restrictive nature sparked outrage and led to increased calls for federal intervention contributing to the passage of Reconstruction legislation 3 Q How did the Radical Republicans differ from President Johnson's approach to Reconstruction A Radical Republicans favored a harsher approach to Reconstruction advocating for greater federal intervention in the South to protect the rights of African Americans They pushed for 4 legislation like the Reconstruction Acts which aimed to secure Black voting rights and punish former Confederates President Johnson on the other hand favored a more lenient approach advocating for rapid reintegration of the Southern states with minimal federal intervention 4 Q What was the significance of the impeachment of President Andrew Johnson A The impeachment of Andrew Johnson though unsuccessful in removing him from office represented a major clash between the executive and legislative branches regarding Reconstruction policy It highlighted the deep divisions over the proper path to rebuilding the nation and the protection of African American rights The near success of the impeachment further empowered the Radical Republicans in shaping Reconstruction 5 Q How did Reconstruction ultimately end and what was its legacy A Reconstruction officially ended with the Compromise of 1877 which effectively removed federal troops from the South The legacy of Reconstruction is complex and multifaceted marked by both significant progress in securing rights for African Americans and a failure to fully address the deeply ingrained racial inequalities that persisted in the South The period laid the groundwork for future civil rights struggles and left a lasting impact on American politics and society

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
