sources show qu yuan 340 278 bce was the first person in china to become famous for his poetry so famous in fact that the chinese celebrate his life with a national holiday called poet s day or the dragon boat festival his work which forms the core of the the songs of chu the second oldest anthology of chinese poetry derives its imagery from shamanistic ritual its shaman hymns are among the most beautiful and mysterious liturgical works in the world the religious milieu responsible for their imagery supplies the backdrop for his most famous work li sao which translates shamanic longing for a spirit lover into the

yearning for an ideal king that is central to the ancient philosophies of china qu yuan was as important to the development of chinese literature as homer was to the development of western literature this translation attempts to replicate what the work might have meant to those for whom it was originally intended rather than settle for what it was made to mean by those who inherited it it accounts for the new view of the state of chu that recent discoveries have inspired

a magisterial book of nearly five hundred poems from some of history s greatest chinese poets translated and edited by a renowned poet and scholar new republic the chinese poetic tradition is the largest and longest continuous tradition in world literature this rich and far reaching anthology of nearly five hundred poems provides a comprehensive account of its first three millennia 1500 bce to 1200 ce the period during which virtually all its landmark developments took place unlike earlier anthologies of chinese poetry hinton s book focuses on a relatively small number of poets providing selections that are large enough to re create each as a fully realized and unique voice new introductions to each poet s work provide a readable history told for the first time as a series of poetic innovations forged by a series of master poets david hinton has lured into english a new manner of hearing the great poets of that long glory of china s classical age his achievement is another echo of the original and a gift to our language w s merwin

in this guided anthology experts lead students through the major genres and eras of chinese poetry from antiquity to the modern time the volume is divided into 6 chronological sections and features more than 140 examples of the best shi sao fu ci and qu poems a comprehensive introduction and extensive thematic table of contents highlight the thematic formal and prosodic features of chinese poetry and each chapter is written by a scholar who specializes in a particular period or genre
