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shortlisted for the baftss best monograph award 2021 when watching the latest instalment of batman it is perfectly normal to say that we see batman fighting bane or that we see bruce wayne making love to miranda tate we would not say that we see christian bale dressed up as batman

going through the motions of punching tom hardy dressed up us bane nor do we say that we see christian bale pretending to be bruce wayne making love with marion cotillard who is playacting the role miranda tate but if we look at the history of cinema and consider contemporary reviews from the early days of the medium we see that people thought precisely in this way about early film they spoke of film as no more than documentary recordings of actors performing on set in an innovative combination of philosophical aesthetics and new cinema history mario slugan investigates how our default imaginative engagement with film changed over the first two decades of cinema it addresses not only the importance of imagination for the understanding of early cinema but also contributes to our understanding of what it means for a representational medium to produce fictions specifically slugan argues that cinema provides a better model for understanding fiction than literature

a footprint materializes mysteriously on a deserted shore a giant helmet falls from the sky a traveler awakens to find his horse dangling from a church steeple eighteenth century fiction brims with moments such as these in which the prosaic rubs up against the marvelous while it is a truism that the period s literature is distinguished by its realism and air of probability eighteenth century fiction and the reinvention of wonder argues that wonder is integral to rather than antithetical to the developing techniques of novelistic fiction positioning its reader on the cusp between recognition and estrangement between faith and doubt modern fiction hinges upon wonder eighteenth century fiction and the reinvention of wonder unfolds its new account of fiction s rise through surprising readings of classic early novels from daniel defoe s robinson crusoe to jane austen s northanger abbey and brings to attention lesser known works most notably rudolf raspe s baron munchausen s narrative of his marvellous travels in this bold new account the eighteenth century bears witness not to the world's disenchantment but rather to wonder s relocation from the supernatural realm to the empirical world providing a reevaluation not only of how we look back at the enlightenment but also of how we read today

winner of the aldo and jeanne scaglione prize for comparative literary studies from the modern language association winner of the modern language association s aldo and jeanne scaglione prize for comparative literary studies the border between fact and fiction has been trespassed so often it seems to be a highway works of history that include fictional techniques are usually held in contempt but works of fiction that include history are among the greatest of classics fiction claims to be able to convey its own unique kinds of truth but unless a reader knows in advance whether a narrative is fictional or not judgment can be frustrated and confused in the distinction of fiction dorrit cohn argues that fiction does present specific clues to its fictionality and its own justifications indeed except in cases of deliberate deception fiction achieves its purposes best by exercising generic conventions that inform the reader that it is fiction cohn tests her conclusions against major narrative works including proust s a la recherche du temps perdu mann s death in venice tolstoy s war and peace and freud s case studies she contests widespread poststructuralist views that all narratives are fictional on the contrary she separates fiction and nonfiction as necessarily distinct even when bound together an expansion of cohn s christian gauss lectures at princeton and the product of many years of labor and thought the distinction of fiction

builds on narratological and phenomenological theories to show that boundaries between fiction and history can be firmly and systematically explored

the essay periodical and the novel both emerged as new literary genres in the eighteenth century yet there has been no full length study of the formative role each genre played in the development of the other this book uses the lens of periodical studies to reassess what we know about the history of prose fiction examining how periodicals shaped fictionality and how they were influenced by it in return it moves the dial on studies of the english novel arguing that the vibrant interchange between these genres revolutionised the printed world over five chapters that contextualise key authors within london s cutthroat print marketplace the book studies the idea of print ecologies to explain the mutual dependence of the periodical and prose fiction disrupting the often held assumption that the novel emerges from this period sui generis
