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this book brings together contributions by thirty scholars of journalism and history who look at what was reported about the holocaust in the press of more than a dozen countries and languages the studies examine the news media in america england and the soviet union in nazi germany and fascist italy in the vatican in occupied countries like romania hungary greece and poland and in palestine under the british mandate by and large the news media in the allied countries neglected the story while those in nazi dominated countries treated news related to the holocaust in a wholly tendentious way thus the press for a variety of reasons did not cover the holocaust one of the central events of the twentieth century as this book thoroughly demonstrates it was perhaps the greatest ethical professional and political failure of the news media during world war ii if the press had been more responsible and had informed the public in the west early enough and thoroughly enough the history of the holocaust might have been different and millions of victims might have survived published in association with yeshiva university press

before 1967 israel had the overwhelming support of world opinion so long as israel's existence was in harmony with politically correct assumptions it was supported or at least accepted by the majority of progressive jews especially in the wake of the holocaust this is no longer the case the jewish divide over israel explains the role played by prominent jews in turning israel into an isolated pariah nation after their catastrophic defeat in 1967 arabs overcame inferiority on the battlefield with superiority in the war of ideas their propaganda stopped trumpeting their desire to eradicate israel instead in a calculated appeal to liberals and radicals they redefined their war of aggression against the jews as a struggle for the liberation of palestinian arabs the tenacity of arabs rejection of israel and their relentless campaign in schools universities churches professional organizations and above all the news media to destroy israel's moral image had the desired impact many jewish liberals became desperate to escape from the shadow of israel's alleged misdeeds and found a way to do so by joining other members of the left in blaming israeli sins for arab violence today jewish liberals rationalize violence against the innocent as resistance to the oppressor excuse arab extremism as the frustration of a wronged party and redefine eliminationist rhetoric and physical assaults on jews as criticism of israeli policy israel's jewish accusers have played a crucial and disproportionate role in the current upsurge of antisemitism precisely because they speak as jews the essays in this book seek to understand and throw back the assault on israel led by such jewish liberals and radicals as tony judt noam chomsky george steiner daniel boyarin marc ellis israel shahak and many others its writers demonstrate that the foundation of the state of israel far from being the primal sin alleged by its accusers was one of the few redeeming events in a century of blood and shame

sources for studying the holocaust provides a pathway for readers to engage with questions about what sources can be used to study the holocaust for many historians the challenge has been how to rescue the story from oblivion when oft used sources for other periods of history introduce even more issues around authenticity and reliability what can be learned of what transpired in villages and towns numbering several thousand people when all its jewish inhabitants were totally obliterated through nazi action who can furnish eyewitness testimony if all the eyewitnesses were killed how does one examine written records preserving knowledge of facts or events where none were kept or survived the onslaught and what weight do we put upon such resources which did manage to endure the destruction wrought by the holocaust each chapter looks at one of a diverse range of source materials from which scholars have rescued the history including survivor testimony diaries letters newspaper accounts photographs trial documents artefacts digital resources memorials films literature and art each chapter shows how different types of records can be utilised as accurate sources for the writing of holocaust history collectively they highlight the ways in which all material even the most

fragmentary can be employed to recreate a reliable record of what happened during the holocaust and show how all sources considered can be employed to find meaning and understanding by exploring a range of sources deeply this book is a unique analysis of the types of sources that can be used to access the history of holocaust it will be of invaluable interest to readers students and researchers of the holocaust

dwight eisenhower s encounter with the holocaust altered how he understood the second world war and shaped how he led the united states and the western alliance during the cold war this book is the first to blend scholarship on eisenhower world war ii and the holocaust together constructing a narrative that offers new insights into all three all while uncovering the story of how he became among the first to vow that such atrocities would never again be allowed to happen from the moment he stepped foot in the concentration camp ohrdruf in april 1945 defeating nazi germany took on a moral hue for eisenhower that had largely been absent before it spurred the belief that totalitarianism in all its forms needed to be confronted this conviction shaped his presidency and solidified american engagement in the postwar world putting these pieces of the story together alters how we view and understand the second half of the twentieth century

when people think of the holocaust they think of auschwitz and dachau not of russia or the ukraine and certainly not a town called kharkov but in reality the first war crime trial against the nazis was in this tiny ukrainian town which is fitting because it is where the holocaust actually began judgment before nuremberg is also the story of dawson s personal journey to this place to the scene of the crime and the discovery of the trial which began the tortuous process of avenging the murder of his grandparents great grandparents and tens of thousands of fellow ukrainians consumed at the dawn of the shoah a moment and crime now largely cloaked in darkness

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
