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moving roughly chronologically an anthology of chinese literature gathers texts according to genres  
themes forms and other groupings to show the way essential texts build off one another and how the  
tradition echoes itself including a range of forms songs letters anecdotes stories plays political oratory  
traditional literary theory and more the anthology s innovative structure breaks new ground by  
providing a previously unavailable view of the interplay between chinese literature culture and history  
to alert non chinese readers to what premodern chinese readers would have noticed instinctively  
helpful apparatus including a general introduction describing the evolution of chinese literature a note  
on translation period introductions a timeline and interpretive commentary make the tradition  
accessible not only to the student of chinese literature but also to the general reader book jacket title  
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adopting new theoretical perspectives and using updated research this book by a leading chinese

this book includes the history of chinese literature before 1949 it firstly outlines the development  
process of chinese literature and basic features and then discusses them according to the literary genre  
for the literature of each era this book gathers established scholars in the field and presents their latest  
research in the chinese literature history studies moreover it has included the literature history of  
different nationalities in the history of china and the records of folk literature history reflecting literature  
from different classes in the limited space of this book the writers who have been loved by the chinese  
people for three thousand years are discussed such as qu yuan tao yuanming li bai du fu su shi xin qiji  
yuan haowen nalan xingde and so on careful elaborations are made on each writer together with  
quotations and analysis of their work

the book is the volume of the literature history in remote antiquity period and the three dynasties xia

shang and zhou dynasty among a series of books of deep into china histories the earliest known written records of the history of china date from as early as 1250 bc from the shang dynasty c 1600 1046 bc and the bamboo annals 296 bc describe a xia dynasty c 2070 1600 bc before the shang but no writing is known from the period the shang ruled in the yellow river valley which is commonly held to be the cradle of chinese civilization however neolithic civilizations originated at various cultural centers along both the yellow river and yangtze river these yellow river and yangtze civilizations arose millennia before the shang with thousands of years of continuous history china is one of the world s oldest civilizations and is regarded as one of the cradles of civilization the zhou dynasty 1046 256 bc supplanted the shang and introduced the concept of the mandate of heaven to justify their rule the central zhou government began to weaken due to external and internal pressures in the 8th century bc and the country eventually splintered into smaller states during the spring and autumn period these states became independent and warred with one another in the following warring states period much of traditional chinese culture literature and philosophy first developed during those troubled times in 221 bc qin shi huang conquered the various warring states and created for himself the title of huangdi or emperor of the qin marking the beginning of imperial china however the oppressive government fell soon after his death and was supplanted by the longer lived han dynasty 206 bc 220 ad successive dynasties developed bureaucratic systems that enabled the emperor to control vast territories directly in the 21 centuries from 206 bc until ad 1912 routine administrative tasks were handled by a special elite of scholar officials young men well versed in calligraphy history literature and philosophy were carefully selected through difficult government examinations china s last dynasty was the qing 1644 1912 which was replaced by the republic of china in 1912 and in the mainland by the people s republic of china in 1949 chinese history has alternated between periods of political unity and peace and periods of war and failed statehood the most recent being the chinese civil war 1927 1949 china was occasionally dominated by steppe peoples most of whom were eventually assimilated into the han chinese culture and population between eras of multiple kingdoms and warlordism chinese dynasties have ruled parts or all of china in some eras control stretched as far as xinjiang and tibet as at present traditional culture and influences from other parts of asia and the western world carried by waves of immigration cultural assimilation expansion and foreign contact form the basis of the modern culture of china

this handbook presents thorough literature reviews and detailed analyses on the development of china s social sciences research since the reform and opening up in 1978 the handbook is comprised of 4 sections politics and law sociology and economics demography and education journalism studies and library science written and edited by leading scholars from peking university each volume critiques the research findings and provides guidance for future investigations of the respective field given its scope the handbook will offer international academics an in depth and up to date understanding of the development of chinese scholars research on chinese social sciences over the past forty years

the studies contained in this volume arose over the last thirty years originally the range of the materials i intended to include in my selection was very much wider publishing difficulties however have obliged me to curtail them to something less than half the planned content at first i intended to include all the studies i supposed might be of interest to readers and represent contributions still of some significance for research in this domain of oriental scholarship when the necessity arose to limit the contents i gave

preference to the standpoint of thematic completeness rather than to what would be of interest to the general reader thus in this volume i have confined myself to two thematic fields only old chinese literature and studies dealing with mediaeval storytellers productions hua pen i have excluded the whole complex of historical studies and all studies relating to the new literature i am now preparing on the principal historical theme on which i was engaged already in the period of my studies in prague under prof j bidlo and then in 1928 till 1930 with prof b karlgren in sweden and prof g haloun in halle in germany a more compendious study in which i hope to sum up the results of my research and i also intend to publish a volume of selected studies dealing with the new chinese literature at some later date

a history of chinese literature is a history of chinese literature written by herbert giles and published in 1901 although there had been surveys of chinese literature in japanese it was the first such survey to appear in english
