporating familiar characters in children's literature and folklore, *Humpty Dumpty Was Pushed* tells a series of tales with surprises to keep you guessing. Each story asks a different question and each story offers a different, strange answer.

Things are not always as simple as they appear to be. Some of the time, this is a story about the rise and fall of an automotive giant and the things that led to its downfall. Many of the things that change the way we act and react are a combination of a collection of events. That is the case in this book. Many contributing factors led to the fall of the main character. although the manifestation of what is taken to be indigenous knowledge could presumably be traced back roughly to the origins of humankind the idea of indigenous knowledge is a fairly recent phenomenon it has arguably gained conceptual and discursive currency only over the past half century with a veritable slew of conferences workshops special journal editions and anthologies devoted to the topic yet there has been no treatise that offers a comprehensive critical examination of this notion accounts of indigenous knowledge usually focus on explanations of indigenous local traditional african and the like but to date not a single defense of indigenous knowledge has bothered to explain the particular understanding of knowledge the authors are working with indigenous knowledge philosophical and educational considerations's critique of the idea of indigenous knowledge should in no way be understood as an endorsement of the evils of colonial conquest and ongoing exploitation oppression and subjugation nor should it be taken as an indication of a failure on the part of the kai horsthemke to sympathize with the struggle of indigenous peoples the world over for a dignified and sustainable way of life for personal and communal space and for self determination the aim of the book is to provide especially indigenous educators with theoretical tools for critical reflection and interrogation of their own and others preconceptions assumptions and epistemic practices and customs

in cross x journalist joe miller follows the kansas city central high school s debate squad through the 2002 season that ends with a top ten finish at the national championships in atlanta by almost all measures central is just another failing inner

city school ninety nine percent of the students are minorities only one in three graduate test scores are so low that missouri bureaucrats have declared the school academically deficient but week after week a crew of central kids heads off to debate tournaments in suburbs across the midwest and south where they routinely beat teams from top ranked schools in a game of fast talking wit and sheer brilliance these students close the achievement gap between black and white students an accomplishment that educators and policy makers across the country have been striving toward for years here is the riveting and poignant story of four debaters and their coach as they battle formidable opponents from elite prep schools bureaucrats who seem maddeningly determined to hold them back friends and family who are mired in poverty and drug addiction and perhaps most daunting their own self destructive choices in the end miller finds himself on a campaign to change debate itself certain that these students from the eastside of kansas city may be the saviors of a game that is intrinsic to american democracy
