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arab voices in diaspora offers a wide ranging overview and an insightful study of the field of anglophone arab literature produced across the world the first of its kind it chronicles the development of this literature from its inception at the turn of the past century until the post 9 11 era the book sheds light not only on the historical but also on the cultural and aesthetic value of this literary production which has so far received little scholarly attention it also seeks to place anglophone arab literary works within the larger nomenclature of postcolonial emerging and ethnic literature as it finds that the authors are haunted by the same hybrid exilic and diasporic questions that have dogged their fellow postcolonialists issues of belonging loyalty and affinity are recognized and dealt with in the various essays as are the various concerns involved in cultural and relational identification the contributors to this volume come from different national backgrounds and share in examining the nuances of this emerging literature authors discussed include elmaz abinader diana abu jaber leila aboulela leila ahmed rabih alameddine edward atiyah shaw dallal ibrahim fawal fadia faqir khalil gibran suheir hammad loubna haikal nada awar jarrar jad el hage lawrence joseph mohja kahf jamal mahjoub

each day in so many aspects of daily life we are reminded of the significance of migration and ethnicity this book is a critical contribution to the understanding of the phenomena of migration and ethnicity from a swedish vantage point looking outwards towards a european context it presents current academic debates and gives a theoretical overview of nine key concepts in the field of ethnic and migrations studies but it also exemplifies how these concepts could be used in analysing specific empirical cases it explores the following concepts ethnicity migration diaspora citizenship intersectionality racism right wing populism social exclusion and informalisation the book is interdisciplinary embracing areas such as labour studies economic history ethnicity business administration gender studies literature studies economics educational science social anthropology social work sociology and political science

the book deals with two types of african diasporas the first of which originated in the migration histories of the indian ocean and brought new groups into africa this is illustrated by case studies of hadrami communities in sudan and zanzibar and the malay community in cape town that produced trade links as well as processes of islamization the second type originated with the failing african states and cases discussed are an eritrean diaspora in germany alongside sudanese diasporas in norway and the usa and a somali diaspora in norway the papers deal with processes of homemaking political mobilization in the diaspora through local organizations religious networks and cyberspace nationalism the central conceptual argument is that diaspora is not only a post modern reaction to the xenophobia of western nation states but must be seen as part of a broader history of human migration and intercultural experience this calls for a perspective that takes into consideration historically produced variation and dynamism

in this book yasmin hussain uses ideas of cultural hybridity diaspora and identity to explore cultural production by british south asian women including monica ali meera syal and gurinder chadha hussain provides a sociological analysis of the contexts and experiences of the british south asian community discussing key concerns that emerge within the work of this new generation of women writers and which express more widespread debates within the community in particular these authors address issues of individual and group identity and the ways in which these are affected by ethnicity and gender

contains papers that debate and formulate theoretical concepts about indiana diaspora like homeland acculturation religion caste ethnicity double citizenship gender and related issues also analyse the successes and failures of indian diaspora in various countries figian diaspra writings fo punjabi diaspora asian women a reference tool for those interested in theoretical issues related to indian diaspora

in latin america and the caribbean racial issues are extremely complex and fluid particularly the nature of blackness what it means to be called black is still very different for an african american living in the united states than it is for an individual in the dominican republic with an african ancestry racial categories were far from concrete as the dominican populace grew altered and solidified around the present notions of identity kimberly simmons explores the fascinating socio cultural shifts in dominicans racial categories concluding that dominicans are slowly embracing blackness and ideas of african ancestry simmons also examines the movement of individuals between the dominican republic and the united states where traditional notions of indio are challenged debated and called into question

how and why dominicans define their racial identities reveal shifting coalitions between caribbean peoples and african americans and proves intrinsic to understanding identities in the african diaspora

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
