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freedom of expression and its direct counterpart censorship and silencing are increasingly gaining attention in the world of art and culture through the growth of social media and its worldwide distribution arts and cultural products are shared and the increased visibility and audibility of culture is highlighted through iconic and pivotal clashes such as the fatwa on the satanic verses in 1989 the recurring bans on the music of wagner the alleged censorship of playlists following 9 11 and the cartoon crisis in 2006 this volume takes the discussion directly to the field of music studies in a broad frame and insists on examining music censorship in a global perspective the book addresses the important and increasingly relevant issue of scholarship on music censorship and thus contributes to a detailed understanding of the phenomenon often words and semantic meaning are held to be determining to the restrictions on musicians and singers but as this collection documents the reasons for censorship might not always be found in verbal messages rather the positioning of a more broad understanding of why and how music can convey meaning and accordingly trigger censorship and bans is at the heart of this work the complexity of music censorship includes historical structural as well as emotional listenings and interpretations of sound the topic accordingly is political as well as scholarly urgent

why do people attach importance to the wordless language we call music musical cognition suggests that music is a game in music our cognitive functions such as perception memory attention and expectation are challenged yet as listeners we often do not realize that the listener plays an active role in reaching the awareness that makes music so exhilarating soothing and inspiring in reality the author contends listening does not happen in the outer world of audible sound but in the inner world of our minds and brains recent research in the areas of psychology and neuro cognition allows henkjan honing to be explicit in a way that many of his predecessors could not his lucid evocative writing style guides the reader through what is known about listening to music while avoiding jargon and technical diagrams with clear examples the book concentrates on underappreciated musical skills sense of rhythm and relative pitch skills that make people musical creatures research on how living creatures respond to music supports the conviction that all humans have a unique instinctive attraction to music everyone is musical musical cognition includes a selection of intriguing examples from recent literature exploring the role that an implicit or explicit knowledge of music plays when one listens to it the scope of the topics discussed ranges from the ability of newborns to perceive a beat to the unexpected musical expertise of ordinary listeners the evidence shows that music is second nature to most human beings biologically and socially this paperback edition contains a new afterword that details cutting edge research on musicality and language

this book is for educators including practising and intending teachers in schools and colleges and instrumental teachers it will also stimulate non teachers who are nonetheless curious about the role of music in our lives and will find its way to music lovers musicians and those in the fields of psychology and sociology of music the first two chapters are concerned with the nature of music itself with its value and metaphorical significance and with the social context of musical understanding these are important issues for musicians and music educators the central chapter of the book focuses on music education through practical examples keith swanwick teases out the interrelated layers of musical experience and sets out fundamental principles for music educators whatever the particular context of music teaching in many countries demand for accountability has led to the development of state guidelines national curricula or standards valid and reliable assessment of students work has become an area of concern and is addressed in the penultimate chapter the book ends with a consideration of the relationship between institutionalised music education and the wider community suggesting ways in which formal music education in schools and colleges may adapt to a changing world

this is a very interesting popular account of the theory of chinese music with numerous wood cuts illustrating the principal instruments and the mode of musical notation used by chinese musicians the author states his aim to have been to point out the contrasts or similarity between western and chinese music to present abstruse theories in the least tiresome way to add details never before published and to give a short yet concise account of chinese music after an introductory chapter on ancient music in general or rather on the history of european music which our author believes to have gradually risen and progressed with christianity follows a

chapter entitled on chinese music here we are told that of the ancient music of china nothing remains now but a few abstruse theories and that at the rise of the han dynasty the great music master chi whose ancestors had for generations held the same dignity scarcely remembered anything about ancient music but the noise of tickling bells and dancers drums we venture to say that the author would have modified his opinions regarding ancient chinese music very considerably if he had read faber s essays on the subject in the same chapter it is asserted that ever since the han dynasty nothing has been done of any value in the sphere of music either practically or theoretically that the attempt of kanghi and kienlung to revive the study of music in china failed and that the chinese people erroneously supposed to be quite unchangeable in their predilections have so radically changed in the course of ages that the musical art which anciently always occupied the place of honour is now deemed the lowest calling a man can profess serious music according to mr van aalst has been totally abandoned and the kind of music in which the populace of china now a days delights in consisting of the deafening noise of gong or drum accompanied by the shrieking tones of the clarinet requires no scientific study but as mr van aalst informs his readers at the same time that chinese music must be divided into two different kinds ritual Or sacred music which is passably sweet and generally of a minor character and the theatrical or popular music and as he subsequently describes the ritual music now used at court and at religious ceremonies in the temples of confucius and elsewhere we are constrained to assume either that ritual music is not serious because it is passably sweet or that his previous allegation that serious music is totally abandoned in china goes for nothing the next chapter treats the twelve lii of ancient chinese music and we are told that they form a kind of semi diatomic scale of 12 degrees nearly identical with our chromatic gamut the only difference being that our scale is tempered while that of the chinese is untouched then follow five brief sentences on the pitch of chinese music and we learn that the present pitch approaches our d 601 5 vibrations per second as nearly as possible next we have a chapter on the chinese system of notation illustrated by diagrams a few words on the stave the value of notes the rests the time the signs of alteration of notes the diatonic gamut etc

this collection of essays and interviews addresses important theoretical philosophical and creative issues in western art music at the end of the twentieth and the beginning of the twenty first centuries the book offers a wide range of international perspectives from prominent musicologists philosophers and composers part i is mainly theoretical in emphasis issues addressed include the historical rationalization of music and technology new approaches to the theorization of atonal harmony in the wake of spectralism debates on the new complexity the heterogeneity pluralism and stylistic omnivorousness that characterizes music in our time and the characterization of twentieth century and contemporary music as a search for lost harmony the orientation of part ii is mainly philosophical examining concepts of totality and inclusivity in new music part iii offers creative perspectives with new essays and interviews from important contemporary composers a concluding essay by alastair williams provides a postlude to the book while the whole collection is prefaced by an extended introductory chapter by max paddison which provides a context of ideas and traces many of the issues discussed back to adorno s seminal notion of *une musique informelle*

focus music in contemporary japan explores a diversity of musics performed in japan today ranging from folk song to classical music the songs of geisha to the screaming of underground rock with a specific look at the increasingly popular world of taiko ensemble drumming discussion of contemporary musical practice is

situated within broader frames of musical and sociopolitical history processes of globalization and cosmopolitanism and the continued search for japanese identity through artistic expression it explores how the japanese have long negotiated cultural identity through musical practice in three parts part i japanese music and culture provides an overview of the key characteristics of japanese culture that inform musical performance such as the attitude towards the natural environment changes in ruling powers dominant religious forms and historical processes of cultural exchange part ii sounding japan describes the elements that distinguish traditional japanese music and then explores how music has changed in the modern era under the influence of western music and ideology part iii focusing in identity meaning and japanese drumming in kyoto is based on fieldwork with musicians and explores the position of japanese drumming within kyoto it focuses on four case studies that paint a vivid picture of each respective site the music that is practiced and the pedagogy and creative processes of each group the downloadable resources include examples of japanese music that illustrate specific elements and key genres introduced in the text a companion website includes additional audio visual sources discussed in detail in the text jennifer milioto matsue is an associate professor at union college and specializes in modern japanese music and culture

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
