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the significance of the virginia statute for establishing religious freedom goes far beyond the borders of the old dominion its influence ultimately extended to the supreme court s interpretation of the separation of church and state in his latest book thomas buckley tells the story of the statute beginning with its background in the struggles of the colonial dissenters against an oppressive church of england when the revolution forced the issue of religious liberty thomas jefferson drafted his statute and james madison guided its passage through the state legislature displacing an established church by instituting religious freedom the

virginia statute provided the most substantial guarantees of religious liberty of any state in the new nation the statute s implementation however proved to be problematic faced with a mandate for strict separation of church and state and in an atmosphere of sweeping evangelical christianity virginians clashed over numerous issues including the legal ownership of church property the incorporation of churches and religious groups sabbath observance protection for religious groups bible reading in school and divorce laws such debates pitted churches against one another and engaged virginia s legal system for a century and a half fascinating history in itself the effort to implement jefferson s statute has even broader significance in its anticipation of the conflict that would occupy the whole country after the supreme court nationalized the religion clause of the first amendment in the 1940s

the first amendment religion clause congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof this book takes an in depth look at the religion clause portion of the first amendment using historical documents and letters in chapter one examples are given of the historical reasons for why the framers of the first amendment the founding fathers thought it was necessary to list religion as part of the bill of rights in the manner that they did in chapter two documentation is presented showing how they applied it during their times of service in government the application of the 14th amendment is examined along with whether or not it should be applied to the 1st amendment based on the history of both in chapter three a complete analysis is made of thomas jefferson s wall of separation letter and in chapter four an in depth investigation is taken into jefferson s virginian act for establishing religious freedom james madison s memorial and remonstrance against religious assessments and madison s detached memoranda essay on religion and government

interaction these documents along with others examined in this book display the founding fathers views as to why there is a religious clause and what its proper application should be between church that is religion and state this book also contains present day solutions for how the government could act legally and constitutionally regarding religion and related religious books and toward those who claim religious reasons as their motivation to physically harm others history reveals the continued purpose and need for the religion clause in the bill of rights

no establishment of religion shows how america s ongoing battles over religion and education immigration polygamy religious funding religious exemptions and more have made the original and evolving understanding of disestablishment of religion a source of perennial cultural and constitutional controversy the authors of the essays in the volume stake out strong and sometimes competing positions on what no establishment of religion meant to the american founders and what it can and should mean for america today

this book explores the right to religious freedom within international law analysing legal structures in a variety of both western and non western jurisdictions the book sets out a topography of the different constitutional structures of religion within the state and their compliance with international human rights law

though much has already been written on religious freedom in the united states these treatments have come mostly from historians legal scholars and advocates with relatively little attention from rhetorical critics in the rhetoric of religious freedom in the united states fifteen scholars from this field address the variety of forms that free public religiosity may assume and which rhetorical techniques are operative in a public square populated by a diversity of religious political actors together they consider the arguments evidences and strategies defining what religious freedom means and who is entitled to claim it in the contemporary united states

an insightful rethinking of the meaning of the first amendment s protection of religious freedom the founders understood religious liberty to be an inalienable natural right vincent phillip muñoz explains what this means for church state constitutional law uncovering what we can and cannot determine about the original meanings of the first amendment s religion clauses and constructing a natural rights jurisprudence of religious liberty drawing on early state constitutions declarations of religious freedom founding era debates and the first amendment s drafting record muñoz demonstrates that adherence to the founders political philosophy would lead neither to consistently conservative nor consistently liberal results rather adopting the founders understanding would lead to a minimalist church state jurisprudence that in most cases would return authority from the judiciary to the american people thorough and convincing religious liberty and the american founding is key reading for those seeking to understand the founders political philosophy of religious freedom and the first amendment religion clauses

in politics taxes and the pulpit nina j crimm and laurence h winer examine the provocative mix of religion politics and taxes involved in the controversy over houses of worship engaging in electoral political speech the authors analyze the dilemmas associated with federal tax subsidies benefiting nonprofit houses of worship conditioned on their refraining from political campaign speech the supreme court s recent citizens united decision invalidating federal campaign finance restrictions on corporations political campaign speech makes the remaining analogous restrictive tax laws constraining many nonprofit entities all the more singular and problematic particularly for houses of worship crimm and winer explore the multifaceted constitutional tensions arising from this legal structure and implicating all fundamental values embodied in the first amendment free speech and free press the free exercise of religion and the avoidance of government establishment of religion they also examine the history and economics of taxation of houses of worship the authors conclude that there exists no means of fully resolving the irreconcilable clashes in a constitutionally permissible and politically and socially palatable manner nonetheless crimm and winer offer several feasible legislative proposals for reforming tax provisions that likely will generate considerable debate if congress adopts the proposed reforms however the revised system should substantially ameliorate the disquieting constitutional tensions induced by the current tax laws and curb the growing emotionally charged atmosphere about the role of religion in the public sphere

whether america was founded as a christian nation or as a secular republic is one of the most fiercely debated questions in american history historians matthew harris and thomas kidd offer an authoritative examination of the essential documents needed to understand this debate the texts included in this volume writings and speeches from both well known and obscure early american thinkers show that religion played a prominent yet fractious role in the era of the american revolution in their personal beliefs the founders ranged from profound skeptics like thomas paine to traditional christians like patrick henry nevertheless most of the founding fathers rallied around certain crucial religious principles including the idea that people were created equal the belief that religious freedom required the disestablishment of state backed denominations the necessity of virtue in a republic and the role of providence in guiding the affairs of nations harris and kidd show that through the struggles of war and the framing of the constitution americans sought to reconcile their dedication to religious vitality with their commitment to religious freedom

a revealing look at the changing role of churches in the decades after the american revolution most americans today would not think of their local church as a site for arbitration and would probably be hesitant to bring their property disputes moral failings or personal squabbles to their kin and neighbors for judgment but from the revolutionary era through the mid nineteenth century many protestants imbued local churches with immense authority through their ritual practice of discipline churches insisted that brethren refrain from suing each other before infidels at local courts and claimed jurisdiction over a range of disputes not only moral issues such as swearing drunkenness and adultery but also matters more typically considered to be under the purview of common law and courts of equity including disputes over trespass land probate slave warranty and theft in law in american meetinghouses jeffrey thomas perry explores the ways that ordinary americans black and white enslaved and free understood and created law in their local communities uncovering a vibrant marketplace of authority in which church meetinghouses played a central role in maintaining their neighborhoods social peace churches were once prominent sites for the creation of local law and in this period were a primary arena in which civil and religious authority collided and shaped one another when church discipline failed the wronged parties often pushed back and their responses highlight the various forces that ultimately hindered that venue s ability to effectively arbitrate disputes between members relying primarily on a deep reading of church records and civil case files perry examines how legal transformations an expanding market economy and religious controversy led churchgoers to reimagine their congregations authority by the 1830s unable to resolve doctrinal quibbles within the fellowship church factions turned to state courts to secure control over their meetinghouses often demanding that judges wade into messy ecclesiastical disputes tracking changes in disciplinary rigor in kentucky baptist churches from that state s frontier period through 1845 and looking beyond statutes and court decrees law in american meetinghouses is a fresh take on church state relations ultimately it highlights an oft forgotten way that americans subtly repositioned religious institutions alongside state authority

the clash between the religious right and the secular left undermines any serious debate about the role of religion in american public life such strident cultural rhetoric often ignores the positive contributions of america s many religions by contrast this volume celebrates america s religious diversity demonstrating that religious pluralism is actually one of democracy s basic building blocks taking religious pluralism seriously expands on barbara a mcgraw s framework for understanding religious participation in public life a two tiered public forum consisting of the civic public forum and the conscientious public forum the chapters explore how diverse religious communities and traditions including newer and marginalized religions can make a meaningful contribution to american society

guardian of the wall examines leo pfeffer's church state thought and its influence on the u.s. supreme court. the book argues that pfeffer's understanding of the first amendment's religion clauses shaped as it was by his historical and religious context led him to advocate a separationist historical narrative and absolutist application of the establishment and free exercise clauses. pfeffer's jurisprudence was pivotal in shaping the u.s. supreme court's interpretation of the first amendment throughout the last half of the twentieth century. guardian of the wall challenges the popular contention that pfeffer's separationist philosophy was hostile to religion and sought to remove religion from the public square. instead, it illustrates how pfeffer believed a broad reading of both religion clauses protected religious freedom, secured religious equality, and fostered authentic participation of religion in public life. the book concludes by analyzing the court's shift away from the strict separation of church and state during the past thirty years and contends that the court should reconsider pfeffer's approach to the first amendment's religion clauses.

in this book, edward erler brings a lifetime of study of political philosophy, the american founding, and the u.s. constitution to the central role of property in american constitutional thought. erler argues that the founders considered the natural right to property as the comprehensive right that included every other right. in this sense, they followed political philosopher john locke but at the same time made significant improvements on locke, making it moral and political. something they called the pursuit of happiness. in the past century, this understanding of the right to property derived from the principles of the declaration of independence has been challenged by the rise of progressivism, which places promoting community welfare above the protection of individual rights as the central role of government. this has led to the administrative state's unrelenting attacks on the right to private property, which have effectively ended the right to property as it was understood by the founders. property and the pursuit of happiness offers a learned and wide-ranging discussion of the values at the core of america's founding that will be of interest to all readers seeking to understand the founders' vision and the profound challenges to it today.
