recent interest in the economic aspects of the history of art have taken traditional studies into new areas of enquiry going well beyond provenances or prices of individual objects our understanding of the arts has been advanced by research into the demands intermediaries and clients in the market eighteenth century rome offers a privileged view of such activities given the continuity of remarkable investments by the local ruling class combined with the decisive impact of external agents largely linked to the grand tour this book the result of collaboration between international specialists brings back into the spotlight protagonists facts and dynamics that have remained unexplored for many years

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this volume covers the major artistic and architectural masterpieces produced in rome from antiquity up to the present day it particularly considers art in ancient rome the early christian period the middle ages and the renaissance and baroque periods as well as more recent artistic productions as such it highlights the ongoing evolution of art in rome its fifteen chapters are organized topographically with each corresponding to a specific area of rome and exploring sites and monuments within that location whenever possible the chapters are also arranged chronologically therefore many of the ancient monuments are examined in the beginning chapters and then subsequent section move chronologically through the early christian period the middle ages and the renaissance the baroque and modern periods with its engaging and informative writing the volume will enhance students knowledge of rome allowing them to get as much out of their study abroad experience as possible in addition art in rome will appeal to scholars and erudite travelers who want to extensively explore the many artistic monuments of rome

in his clear and often exciting narrative professor german hafner analyzes twelve centuries of brilliant creative endeavor and traces the intricate pattern of cultural and artistic relationships between the various regions of italy greece and the lands of the orient to an italy that was a welter of small tribes and cities struggling for supremacy greek settlers early brought their culture they created ceramics statues paintings and buildings worthy of the highest achievements of their homeland before lapsing into barbarism as the romans embarked on their long climb to world rule the romans absorbed the cultural elements of the peoples they conquered especially of the greeks and not least the etruscans until step by step italy came to form a single artistic unit with its center at rome the standard of what we now regard as distinctively roman art spread throughout the empire beautifully illustrated in this book are the dancers wrestlers warriors horsemen centaurs gods goddesses and other themes that throughout antiquity moved the peoples of the mediterranean lands to the heights of artistic achievement from publisher's description

in this refreshing reappraisal of the art and architecture of ancient rome eve d ambra focuses on the personal social and cultural identity of its subjects the acquisition of art whether the purchase of copies of greek statuary the construction of a sumptuous villa or the commissioning of a portrait head played a crucial role in roman society in which displays of wealth and culture were necessary to gain and maintain power the question of identity is key to understanding the nature of the roman empire which seemed infinitely expandable at its peak welcomed foreigners to become romans freed slaves to citizen status and allowed social mobility within a strictly hierarchical social order d ambra discusses patronage on different social levels from that of the emperor and his court to those of shopkeepers and of artisans in diverse regions of the empire and in distinct ethnic groups she compares the imagery of the state and of military victory with the humblest funerary reliefs many provincial artworks were based on imperial models but others were created in resistance to prevailing imperial standards d ambra draws on a range of sculpture wall paintings decorative arts coins and architecture from italy to the edges of the empire evoking the traditionalism and the adaptability of roman art she also looks ahead to the art and architecture of the fourth century ad which despite the emergence of christianity as the dominant religion continued to be influenced by roman styles and themes eve d ambra is associate professor in the department of art at vassar college poughkeepsie new york she has taught and published widely in the field of roman art and society

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traditional studies of roman art have sought to identify an indigenous style distinct from greek art and in the process have neglected the large body of roman work that creatively recycled greek artworks now available in paperback this fresh reassessment offers instead a cultural history of the functions of the visual arts the messages that these images carried and the values that they affirmed in late republican rome and the empire the analysis begins at the point at which the

characteristic features of roman art started to emerge when the romans were exposed to hellenistic culture through their conquest of greek lands in the third century b c as a result the values and social and political structure of roman society changed as did the functions and character of the images it generated this volume presented in very clear and accessible language offers new and fascinating insights into the evolution of the forms and meanings of roman art zanker one of the foremost ancient roman art historians has produced an excellent general study of roman art and its reception this book would be ideal for students at all levels interested in roman art history and culture choice

this book first published in 2004 develops a theory for the understanding of roman pictorial art by treating roman art as a semantic system it establishes a connection between artistic forms and the ideological messages contained within the history of roman art traditionally followed the model of a sequence of stylistic phases affecting the works of their era in the manner of a uniform zeitgeist by contrast the author shows different stylistic forms being used for different themes

and messages the reception of greek models a key phenomenon of roman art thus appear in a new light the formulations of specific messages are established from greek art types of different eras serving to express roman ideological values classical forms for the grandeur of the state hellenistic forms for the struggling effort of warfare in this way a conceptual and comprehensible pictorial language arose uniting the multicultural population of the roman state

from the late fifteenth to the late seventeenth century rome was one of the most vibrant and productive centres for the visual arts in the west artists from all over europe came to the city to see its classical remains and its celebrated contemporary art works as well as for the opportunity to work for its many wealthy patrons they contributed to the eclecticism of the roman artistic scene and to the diffusion of roman artistic styles in europe and beyond art and identity in early modern rome is the first book length study to consider identity creation and artistic development in rome during this period drawing together an international cast of key scholars in the field of renaissance studies the book adroitly demonstrates how the exceptional quality of roman court and urban culture with its elected monarchy its large foreign population and unique sense of civic identity interacted with developments in the visual arts with its distinctive chronological span and uniquely interdisciplinary approach art and identity in early modern rome puts forward an alternative history of the visual arts in early modern rome one that questions traditional periodisation and stylistic categorisation

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
