in the past decade the national preoccupation has been on the crisis in secondary schools lurking behind the intractable problem of low pass rates the dysfunctional schools and the small number of higher grade mathematics and science graduates is the calamity in primary education drawing on the work of researchers in a range of fields including psychology sociology anthropology linguistics economics the health sciences and mathematics education this book documents the depth and scope of the primary education crisis and provides a comprehensive and rigorous explanation of its causes primary education in crisis pulls together the wealth of research on health poverty resources language and teaching as factors in academic achievement in reading writing and mathematics at the centre of the book is an analysis of the published studies that systematically document what teachers teach and fail to teach and why it is that teaching is at the heart of the crisis in primary education the author suggests that there are no quick fixes but only hard choices and that for reform to succeed it must be evidence based

this book is a response to the loss of learning experienced by children and young people during the covid 19 crisis it examines the measures which were taken to fix the disruption of education and their limitations particularly in reaching marginalised groups drawing on data and experiences from around the world the book examines education systems as ecosystems with interdependencies between many different components which need to be considered when change is contemplated chapters explore the challenges involved ensuring continuity of education for all learners in times of crisis and disruption and set out practical solutions that are relevant when preparing for natural disasters and disasters caused by humans as well as for climate change challenges and future pandemics the focus throughout is on building the sustainability of learners education into education systems to ensure educational continuity for all learners in times of disruption and crisis including tools for planning prompts for reflection and future possibilities to consider education for all in times of crisis will be valuable reading for school leaders educators and policy makers

the national educational crisis can be solved by practical yet inexpensive methods according to carl sommer shortly after becoming a high school teacher he found serious limitations with the education his students received he probed into the reasons why some schools were successful even among traditionally low achieving children while so many others failed to provide students with a proper education he interviewed parents students teachers assistant principals and principals for 10 years he researched to find solutions for the problems facing american education one basic reason for the massive educational decline sommer believes is that many administrators have embraced progressive policies such as not encouraging reasonable educational standards for both students and teachers lack of concern over students deficiency in the basics and permitting unqualified children to advance automatically from grade to grade

lifelong learning has become a key concern as the focus of educational policy has shifted from mass schooling toward the learning society the shift started in the mid 1960s and early 1970s under the impetus of a group of writers and adult educators gravitating around unesco with a humanist philosophy and a leftist agenda the vocabulary of that movement was appropriated in the 1990s by other interests with a very different performativist agenda emphasizing effectiveness and economic outcomes this change of interest described in the book has signified the death of education the learning society

in a postmodern world explores different theoretical resources to respond to this situation mainly those that propose some restoration of an educated public or to the contrary individual self creation and uses the works of a broad range of philosophers and thinkers notably macintyre habermas foucault derrida rorty and baudrillard in addition it raises important questions about postmodern and poststructuralist responses to education in the postmodern world its comprehensiveness and historical background make it an essential textbook for theoretical courses in lifelong learning and in educational theory in general a broad range of interests and subject matter make it important reading for educators policy specialists media specialists researchers on the subject of lifelong learning and on the relation between education and the postmodern world political theorists philosophers and philosophers of education

education is intimately connected to many of the most important and contentious questions confronting american society from race to jobs to taxes and the competitive pressures of the global economy have only enhanced its significance elementary and secondary schooling has long been the province of state and local governments but when george w bush signed into law the no child left behind act in 2002 it signaled an unprecedented expansion of the federal role in public education this book provides the first balanced in depth analysis of how no child left behind nclb became law patrick mcguinn a political scientist with hands on experience in secondary education explains how this happened despite the country s long history of decentralized school governance and the longstanding opposition of both liberals and conservatives to an active reform oriented federal role in schools his book provides the essential political context for understanding nclb the controversies surrounding its implementation and forthcoming debates over its reauthorization how the struggle to define the federal role in school reform took center stage in debates over the appropriate role of the government in promoting opportunity and social welfare he places the evolution of the federal role in schools within the context of broader institutional ideological and political changes that have swept the nation since the 1965 elementary and secondary education act chronicles the concerns raised by the 1983 report a nation at risk and shows how education became a major campaign issue for both parties in the 1990s mcguinn argues that the emergence of swing issues such as education can facilitate major policy change even as they influence the direction of wider political debates and partisan conflict mcguinn traces the republican shift from seeking to eliminate the u s department of education to embracing federal leadership in school reform then details the negotiations over nclb the forces that shaped its final provisions and the ways in which the law constitutes a new federal education policy regime against which states have now begun to rebel and that only by understanding the unique dynamics of national education politics will reformers be able to craft a more effective national role in school reform
