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the literature of satire is an accessible but sophisticated and wide ranging study of satire from the classics to the present in plays novels and the press as well as in verse in it charles knight analyses the rhetorical problems created by satire s complex relations to its community and examines how it exploits the genres it borrows he argues that satire derives from an awareness of the differences between appearance ideas and discourse knight provides illuminating readings of such satirists familiar and unfamiliar as horace lucian jonson molière swift pope byron flaubert ostrovsky kundera and rushdie this broad ranging examination sheds light on the nature and functions of satire as a mode of writing as well as on theoretical approaches to it it will be of interest to scholars interested in literary theory as well as those specifically interested in satire

an exhaustive study of satire in the long eighteenth century outstanding academic title choice in the practice of satire in england 1658 1770 ashley marshall explores how satire was conceived and understood by writers and readers of the period her account is based on a reading of some 3 000 works ranging from one page squibs to novels the objective is not to recuperate particular minor works but to recover the satiric milieu to resituate the masterpieces amid the hundreds of other works alongside which they were originally written and read the long eighteenth century is generally hailed as the great age of satire and as such it has received much critical attention however scholars have focused almost exclusively on a small number of canonical works such as gulliver s travels and the dunciad and have not looked for continuity over time marshall revises the standard account of eighteenth century satire revealing it to be messy confused and discontinuous exhibiting radical and rapid changes over time the true history of satire in its great age is not a history at all rather it is a collection of episodic little histories

this book advances a model for the analysis of contemporary satirical humour combining a range of theoretical

frameworks in stylistics pragmatics and discourse analysis simpson examines both the methods of textual composition and the strategies of interpretation for satire verbal irony is central to the model in respect of which simpson isolates three principal ironic phases that shape the uptake of satirical humour throughout the book consistent emphasis is placed on satire's status as a culturally situated discursive practice while the categories of the model proposed are amply illustrated with textual examples a notable feature of the book is a chapter on the legal implications of using satirical humour as a weapon of attack in the public domain a book where jonathan swift meets private eye magazine this entertaining and thought provoking study will interest those working in stylistics humorology pragmatics and discourse analysis it also has relevance for forensic discourse analysis and for media literary and cultural studies

satire according to jonathan swift is a mirror where beholders generally discover everybody's face but their own and over twenty four centuries the mirror of satirical literature has taken on many shapes yet certain techniques recur continually certain themes are timeless and some targets are perennial politics the mismanagement of men by other men has always been a target of satire as has the war between sexes the universality of satire as a mode and creative impulse is demonstrated by the cross cultural development of lampoon and travesty its deep roots and variety are shown by the persistence of allegory fable aphorism and other literary subgenres hodgart analyzes satire at some of its most exuberant moments in western literature from aristophanes to brecht his analysis is supplemented by a selection and discussion of prints and cartoons satire continues to help us make sense of the conventions that seem to have been almost genetically transmitted from their satiric ancestors to our digital contemporaries this is especially evident in hodgart's repeated references to satire's predilection for the ephemeral

for camouflaging itself among the everyday for speaking to the moment and thus for integrating itself as deeply as possible into society brian connery's new introduction places hodgart's analysis in its proper place in the development of twentieth century criticism

excerpt from english satire and satirists the word satire then has more than one meaning as there is a comic spirit so there is a satiric spirit and as there is a form of the drama we call comedy so there is a form of verse we call satire but as the comic spirit may manifest itself in the novel or the poem no less than in the comedy so the satiric spirit may appear in prose as well as in verse and both in verse and in prose it assumes manifold shapes there are satirical novels and tales essays and allegories there are satirical lyrics and even satirical odes and paradise lost itself contains fragments of satire what may be called the classical satire of england is derived from the satire of the latin poets and as the latin satirists adopted the hexameter so their english imitators used the english equivalent the heroic couplet when hall wrote the often quoted lines i first adventure follow me who list and be the second english satirist about the publisher forgotten books publishes hundreds of thousands of rare and classic books find more at forgottenbooks.com this book is a reproduction of an important historical work forgotten books uses state of the art technology to digitally reconstruct the work preserving the original format whilst repairing imperfections present in the aged copy in rare cases an imperfection in the original such as a blemish or missing page may be replicated in

from the introduction satire though a form of literature familiar to everyone is difficult to define partaking variously of sarcasm irony ridicule and burlesque it is exactly synonymous with no one of these satire is primarily dependent on the motive of its writer unless meant for satire it is not the real thing unconscious satire is a contradiction of terms or a mere figure of speech secondarily satire depends on the reader what seems to us satire to day may not seem so tomorrow or what seems satire to a pessimistic mind may seem merely good natured chaff to an optimist this of course refers to the subtler forms of satire many classic satires are direct lampoons or broadsides which admit of only one interpretation literature numbers many satirists among its most honoured names and the best satires show intellect education and a keen appreciation of human nature nor is satire necessarily vindictive or spiteful often its best examples show a kindly tolerance for the vice or folly in question and even hint a tacit acceptance of the conditions condemned again in the hands of a carping and unsympathetic critic satire is used with vitriolic effects on sins for which the writer has no mercy this lashing form of satire was doubtless the earliest type the greeks show sardonic examples of it but the romans allowed a broader sense of humour to soften the satirical sting following and outstripping lucilius horace is the acknowledged father of satire and was himself followed and in the opinion of some outstripped by juvenal but the works of the ancient satirists are of interest mainly to scholars and cannot be included in a collection destined for a popular audience the present volume therefore is largely made up from the products of more recent centuries from the times of horace and juvenal down through the mediaeval ages to the present day satires may be divided into the two classes founded by the two great masters the work of horace s followers marked

by humour and tolerance that of juvenal s imitators by bitter invective on the one side the years have arrayed such names as chaucer swift goldsmith and thackeray on the other langland dryden pope and burns a scholarly gentleman of our own day classifies satires in three main divisions those directed at society those which ridicule political conditions and those aimed at individual characters these variations of the art of satire form a fascinating study and to one interested in the subject this small collection of representative satires can be merely a series of guide posts it is the compiler s regret that a great mass of material is necessarily omitted for lack of space other selections are discarded because of their present untimeliness which deprives them of their intrinsic interest but an endeavour has been made to represent the greatest and best satiric writers and also to include at least extracts from the masterpieces of satire it is often asked why we have no satire at the present day many answers have been given but one reason is doubtless to be found in the acceleration of the pace of life fads and foibles follow one another so quickly that we have time neither to write nor read satiric disquisitions upon them another reason lies in the fact that we have achieved a broader and more tolerant human outlook again the true satirist must be possessed of earnestness and sincerity and it is a question whether the mental atmosphere of the twentieth century tends to stimulate and foster those qualities these explanations however seem to apply to american writers more especially than to english the leisurely thinking briton with his more personal viewpoint has produced and is even now producing satires marked by strength
