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one of the century's most spectacular archaeological finds occurred in 1921 a year before Howard Carter stumbled upon Tutankhamun's tomb when Poul Norlund recovered dozens of garments from a graveyard in the Norse settlement of Herjolfsnaes. Greenland preserved intact for centuries by the permafrost, these mediaeval garments display remarkable similarities to Western European costumes of the time. Previously such costumes were known only from contemporary illustrations and the Greenland finds provided the world with a close look at how ordinary Europeans dressed in the Middle Ages. Fortunately for Norlund's team, wood has always been extremely scarce in Greenland and instead of caskets many of the bodies were found swaddled in multiple layers of cast-off clothing. When he wrote about the excavation, later Norlund also described how occasional thaws had permitted crowberry and dwarf willow to establish themselves in the top layers of soil; their roots grew through coffins, clothing and corpses alike, binding them together in a vast network of thin fibers as if he wrote the finds had been literally sewn in the earth. Eighty years of technical advances and subsequent excavations have greatly added to our understanding of the Herjolfsnaes discoveries. *Woven into the Earth* recounts the dramatic story of Norlund's excavation in the context of other Norse textile finds in Greenland. It then describes what the finds tell us about the materials and methods used in making the clothes. The weaving and sewing techniques detailed here are surprisingly sophisticated and one can only admire the talent of the women who employed them, especially considering the harsh conditions they worked under. While *Woven into the Earth* will be invaluable to students of medieval archaeology, Norse society and textile history, both lay readers and scholars are sure to find the book's dig narratives and glimpses of life among the last Vikings fascinating.

Twenty chapters present the range of current research into the study of textiles and dress in classical antiquity, stressing the need for cross and inter-disciplinary study in order to gain the fullest picture of surviving material. Issues addressed include the importance of studying textiles to understand economy and landscape in the past; different types of embellishments of dress; from weaving techniques to the late introduction of embroidery; the close links between the language of ancient mathematics and weaving; the relationships of iconography to the realities of clothed bodies; including a paper on the ground-breaking research on the polychromy of ancient statuary; dye recipes and methods of analysis; case studies of garments in Spanish, Viennese and Greek collections which discuss methods of analysis.

and conservation analyses of textile tools from across the mediterranean discussions of trade and ethnicity to the workshop relations in roman fulleries multiple aspects of the production of textiles and the social meaning of dress are included here to offer the reader an up to date account of the state of current research the volume opens up the range of questions that can now be answered when looking at fragments of textiles and examining written and iconographic images of dressed individuals in a range of media the volume is part of a pair together with prehistoric ancient near eastern and aegean textiles and dress an interdisciplinary anthology edited by mary harlow c[?] cile michel and marie louise nosch

a wide ranging and varied collection of essays which examine surviving garments methods of production and clothes in society the second decade of this acclaimed and popular series begins with a volume that will be essential reading for historians and re enactors alike two papers consider cloth manufacture in the early medieval period ingvild [?] ye examines the graves of prosperous viking age women from western norway which contained both textile making tools and the remains of cloth considering the relationship between the two karen nicholson compliments this with practical experiments in spinning this is followed by tina anderlini s close examination of the details of cut and construction of a thirteenth century chemise attributed to king louis ix of france st louis out of its shrine for the firsttime since 1970 three papers consider fashionable clothing and morality sarah grace heller discusses sumptuary legislation from angevin sicily in the 1290s which sought to restrict men s dress at a time when preparation for war was more important than showy clothes cordelia warr examines the dire consequences of a woman dressing extravagantly as portrayed in a fourteenth century italian fresco and emily rozier discusses the extremes of dress attributed by moral and satirical writers to the men known as galaunts two textual studies then show the importance of textiles in daily life susan powell reveals the austere but magnificent purchases made on behalf of lady margaret beaufort mother of king henry vii in the last ten years of her life 1498 1509 anna riehl bertolet discusses in detail the passage in shakespeare s a midsummer night s dream where helena passionately recalls sewing a sampler with hermia when they were young and still bosom friends

an understanding of textiles and the role they played in the past is important for anyone interested in past societies textiles served and in fact still do as both functional and symbolic items the evidence for ancient textiles in europe is split quite definitely along a north south divide with an abundance of actual examples in the north but precious little in the south where indirect evidence comes from such things as vase painting and frescoes this volume brings together these two schools to look in more detail at textiles in the ancient world and is based on a conference held in denmark and sweden in march 2003 section one production and organisation takes a chronological look through more than four thousand years of history from syria in the mid third millennium bc to seventeenth century germany section two crafts and technology focuses on the relationship between the primary producer the craftsman and the secondary receiver the archaeologist conservator the third section society examines the symbolic nature of textiles and their place within ancient societal groups throughout the book emphasis is placed on the universality of textiles and the importance of information exchange between scholars from different disciplines a small book on finds first aid for the excavation of archaeological textiles is included as an appendix

the north european symposium for archaeological textiles nesat was founded in 1981 as a discussion forum between various disciplines textile archaeologists historians art historians natural scientists conservators and craftspeople the nesat xii symposium was organized by the natural history museum vienna from 21st to 24th may 2014 in hallstatt austria the venue of the 12th symposium was chosen on account of the archaeological heritage of hallstatt as well as the flora and fauna of the whole region which is designated in the unesco world heritage list the conference volume contains 35 scientific papers grouped into seven chapters the first chapters introduce austrian textile research and prehistoric textile finds from europe such as recent analysis of the earliest wool finds and early scandinavian textile design the main corpus of articles deals with textiles and clothing covering a time span from early medieval to the early modern period their archaeological research experiments and art historical context five papers focus on tools and textile production object based research as well as experimental archaeology and investigation of written sources the chapter specific analyses embraces interdisciplinary research including dyestuff analysis isotopic tracing and a drawing system for archaeological textile finds from graves the book therefore provides a wealth of information on recent research being undertaken into archaeological textiles from sites in northern europe

many medieval textiles have been found in archaeological digs in london recently revealing the wide range of clothes available to londoners at that time the authors survey these discoveries and provide new insights into the fashions clothing and textile industries of medieval england and europe
