offering a unique debate format the third edition of the bestselling *arguing about art* is ideal for newcomers to aesthetics or philosophy of art this lively collection presents an extensive range of short clear introductions to each of the discussions which include sentimetality appreciation interpretation understanding objectivity nature food horror with revised introductions updated suggestions for further reading and new sections on pornography and societies without art *arguing about art* provides a stimulating and accessible anthology suitable for those coming to aesthetics for the first time the book will also appeal to students of art history literature and cultural studies

this is an anthology covering 11 topics or debates in the philosophy of art some of which have only recently emerged whilst others have been debated for centuries each chapter contains two or more articles on the topic preceded by a short introduction to the topic and followed by a select bibliography a wide range of art forms are covered as is the topic of appreciating nature

in 1797 friedrich schlegel wrote that philosophy of art usually lacks one of two things either the philosophy or the art this collection of essays contains both the philosophy and the art it brings together an international team of leading philosophers to address diverse philosophical issues raised by recent works of art each essay engages with a specific artwork and explores the connection between the image and the philosophical content thirteen contemporary philosophers demonstrate how philosophy can aid interpretation of the work of ten contemporary artists including jesse prinz on john currin barry c smith and edward winters on dexter dalwood lydia goehr and sam rose on tom de freston raymond geuss on adrian ghenie and chantal joffe hallvard lillehammer on paul noble m m mccabe and alexis papazoglou on ged quinn noël carroll on paula rego simon blackburn and jerrold levinson on george shaw sondra bacharach on yue minjun the discussion ranges over ethical political psychological and religious concepts such as irony disgust apathy inequality physiognomy and wonder to historical experiences of war marx inspired political movements and thatcherism and standard problems in the philosophy of art such as expression style depiction and ontology of art as well as major topics in art history such as vanitas painting photography pornography and dadaism many of the contributors are distinguished in areas of philosophy other than aesthetics and are writing about art for the first time all show how productive the engagement can be between philosophy more generally and art

the classic and provocative account of how art changed irrevocably with pop art and why traditional aesthetics can't make sense of contemporary art a classic of art criticism and philosophy after the end of art continues to generate heated debate for its radical and famous assertion that art ended in the 1960s arthur danto a philosopher who was also one of the leading art critics of his time argues that traditional notions of aesthetics no longer apply to contemporary art and that we need a philosophy of art criticism that can deal with perhaps the most perplexing feature of current art that everything is possible an insightful and entertaining exploration of art's most important aesthetic and philosophical issues conducted by an acute observer of contemporary art after the end of art argues that with the eclipse of abstract expressionism art deviated irrevocably from the narrative course that vasari helped define for it in the renaissance moreover danto makes the case for a new type of criticism that can help us understand art in a posthistorical age where for example an artist can produce a work in the style of rembrandt to create a visual pun and where traditional theories cannot explain the difference between andy warhol's brillo box and the product found in the grocery store after the end of art addresses art history pop art people's art the future role of museums and the critical contributions of clement greenberg whose aesthetics based criticism helped a previous generation make sense of modernism tracing art history from a mimetic tradition the idea that art was a progressively more adequate representation of reality through the modern era of manifestos when art was defined by the artist's philosophy danto shows that it wasn't until the invention of pop art that the historical understanding of the means and ends of art was nullified even modernist art which tried to break with the past by questioning the ways in which art was produced hinged on a narrative

the present volume is a continuation of the series contemporary philosophy as with the earlier volumes in the series the present chronicles purport to give a survey of significant trends in contemporary philosophy the need for such surveys has i believe increased rather than decreased over the years the philosophical scene appears for various reasons more complex than ever before the continuing process of specialization in most branches the increasing contact between philosophers from various cultures the emergence of new schools of thought particularly in philosophical logic and in the philosophy of language and ethics and the increasing attention being paid to the history of philosophy in discussions of contemporary problems are the most important contributing factors surveys of the present kind are a valuable source of knowledge of this complexity the surveys may therefore help to strengthen the socratic element of modern philosophy the intercultural dialogue or kommunikationsgemeinschaft so far eight volumes are published in this series viz

wang guangyi one of the stars of the new wave of chinese art has artistically addressed major philosophical trends in western philosophy while drawing on taoism marxism and maoism by bringing together a team of experts in the philosophy of art to discuss his work the philosophy and art of wang guangyi presents the first philosophical exploration of wang s art his thought and his analysis of chinese society from his use of words in images to his reference to the classics of western painting contributors set wang s work against key questions in contemporary art as well as answering what makes the language of pop art successful they examine whether art and its history have come to an end as hegel posited and if it is possible or even necessary to rework a new narrative for the history of contemporary art the philosophy and art of wang guangyi marks an important contribution to understanding the background work and ideas of a 21st century political artist outside the west

portraits are everywhere one finds them not only in museums and galleries but also in newspapers and magazines in the homes of people and in the boardrooms of companies on stamps and coins on millions of cell phones and computers despite its huge popularity however portraiture hasn t received much philosophical attention while there are countless art historical studies of portraiture contemporary philosophy has largely remained silent on the subject this book aims to address that lacuna it brings together philosophers and philosophically minded historians with different areas of expertise to discuss this enduring and continuously fascinating genre the chapters in this collection are ranged under five broad themes part i examines the general nature of portraiture and what makes it distinctive as a genre part ii looks at some of the subgenres of portraiture such as double portraiture and at some special cases such as sport card portraits and portraits of people not present how emotions are expressed and evoked by portraits is the central focus of part iii while part iv explores the relation between portraiture fiction and depiction more generally finally in part v some of the ethical issues surrounding portraiture are addressed the book closes with an epilogue about portraits of philosophers portraits and philosophy tangles with deep questions about the nature and effects of portraiture in ways that will substantially advance the scholarly discussion of the genre it will be of interest to scholars and students working in philosophy of art history of art and the visual arts
