literature and art begins with an essay that attempts to foster an appreciation of puerto rican cuban and chicano arts and letters it goes on to discuss each people s literature by genre which includes theater the novel poetry and the short story other essays discuss women writers the hispanic oral tradition art music cinema and the spanish language press

environmental history has traditionally told the story of man and nature scholars have too frequently overlooked the ways in which their predominantly male subjects have themselves been shaped by gender seeing nature through gender here reintroduces gender as a meaningful category of analysis for environmental history showing how women s actions desires and choices have shaped the world and seeing men as gendered actors as well in thirteen essays that show how gendered ideas have shaped the ways in which people have represented experienced and consumed their world virginia scharff and her coauthors explore interactions between gender and environment in history ranging from colonial borderlands to transnational boundaries from mountaintop to marketplace they focus on historical representations of humans and nature on questions about consumption on environmental politics and on the complex reciprocal relations among human bodies and changing landscapes they also challenge the ecofeminist position by challenging the notion that men and women are essentially different creatures with biologically different destinies each article shows how a person or group of people in
